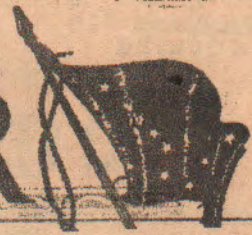

ASSEMBLY VETOS FIRST CLASS BOROUGH



ANCHORAGE: First class borough status was rejected at the regular meeting of the Greater Anchorage Borough Assembly Monday, when the assembly voted down a resolution offered by assemblyman Dick Fisher petitioning the local affairs agency to re-classify the GAAB from 2nd class to a first class borough.

It was the position, generally, of those who opposed the resolution, that the voters had expressed their wishes a year ago in favor of a 2nd class borough, and that nothing had transpired within the last year to give them cause to change their opinion.

Other borough business at the regular meeting was a report from Community Shelter Plan Project leader, Scott Hamilton, and Anchorage Civil Defense director Messick, who presented the results of their three and one half month study on a boroughwide shelter development program.

Glenn Briggs, assemblyman from section one, felt that if the residents of this area are interested in the study and the resultant proposed program, he is sure the leader and director would schedule a local public meeting.

GOAT CREEK SEEKS TO SECEDE FROM GAAB

GOAT CREEK: Twelve families from the Goat Creek area have petitioned the local boundary commission to consider the exclusion of that area from the Greater Anchorage Area Borough, and asked that they be attached to the Matanuska-Sitka Borough.

The petitioners gave as their reasons for asking this change the facts that they are more closely tied to the Palmer area for economic and recreational purposes.

Most shopping is done in Palmer; medical, dental, and hospital facilities are available; Palmer churches are attended by these families; and many types of clubs, such as Elks, 4-H, Homemakers, and Girl Scouts have members from the area.

School children of the Goat Creek area who now attend Palmer schools, will have to go to the Greater Chugiak Area, separating them from easy access to their family doctors, and their 4-H and other children's organizations, the petitioner stated.

Petroleum is being consumed in the United States at the rate of almost 11 million barrels a day, practically twice the amount used ten years ago.

The Reids were southbound, headed for Anchorage where Mrs. Reid was board a plane for Seattle for a visit with her daughter.

Reid was following a large semi-truck, and was apparently blinded by the soft snow which the truck was throwing up. The driver of the northbound car, was apparently also blinded by the snow, and the two cars met head on totally demolishing both of them.

The driver of the other car, a 1963 Chevrolet panel truck, Maver D. Roth, of Anchorage, suffered facial lacerations and bruises but was not hospitalized. Reid was driving a 1961 Hillman sedan.

Motorists who stopped to give assistance at the scene of the accident, went to an army installation located near the Eklutna River, from where a radio message was transmitted to the 5040th Air Force Hospital, who dispatched an ambulance which transported Reid and Roth to the Air Force Hospital.

No citations were issued and the case is still under investigation.

Mrs. Reid, 43, was an employee of the Experiment Station at Palmer. She is survived by her husband, two daughters, Mrs. Suellen Alger of Palmer and Imogene Reid of Seattle, and a son Leonard B. Reid of the U.S. Army who is stationed at Fort Devons, Mass.

Mrs. Reid's death is the second traffic fatality in this area for the holiday season. Just a week earlier at almost the same place a pedestrian, Alex Haff, wandered into the path of an oncoming car and was instantly killed.

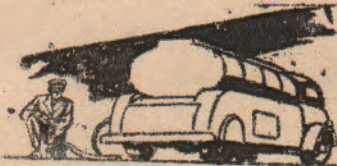

The Veterans Administration is providing care for eligible veterans in 168 hospitals, 18 domicilliaries and 217 outpatient clinics.

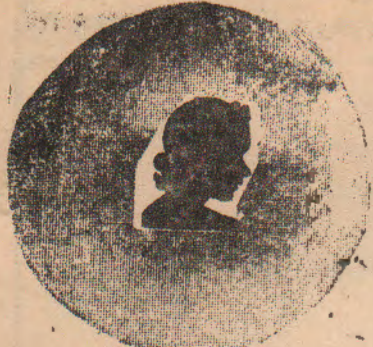

**HOW LONG WOULD YOUR
FOOD LAST?**

PALMER:

How long could you feed your family with the food you have in your home? Homemakers who took part in a survey were asked to estimate how long their food supplies would last, not if they served normal meals, but if they fed the family only enough to get by on.

One-third said they could stretch food on hand about a week or less. Another third said between one and two weeks. The rest felt they could hold out longer than two weeks.

You are better off living in the suburbs than in town, but better still on a farm.

Survey results show that 42 percent of the families in the big cities said their food supply would be gone in a week or less. Only 27 percent in the suburbs said they would be out of food in a week or less, and only 17 percent on the farm said they would be out of food in a week or less.

The survey results indicate the importance of having a family food supply on hand to last two weeks or longer in an emergency, according to Lew Hanks, rural civil defense specialist with the Cooperative Extension Service, University of Alaska.

Exterior Finishes for Softwood Plywood

Exterior types of softwood
plywood such as Douglas fir
may be finished in the same
ways as wood siding. However
it is important to take special
steps to seal all the edges of
the plywood sheets.

The end grain of all wood
tends to absorb moisture more
readily than any of the other
surfaces. By alternating the
grain direction in the different
layers of the plywood, thin
layers of end grain are present
on every edge of the sheets.

Therefore, to prevent paint
failure and face checking, it is
important to seal the edges
with a heavy coat of top quality
exterior primer or aluminum
paint for wood. The edges
should be sealed even if the
edges are to be butted together
or covered with moldings.

It is generally advisable to
do this before the panels are
installed. The edge sealing can
be accomplished with the least
effort by stacking the sheets
and applying the primer or
aluminum paint to the large
area formed by many surfaces.

High quality house paints
are generally recommended for
regular sanded plywood panels
and medium density overlays.
However, penetrating stain
may be used on sanded ply-
wood.

Unsanded plywood and Tex-
ture One-Eleven are particu-
larly suited to the penetrating
stain finish.

Whenever factory primed
plywood is used, it is very im-
portant to follow the manu-
facturer's directions pertaining
to the finish coats. It is also
important to apply the finish
coats before the primer has had
a chance to weather.
