LOCAL LIBRARY LAYS OUT RULES

OLD CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Elementary School PTA Library Committee met last Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mrs Polly Kallenberg in Old Chugiak. The group conferred with Miss Elsie Lundborg, Anchorage Library Representative and made the following plans which are subject to approval of the Loussac Public Library of Anchorage.

The Old Chugiak branch will be located in the former Chugiak Public Library building at Swanee Slipes. The committee hopes that the branch will be open soon after April first. At present the quarters are being prepared for occupancy, and books and shelves will be moved from Anchorage. The name of the Library will be "The Chugiak Public Library", and the committee hopes that the old sign, set up by the original library founders, can be used.

The library will be opened Wednesday afternoons from three to five o'clock and Friday evenings from 7:30 to 9:30pm. These hours may be changed later, depending on the use of the library. This is to be a test as to the need for books in the immediate area. To make it an accurate test, library cards issued at the Chugiak branch will be good only at that branch. However, Anchorage library cards will be good at the Chugiak branch. To keep the records straight, readers will be asked at this time to make a choice between using the branch at Old Chugiak or the one at Eagle River. A plan is being considered to enable books taken out at the Anchorage library to be returned at either of the local branches.

Transportation of books and shelves is a problem and trucks will be needed. Anyone with a truck who is willing to volunteer their services for a trip to Anchorage to haul books or shelves (which will be unassembled) is asked to please call Mrs. Kallenberg at Chugiak 674-5070. Mrs. Kallenberg will be the local librarian working with Miss Lundborg to get the library started.

Members of the PTA Library Committee are Mrs. William Atwood, of Birchwood, Mrs. George Ante of Peters Creek, and Mrs. Robert C. Kallenberg of Old Chugiak. Anyone interested in any particular type of books is asked to let any of the above know of their suggestions. Gift books are welcome at the library and these books will be held until they can be classified at Anchorage. They will then be added to the general supply of books circulating in the area.

Encyclopedias and dictionary will be permanently kept for reference needs. Requests for a particular book from the Loussac Library will

Jerry, also took first place in the sub-division of Chemistry for his exhibit which showed a substitute for Grignard Reagent (RMgX) which is used for synthesis of many organic compounds in research. Jerry had substituted calcium for magnesium in his exhibit.

As the State Champion in his field, Jerry will leave for St. Louis Missouri on May 5th, where he will enter his exhibit at the National Science Fair.

Other Chugiak students who took awards at the Science Fair were, Harold Schetzle of Chugiak High School who won first place in the Earth and Space sub-division. His exhibit concerned a new method of Geo-Chemical prospecting.

Kaye Ekstedt, also of Chugiak High took third place in the Zoological sub-division with a study of Emryonic Development. In addition to the Science Fair award, Kaye received a special cash award of \$50 from a Heart Fund Association.

BARNEY SABO GETS PERMANENT APPOINTMENT

BIRCHWOOD: Bernard (Barney) Sabo, who last week was named acting Principal of Chugiak High School for the remainder of the school semester, will receive a permanent appointment to that post next fall, according to Dr. Don DaFoe, Superintendent of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough School District.

Sabo is replacing Frank Cline who was killed earlier this month in a tragic airplane crash.

Sabo was the Industrial Arts teacher at Chugiak High and was an Administrative Trainee prior to his appointment as Principal.

He calls Brownville Pennsylvania his original home, but received his teacher training in the State of California.

Although he arrived in Chugiak last fall, he was no stranger to Alaska, having served here with the Army from 1952 through 1955 at Fort Richardson, Fairbanks and at Kenal. He was with the Army Security Agency at that time.

After his discharge from the Army he returned to the south 48 to train to be a teacher.

CHUGIAK VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY ANNUAL REPORT TO COMMUNITY

In March, 1964, the Company morale was at a low eb, the equipment in poor repair, the financial condition almost nil.

The Company decided it would be necessary to take its case to the Community with the resolution that it must raise \$3,000.00 minimum, by July 31, or close down by that date. This amount would enable the Company to repair its equipment and pay operational expenses for the coming year. This was based on past experience.

