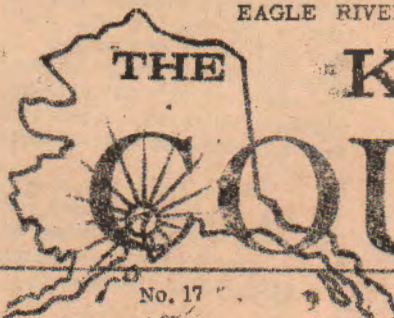

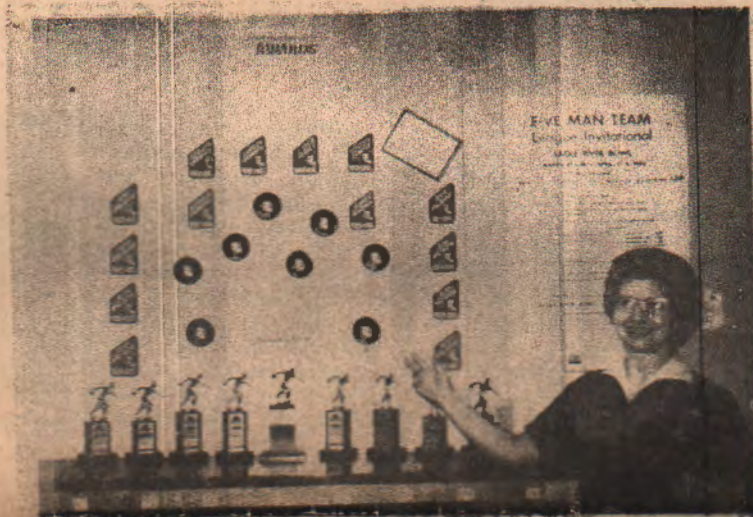

PROMPT RESPONSE SAVES EAGLE RIVER HOME

EAGLE RIVER: Prompt response by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company limited fire damage to an Eagle River home to \$600.

The fire broke out at the Donald K. Vincent home of Borealis Street in the Phillips sub-division at 10:30am on Tuesday, April 20th.

The blaze apparently was the result of an electrical short in the freezer which was located on the porch of the four bedroom frame building.

Mr. and Mrs. Vincent, both of whom work at Ft. Richardson were away at the time. Their eight year old daughter Barbara was at home sick, attended by her fifteen year old sister Hazel.

The girls summoned Eagle River Fire Chief Tom Take, who lives across the street from them. He responded with both trucks, and the fire was soon extinguished, limiting damage to the porch.

OLD CHUGIAK: A Government Hill woman killed of injuries received in an accident at mile 20, shortly after she was taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance.

The victim was Mrs. Mildred W. May, of 1320 Richardson Vista DRoad in Anchorage.

The accident occurred when the driver, her husband Airman first class John W. May swerved to attempt to miss a deep chuck hole in the pavement.

He lost control of the car, which left the road and rolled over, coming to rest approximately 200 feet from the spot, according to state police.

Mrs. May was thrown through the windshield and pinned under the car.

Passers by helped extricate her, and the ambulance was summoned. Mrs. May appeared to be suffering from cuts, bruises, a possible broken arm and a serious head injury.

The accident took place at 4:00pm yesterday afternoon (Tuesday) across from the Ising School Bus garage.

The car was a 1963 Rambler. Her husband appeared to be suffering only from superficial cuts and bruises.

A witness to the accident said that May did not appear to be traveling at an excessive rate of speed, but thought that a gust of wind might have caught his car as he swerved.

Age has probably narrowed my tolerance and when a bunch of kids speed their auto through my driveway and yell an obscenity when an attempt is made to slow them down, I get downright cranky. I would like to think that such illmannered, thoughtless, immature boys live other than in our local area.

Statistically, about two percent of the nation's youngsters are classified as delinquents. Although this is a relatively small number, it is alarming. And most of all, it is probably most alarming to the 98 percent of our youngsters who are well behaved, considerate and normal. Without attempting to offer a solution to the problem of misbehavior by the juveniles, I should like to suggest one little effort; Know where your youngsters are and what they are doing.

