Shirley came in third place on Sunday in the first heat behind Sheri Wright and Natalie Norris, with a time of 36.57.

On the second day, she passed up Natalie Norris to duplicate her own time of the day before (a first in local racing circles) and came in second, and in second place over all with a tital time of 1 hour 13 minutes and 54 seconds.

Shirley raced eight dogs the first day and dropped one to race a seven dog team on the final day. Shirley differs from the two other

top lady mushers (Mrs. Wright and Mrs. Norris) in that the latter are wives of long time dog mushers, and each raced her husbands team.

Shirley trains her own dogs, and is the only musher in her family. The only time her husband has ever attempted to race was in the annual Cheechako race last year at Eagle River, at which time he raced his wife's team.

Shirley has a stable of ten dogs, Shirley has a stable of ten dogs, and runs them every other day, either at the Eagle River course, or along the MEA pole line behind her home. She will hook up her trailer, load her dogs, put her sled on top of her car and take off for the races at anytime.

She competed in all of the preliminary races this year and fin-

liminary races this year and fin-ished in the top ten in each one. She sometime hopes to have a large enough team to compete in

the World's Championship Sled Dog Race held each year at the Fur Rendezvous.

This is her fourth year to compete in the Women's Championship finishing fifth two years ago, third last year, and leaving only first place to go in 1966.

Shirley was one of seven women competing in this years race, on a ten mile course run in two separate heats. Her prize for second place was \$250.

Shirley lives just off "Four Wheel Drive" in Peters Creek with her husband Myron and three children,

Micheal 13, Gail 10 and Michelle 5. Her son Michael shows signs of following in his mothers footsteps, having won second place in the three dog race at the Willow Winter Carnival earlier this month,

South Vietnam, about the size of the state of Washington, is bordered on the east and south by the South China Sea, on the west, by Cambodia. Laos is on the north except for the narrow strin connecting with North Vietnam.

strip connecting with North Vietnam.

The history of Vietnam goes back some 5,000 years, and is chronicled by a thousand years' rule by China and the many subsequent rebellions. The country was split into north and south sections in the 16th century and again in the 17th century. For several reasons, presumably pretexts, France undertook to conquer Vietnam in the 1840's, achieving total control in 1858.

Japan occupied Vietnam in 1940 recieving cooperation of the French Vichy government. Prior to the Japanese defeat of World WarII, the Japanese eliminated French administration and (this sound odd today) permitted the Vietnamese to proclaim their independence.

Meanwhile, Communists, with the leadership of Ho Chi Minh (the current president of North Vietnam) succeeded in getting nationalists groups exiled from Chine to form the Viet Minh. The Viet Minh, with the support of Allied nations, waged anti- Japanese guerilla activities, and was able to take control of the north before the Chinese army of occupation entered in 1945.

The French were able to reestablish themselves in the south, and in 1946 recognized the north-

The French were able to reestablish themselves in the south, and in 1946 recognized the northern regime of Ho Chi Minh. France promised complete independence for Vietnam with the French Union, but war broke out between the French and Viet Minh go vernment in 1945. As a result, France lost her postion in Vietnam.

According to the Conference of Geneva in 1954, north and south were to be reunified by elections in 1956. However, South Vietnam President Ngo Dinh Diem (who may be remembered as the husband of Madam Ngo Dinh Diem) would not accept

the provisions of the Geneva Agreements. In 1958, the Communist leaders of North Vietnam decided to take over South Vietnam by force.

Largely, if not solely, through the efforts of the United States, South Vietnam continuese her struggle to retain her identity as a sep arate anti-comunistic government.

gle to retain her identity as a sep arate, anti-comunistic government.
Current reports, not only confusing in themselves, tend to confuse the whole issue of what we are doing and more important in the long view, what are the South Vietnamese doing among themselves. Even though we know that freedom comes dear, it is discouraging to learn of American casualties and disheartening that the South Vietnamese cannot cooperate sufficiently long among themselos for one to learn the correct pronunciation of the name of their latest leader.



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