The Company enlisted the aid of the Birchwood Loopers Homemakers Club, who then began a door to door campaign which resulted in over 90% of those contacted supporting the Company.

Armed with this vote of confidence and a donation of a bed-divan by Birchwood Upholsterers for a raffle, the company received nearly the \$3,000.00 goal. The exact amount was \$2,621.36.

The Company proceeded to reorganize its operation and rebuild its hall and equipment. Regular Sunday work-partys have been in effect since May and many manhours are spend on off hours during the week days.

Some members have been and still are actively engaged in locating a suitable site for a substation on Birchwood Loop. The Company has long realized a necessity for additional equipment in this area.

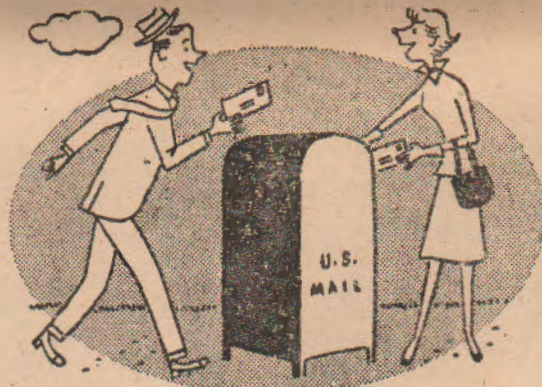
The Company's prime reason for existing is "Fast, Efficient, and Reliable Service to this Community" and effective mutual aid support to other Fire Companys.

To this end the following projects were undertaken:

1. Restoration of Firehall and construction of addition, still in progress.
2. Restoration of existing fire equipment and rescue equipment, still in progress.
3. Planned and controlled operation and maintenance of emergency vehicles.
4. Construction of 500 GPM tanker pumper. (Completed)
5. A Rescue and Fire training program, in progress.
6. Purchase of a building to be used for Bingo and other activities.
7. Lease of existing Bingo Hall and upgrading of condition.
8. An effective pre-fire planning and building inspection program to be inqurated upon completion of fire training.

Following are the named people whose unselfish donation of time and talent should be recognized. The Fire Company's progress is a direct result of their effort.

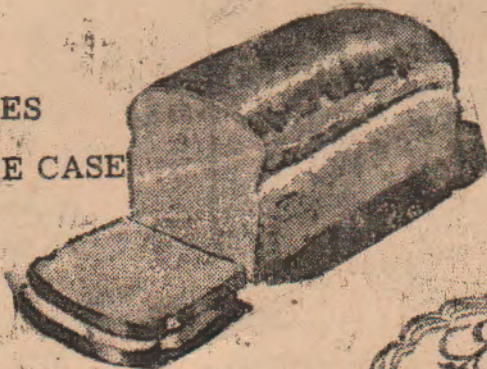

TRANSFER COMPLETED

PALMER:

The exclusion of Goat Creek in the Greater Anchorage Area borough and its annexation to the Matanuska-Susitna borough is now effective, according to Ronald C. Cease, director of the Alaska local affairs agency.

Cease relayed the information to the Matanuska-Susitna borough office in a wire early this week.

The annexation became official through failure of the Alaska State Legislature to act on the question of annexation in the 45-day period provided for in the state Constitution section relating to boundary changes.

Cease recommended the boundary change following a hearing in the Goat Creek area. The hearing came as a result of a petition from residents of the area who cited reasons why they are more closely tied economically and socially to the Palmer area than to the Chugiak area.

**BYLAWS — Article II, Section 7. Voting by Members
Not Natural Persons.**

At meetings of members, the vote of any member who is a firm, association, corporation, business trust, partnership, federal agency, state or political subdivision, or agency thereof, or any body politic, shall be cast by no person except an owner, officer or employee of such member whose authority to act for such member shall be in writing, duly authorized and signed by the governing authority of such member or by some officer empowered to do so.