When is someone going to provide a sensible answer to this ridiculous garbage dump situation. If I knew where it would be effective, I'd propose a "garbage march". Until a better solution is forthcoming,

It is gratifying to those of us directly connected with Fire and Rescue Service to observe the enthusiastic support evident in the Letter written by Mrs. Lester W. Juhnke. We know

many feel the way she does, however few will take the time to air their views where they will do the most good.

I know that during the period May through August, Fire and Rescue calls increase at least 100% in this reason can be connected directly or indirectly to Fireworks in irresponsible hands.

This bill and bills like it have been treated as a joke in Juneau for years.

This letter is written to convey only this message. "Where public safety and property hazard are concerned, please, KEEP POLITICS OUT!"

In support of Mrs. Juhnke's letter, regarding HB 52 (Fireworks Control), I would like to add these comments:

Why, Legislative Members, in TWENTY years have you yet to come to an agreement regarding Fireworks Control?

It seems strange that a bill which has little financial investment for

the state (maybe that is the reason) which would be of such a great benefit to Alaskans and protect one of our greatest assets, our children, cannot be promoted.

Very few bills receive the dubious honor of being referred to nine committees. Bills involving financial outlay seem to get passed without much effort. Why did the Senators have no opportunity to discuss this bill? A local Senator stated, "The merits of this bill should be discussed and a vote taken." Conversations with the Fire Marshall's Office and the State Police Department have indicated their support of Fireworks Control for many years. Apparently their concern is of no interest to you.

How many fires are going to be started through the misuse of fireworks? How many children are going to have to be injured, maimed or even killed before you will do something constructive about it? All the profits of the sellers can never bring back one dead child. Such a tragedy was the result on June 23, last year in Fairbanks when a five year old threw a lighted firecracker into gasoline.

What does it take to get results in the Senate—short of moving it here? Has this really taken twenty years to discuss, or this bill a typical example of selfish legislative tactics.

(Rivers report)

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON

By: Ralph J. Rivers, M.C.

WASHINGTON: President Johnson's pledge of the use of power with restraint, and of his willingness to consider unconditional discussions, toward a peaceful and independent SOUTH VIETNAM has my unqualified support. I approve also -- because it gives the President diplomatic initiative -- of his offer of an economic development program for Southeast Asia.

.... Under the House-passed MEDICARE bill, which I supported, about eight thousand Alaskans who are 65 or over would be eligible for hospital and nursing home care under the Social Security Act, beginning in mid 1966. They would also be free to participate in an insurance plan (costing three dollars a month) for coverage of doctor's fees and other health services.

.... The medical assistance bill, now in the Senate, also carries my provision that would permit ALASKA'S TEACHERS to be covered under the Social Security Act.

.... Although Alaska is frequently mentioned with southern states in discussions of the VOTING RIGHTS bill, the calculations that show less than 50 percent participation in Alaska elections are mistakenly based in figures that include military personnel -- most of whom cast ballots in other states. As I told my colleagues (Monday's Congressional Record), more than 60% of Alaska's eligible citizens do vote.

.... Happily, Alaska is one of two states having no chapter of the John Birch Society. Now comes news from the Society's founder, Robert Welch, that a Society coordinator will be in Alaska shortly. Welch is quoted as saying that, because of "preponderant left-wing political strength" in many of the Congressional districts, he has written them off -- but not Alaska.

.... Replacement of Eklutna Dam is expected to generate 65 MAN-YEARS OF EMPLOYMENT at the site near Anchorage. Contract for the dam, severely damaged in the 1964 earthquake, totals almost \$1.3 million.

.... Alaskan communities not yet participating in programs of the OFFICE OF ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY, but desiring to do so should write me. Let me help in any way I can.

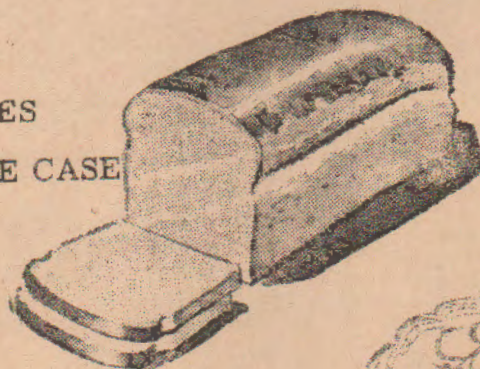

SAFETY IS A HABIT

PALMER:

Safety is a habit that must be nourished each day Leland Cade, District Extension Agent emphasized this week. The home is the most dangerous place on earth, because that's where most safety rules are violated, and where most accidents happen.

