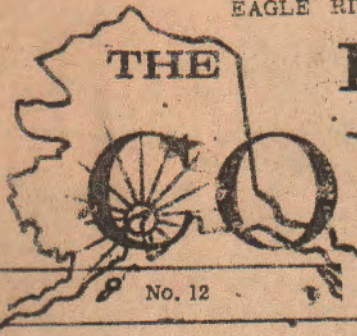

## TOLL FREE PHONE SERVICE TO BASES TO END

### MISSING PLANE FOUND, CLINE AND MARSTERS DEAD

LAKE CLARK: The tragic conclusion of a ten day search for the missing red and white super cub took place last Thursday, March 11th when the crashed aircraft was sighted in Lake Clark Pass.

This ended an intensive search by the military, Civil Air Patrol and private planes. The wreck was spotted by Stuart Ramstad, a CAP volunteer who was the one to have originally seen the plane safe on the ground on Monday, March 1st.

The plane had apparently crashed into the side of the pass, at an elevation of approximately 400 feet above base, and was lying on its side on a 70 degree slope. The left wing and strut had been sheared off and the fuselage was badly twisted. The plane appeared to have been headed back toward Lake Clark when the crash occurred.

The following day an Air Force Helicopter with a rescue team flew to the crash scene and removed the bodies of the pilot, Clifton Frank Cline, Chugiak High School Principal and passenger, George Marsters Principal of East Anchorage High School.

Both men had apparently been killed instantly by the impact.

The pair had been returning from a wolf hunting expedition in the Iliamna area when weather had closed in on them. A radio message had been intercepted from Cline stating that he has being forced down because of weather, this was

### FRANK CLINE

#### I WILL REMEMBER FRANK CLINE

I will remember him most for his jokes at our Lions Club Meetings.

He came to his feet with a joke on the spur of the moment, to fit any occasion. His jokes were always in the best taste and always appropriate. He bubbled with humor.

Frank, and his close friend Chuck Smith, made a perfect team at these weekly meetings. They never passed up an opportunity to heap personal insults on each other, in the best of high humor, until the entire club broke up in laughter.

I will remember that I sponsored Frank Cline when he joined the Eagle River Lions Club. That was in October of 1963. Later on, in December, I sponsored Chuck, after he moved back down off the home-stand.

Chuck was Superintendent of Schools here in Chugiak at that time; Frank was principal at Eagle River Elementary.

FALMER: Toll free service between Fort Richardson and Elmendorf Air Force Base and the two phone exchanges in the Greater Chugiak Area will end on June 19th, according to Max Clement, Manager for the Matanuska Telephone Association.

Clement explained that this is the cut-over date to the new all- numeral dialing for the Anchorage Phone, company, and at that time the ACS Operators who have been handling calls between Anchorage, the bases and the Chugiak and Eagle River Exchanges will no longer render this service.

Therefore although local subscribers will benefit by being able to dial Anchorage direct without having to dial "3" and then give their message to the ACS operator, they will have to pay long distance rates when they call either of the bases.

Rates for station to station calls will be 40¢ for the first three minutes, with 10¢ per minute for overtime; and 80¢ for person to person, with 10¢ per minute for overtime.

Toll-free service to Anchorage will continue, Clement stated. He also said that the quality of service to Anchorage will be much improved under the new system.

Clement went on to say that he is confident that toll-free service to the bases will be re-instated some time in the future, but not at the cut-over date.

Another change which will take place on June 19th is a new prefix for phones in the Chugiak exchange. The prefix "674" will be changed to "688". The last four digits in the phone numbers should remain the same, with the exception of those which would have the number "8" as the first of the group of four last numbers.

Clement advises any local business on the Chugiak exchange that is planning on having stationary or cards imprinted with phone numbers, remember that these numbers will be changed as June 19th.

### CHUGIAK STEW POSTPONED

BIRCHWOOD: The Chugiak Stew and Fun Day, originally scheduled for March 13th, was postponed because of the death of Chugiak High School Principal, Frank Cline.

The event has been rescheduled for Saturday, March 27th.

All tickets dated March 13th, will be honored at that time.

All events scheduled for that day will take place as planned.

on Sunday, February 28th. On Monday, a second radio message was overheard stating that the pair had taken off and were again being forced to land because of weather.

Ramstad had seen the aircraft safely on the ground that afternoon, but a pilot coming through the pass later that day reported that it was no longer there. Speculation was that they had attempted to follow the Ramstad plane through the pass, and when weather conditions worsened had attempted to turn back and crashed into the mountain. Cline, the pilot, was believed to have held a commercial pilots rating. He had recently purchased the plane along with Al Tanner of Peters Creek.

We were a fledgling Lions Club that year; eagerly looking for ways to serve the community. I had just been appointed chairman of the Sight Conservation Committee and, frankly, didn't know where to start or what to do.

I will remember that Frank Cline welcomed me with open arms when I went to his with questions. I will remember that the Committee took his suggestion, and bought a Vision-tester for the Eagle River School; we then took Chuck's advice, and bought another machine for Chugiak. But time passed. Lion Chuck Smith has moved to another area, to another job; and is now Secretary of another Lions Club.

Lion Frank Cline was killed last week in a plane crash. Our Lions Club lost a good Lion and a personal friend.

We thank God that his death was quick; that he did not die slowly and painfully, far from his loved ones and friends.

What can we do in his memory? How can we express sentiments? Will we attend memorial services today and then forget him tomorrow? This seems to be our usual procedure.

I say NO!

We should not forget Frank Cline. We should remember him. Not for his sake; he would be the first to say: "Remember me! For God's sake, why?"

Surely not for the sake of his family. They have their own adjustment to make. They are alive and time will soften the memories. We need to remember Frank Cline for our own sake.

Remember is sentiment and sentiment is an emotion that can lift us out of our little individual islands of existence, and make us think of another.

For this reason we need to remember Frank Cline.

I propose that we of the Eagle River Lions Club leave Lion Frank's name on the Club Roster; that his name be called as usual; then in answer to his name, the Immediate Past President will rise and say: "I answer for Lion Frank Cline." A simple enough thing to do, isn't it?

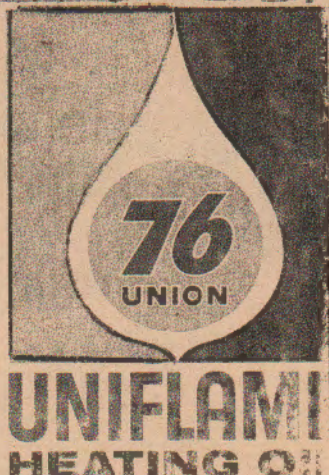

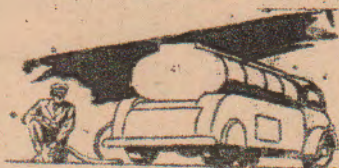

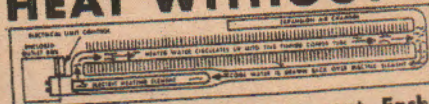

MEMORIAL SERVICES

Cline of Lawndale North Carolina, a brother Hoyte Cline of Lawndale, four sisters, Mrs. Carolyn Horn and Mrs. Nell Golins of Lawndale, Mrs. Jean Vaughn of Tampa Florida and Mrs. Martha Prim of Charlotte North Carolina.

The Memorial Services were conducted jointly by Rev. Leo Cramer, of the Chugiak Methodist Church, and Rev. E.C. Chron, of the First Baptist Church of Eagle River, who delivered the eulogy.

Burial will take place at Shelby North Carolina near Lawndale.
