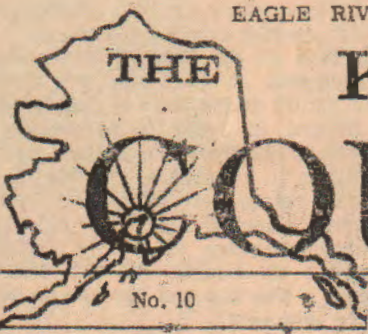

BIRCHWOOD: Chugiak Stew and Fun Day will begin at noon this Saturday, March 13th, with a daylong program of Athletic Contests, movies, dancing, exhibits and coming to a climax with a Variety and Fashion Show.

CHUGIAK: Frank Cline, Chugiak High School Principal, missing since Sunday, February 23th, is the object of an intensive air search which has included Civil Air Patrol aircraft, private planes, Army, Air Force, Air Guard and Coast Guard planes and helicopters.

Cline, who was piloting a red and white Super Cub was last heard from on Monday, March 1st when a radio message from him stated that he was unable to proceed due to bad weather and would land and wait for the weather to clear.

Cline and his passenger, George Marsters, East High principal were returning from a wolf hunt in the Iliamna area when they encountered the bad weather. They were in the Lake Clark Pass area when the radio message was received.

No word has been heard from the missing men since that time. An Anchorage pilot, Stuart Ramstad reported that he had flown through Lake Clark Pass on Monday enroute to Anchorage, and had sighted a red and white plane on the ground. He also saw someone near the plane, apparently chopping a hole in the ice. When weather cleared enough for planes to penetrate the Pass, Ramstad returned to the spot where he had seen the plane, but it was no longer there.

The plane which Cline was piloting is owned jointly by him and Al Tanner of Peters Creek.

Hopes that clearing weather would permit an extensive search this morning faded when bad weather once again closed in. However, despite this a total of eight aircraft, including CAP, military and private planes were able to get in several hours of searching.

CAP Aircraft were searching the area from the mouth of the pass to Anchorage, while Air Force and Coast Guard planes confined their efforts to the mountain slopes. An Airforce Helicopter searched the area inside the pass, while an Army photo reconnaissance plane was scheduled to fly through the pass.

Participating in the search is Ed Bellringer, Commander of the Chugiak High School CAP Cadet Squadron.

CAP officials have asked private pilots who wish to help in the search to coordinate their efforts with the CAP, and not to attempt to search on their own. This not only could be a waste of time, if they should decide to search an area already covered by CAP, but could prove dangerous as the areas are being covered by a pattern of low flying search planes and an unauthorized plane in the area could cause trouble.

One frequently hears the lament concerning the high cost of living, along with the expression of wanting to return to the "good old day."

Even when the purchasing power of the dollar is considered, there is no question but that we spend more money today than we did twenty five or thirty years ago. Are we spending more because we actually have, to or has the real cost of living gone up?

It has been my theory that, were we to purchase only the items we bought thirty years ago, we would find that our cost of living has gone up very little, if any. For example, those of us who are able to recall our purchases and those of our families in the 1930's will remember that we had only one radio and not every family had one. Not every family had an automobile, and only a few had more than one.

Nobody had TV! No deepfreeze, no stereo, no FM radio. The family camera, more than likely, was a box affair with fast and slow speeds with two lens settings. A list of items that didn't exist could go on indefinitely. Another long list could be compiled of items that did exist, but were owned singly and in simple, lasting forms.

In Alaska, there are still a goodly number of families who are "pioneering," carrying in water, burning wood, lighting with oil or gas lamps, but it is doubted that, with the exception of a few hardy individuals, these families are looking forward to living without the so-called "modern conveniences indefinitely.

Not many of us would want to return to the good old days - except on a highly selective basis. Since this is improbable, if not impossible, it seems that we'll have to become accustomed to these necessities that a few short years ago would have been termed luxuries, along with the high cost of living!

PALMER: The Matanuska Telephone Association announced that the deadline for listing in the white pages of the new phone directory will be April 2nd.

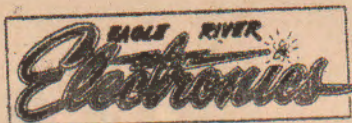
Anyone planning to have a phone installed and wishing to be listed in the new directory, or who wishes a change in their listing must contact the office in Palmer before that date.

Dear Editor,

Recently the Anchorage Times ran a list of names of teenagers involved in drinking and party crashing.

The ages of the people ranged from 15 to 21, boys and girls alike. The article raised controversy because the naming of the delinquents shed bad publicity on the parents. Also many people felt that the kids should be protected instead of exposed.

Many were in favor of supporting the action of the newspaper and the judge. A motion made to the student council of Chugiak High School to send a telegram of approval to the magistrate was defeated by a narrow margin.

TOMATOES VALUABLE VIATMIN SOURCE

PALMER:

Tomatoes are an important source of the vitamin C we need every day in our diet, district home demonstration agent Myrtle Bang recently stated. The vitamin C can be obtained from both raw and cooked or canned tomatoes.

A quick cream of tomato soup that is quite different from the thickened soups may be made by combining two cups of cooked or canned tomatoes with three cups of milk, said the home agent. This should be heated rapidly to serving temperature; then add one teaspoon salt, a little pepper and one tablespoon fat.

Another way of serving tomato is to mix up 3/4 cup fresh or canned tomatoes and one pound of ground beef. Also add one half cup uncooked quick cooking oats as a binder and season to taste.