Falls are the most common form of accident, and it doesn't have to be far, Mr. Cade stated. A fall from a chair, a fall on a slippery floor, or down the stairs can be just as injurious as tangling with a bull in a bull fighting ring.

Ice is a common hazard at this time of year, Cade warned. That's why it's a good idea to keep steps free of snow and ice, why it's a good idea to have railings on steps, why it's a good idea to use caution about using steps, especially in the dark.

Another common hazard in the home is electricity, he said. The bathroom should be arranged so that electrical equipment cannot fall into the tub, and so that electrical equipment cannot be adjusted from the tub. For example the radio should be located so that a person can't stand in the tub and turn it on or off, and light switches should be located so that they are not accessible from the tub or sink, Cade concluded.

WILLOW LAND SALE TOMORROW

WILLOW:

Willow townsite residential and commercial lots will go on sale at 1 p.m. Thursday, April 22, at the Willow community hall, Roscoe Bell, director of the Alaska division of lands, department of natural resources, has announced.

The residential lots, a half acre in size, are valued from \$500 to \$1,100. Commercial lots (the same size) range in value from \$900 to \$1,750.

Residential lots are subject to veterans' preference (see legal notice, April 1 and 8 issues of The Frontiersman). No more than one lot per person may be purchased by veterans' preference.

Any United States citizen over 19 years of age is qualified to purchase land at the sale, providing purchases at this and previous state land sales do not amount to more than 640 acres.

Successful bidders must deposit ten per cent of the purchase price at the time of the award, plus a \$10 fee to cover the cost of advertising. The minimum annual payment on lots purchased on contract will be not less than ten per cent of the purchase price, plus five per cent interest on the unpaid balance.

AMMENDMENT WOULD BENEFIT WIDOWS

WASHINGTON:

Senator Gruening last week announced he supported proposed legislation which would make it possible for widows and widowers to retain their social security benefits in case either should remarry.

The senator said social security benefits were meager enough without reducing them further.

CAR MOOSE ACCIDENT FACTS

ANCHORAGE:

Forty-six autos were damaged in the Anchorage area due to collisions with moose this winter, reports the department of fish and game.

Records of the department of public safety indicate the damage varies from a wrinkled fender or broken windshield to total loss of the auto. Although these collisions usually result in loss of the moose and extensive damage to the auto, fortunately no lives have been lost this year. Occupants of the autos have suffered bumps, bruises, broken limbs, and occasionally, cuts from flying glass. Game Biologist Arthur Bratlie stated.

"A driver should be especially alert at dusk and after dark because the auto he saves may be his own. He may slow down to let a cow moose cross the highway, then speed up and hit the calf that is loafing several yards behind."

A new chapter in the conservation of Alaska's moose may soon be written, Bratlie added. The U.S. Army and the department of fish and game are about to launch "Operation Moose Mirror."

He told how several game departments in the "Lower 48," by placing a series of small mirrors by the side of a road, have been able to cut down substantially on deer-car collisions. The mirrors are angled at 45 degrees to the road so that they reflect headlight beams off to the side of the right of way. The reflected glare shines into the deer's eyes and holds the animal transfixed until the car goes by.

"The initial tests with deer have been so encouraging," Bratlie concluded. "That we are planning to try the idea with moose on a stretch of highway adjacent to Fort Richardson."

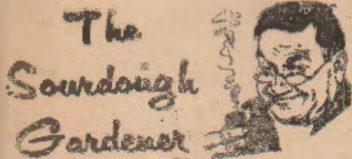

Don't get over-anxious about getting your plants in. Extension Service Publication No. 9, "Seed Starting and Transplanting," will tell you how and when.

For those of you who don't have a copy on hand, I'll review a few of the vegetables you can put in real early. Celery is slow growing and needs 12 to 14 weeks of growth before it is set into the garden. Then there are tomatoes and peppers which may be started as much as 10 to 12 weeks before transplanting time.

The next thing to think about is broccoli, cabbage, and cauliflower. This group can be started six to eight weeks early and not get out of hand, but chard and lettuce, for an early crop, need only two to four weeks before you set them outside.

Then for those of you interested in getting flowers started, we should list those which need to be started about six to eight weeks before planting time.

They are butterfly flower, English daisy, feverfew, lobelia, namesia, nicotiana, common petunia, snapdragon, sweet alyssum, and verbena.

The next group, for a four to six weeks' early start, are African daisy, ageratum, the asters, godetia, larkspur, nasturtium, and stocks.

The three to four weeks group is bachelor button, calendula, candytuft, clarkia, dahlias, glads, marigolds, phlox, and zinnias.

Then there is one more group that may be started about four weeks early, but they should be started in their own containers as they will not transplant as well as some of the others. The canary bird vine, for instance, is one of our best and fastest growing vines. Nicotiana, Shirley poppy and the unflower should also be started in containers.

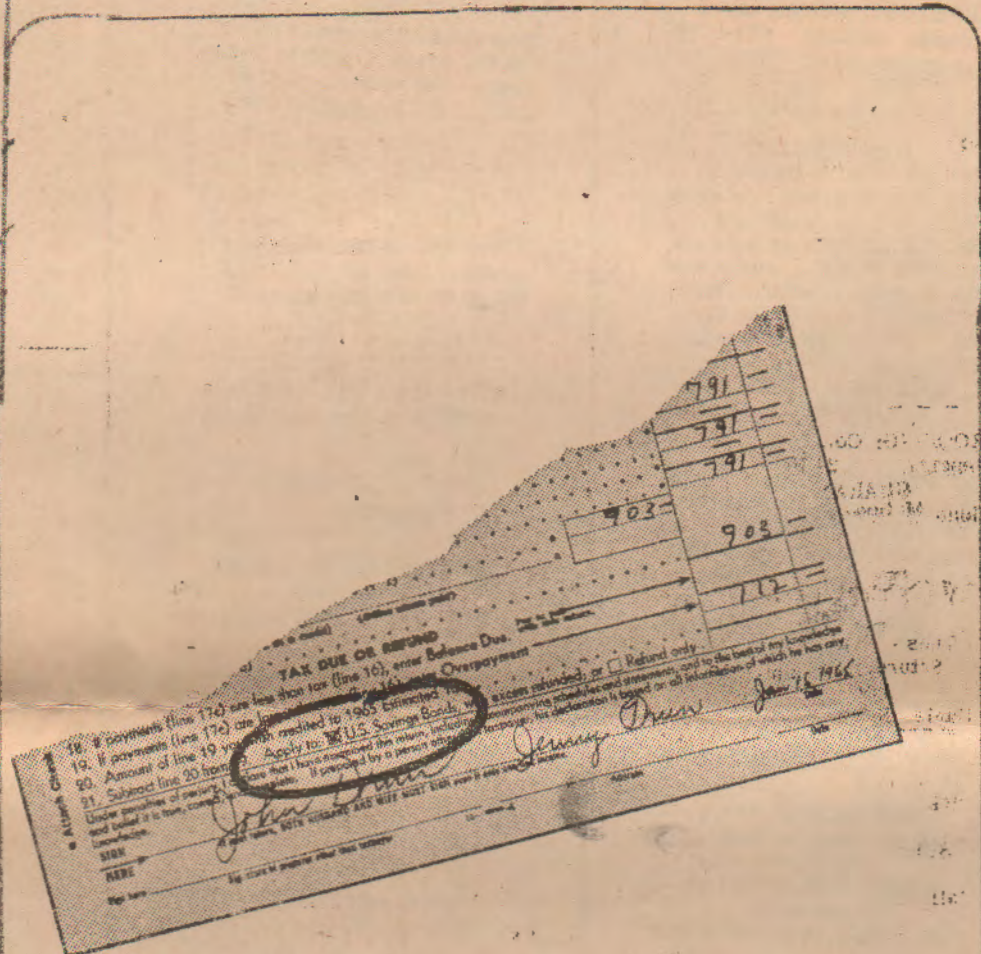
