EAGLE RIVER: State Police are investigating a daring burglary, in which an Eagle River trailer home was entered in broad daylight and a television set, three pistols and one shotgun removed.

The trailer is owned by Bruce T. Barnes, and is located in the Lazy Mountain Trailer Court.

Although the burglary occurred during daylight hours, no one in the busy trailer court reported seeing the items taken.

One woman stated that she had noticed a car parked near the Barnes trailer sometime during the day, but could not remember the color or make.

Police suspect that the crime was committed by the same person who burglarized a home in Fire Lake and one in Goat Creek last week.

SURVEY FOR DIRECTORY TO BEGIN

CHUGIAK: The survey for the publication of the first annual Community Directory will begin next week, according to a spokesman for the Chugliak Ladies Club.

The Ladies Club has undertaken the publication of this much needed directory, and will begin with the taking of listings for the directory of businesses and services.

Teams will be contacting the local businesses during the period from May 7th through June 15th.

Following the compilation of this information, a door to door census will follow, giving what the group hopes will be the first accurate list of the number of residents in the Greater Chugliak Area.

In addition to the above information, the directory will contain a history of the community, listings of churches, clubs and other civic organizations and listings of parks, points of interest etc. A map of the area will be included. The directory is scheduled to be offered for sale by October of 1965.

Because of the many small home businesses which exist in the area, some may not be reached by the survey teams. Those not contacted who wish classified listings are asked to call either 674-5545, or 674-5667.

EAGLE RIVER LIBRARY BRANCH TO OPEN

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Branch Library will open officially on Saturday, May 1st.

This branch is to be located in the concrete block building which is located on the rise of ground to the rear and to the left of the Eagle River Shopping Center.

On the opening day, the library will be open from the hours of noon, until 6:00pm. The regular hours will be Wednesday evenings from 8pm until 9pm and on Saturdays, from 10am until 6:00pm.

Every borrower is required to fill out an application and only one card will be issued to each family. Children under 14 must be accompanied by a parent when applying for a card on opening day.

Mrs. Vernon Moore, who will be librarian for this branch stated that there are approximately 1500 books on the shelves at this time.

The other local library branch, which is located at Swanee Slopes in Old Chugliak, opened last week.

MEA SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE TO MEET

CHUGIAK: The scholarship committee for the Matanuska Electric Association will meet within the next few days to determine who will be awarded the annual scholarship for the Chugliak Area.

Members of this committee are Ed Willis, of Eagle River and Les Fetrow of Old Chugliak. Barney Sabo, Chugliak High School Principal will serve as third man of the committee.

MEA offers a \$500 college scholarship to a graduate from each of the four high schools within their service areas; Palmer, Wasilla, Chugliak, and this year Talkeetna.

This is the third year that a Chugliak student will be selected. Previous winners were Vickie Johnson of Fire Lake in 1963, and Eileen Newton of Birchwood in 1964.

CAP CADETS ENJOY FLIGHT

ELMENDORF: Twenty five Civil Air Patrol Cadets, from the Anchorage, Elmendorf and Chuglak Squadrons enjoyed an orientation flight last Saturday.

The cadets were taken aboard an Air Force C130 Hercules for a two and one half hour flight.

The route took the group over Whittier, Seward, across the Harding Field toward Homer, and then across the inlet and back toward Mt. McKinley. The plane flew between Mt. Foraker and Mt. McKinley, circling Mt. McKinley and then returning to the base.

USE THOSE NUISANCE PLANTS

PALMER:

Although dandelion and lambsquarter may be a nuisance for the folks planning a beautiful lawn and a profitable garden, says Myrtle Bang, district home demonstration agent, they are also an excellent food.

The young, tender leaves of the dandelion are used either raw or cooked as a green vegetable. These should be used in early spring because they become bitter later, Miss Bang advised.

Lambsquarter, which is most popular in this area, is found later in the summer, according to the home agent. Both wild greens should be cooked only a very short time in a small amount of water, she added.

A number of people freeze lambsquarter to be able to enjoy it in winter as well as summer, Miss Bang said.

"Each of these greens is a good source of vitamin C and vitamin A. Recent surveys show that many people in our area may not be getting enough of either vitamin C or A."

Fireweed is another wild plant that may be enjoyed in early spring, the home agent said.

A drinking glass, a cup, and a soft-drink bottle mean milk, water and soda-pop to a child. Such containers should not be used to hold fabric cleaners, solvents, gasoline, or other hazardous household chemicals.

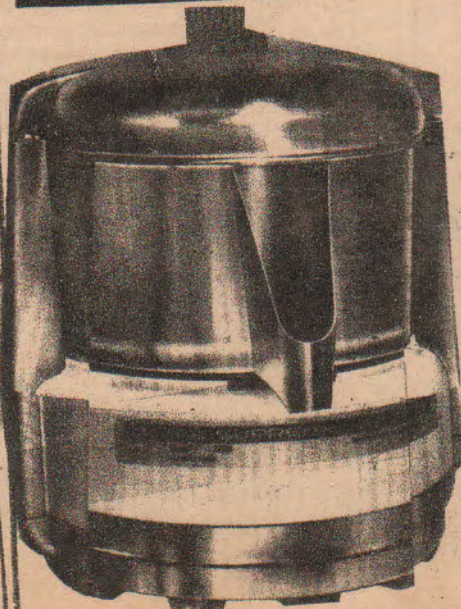

BANTAM TOWNSMEN HAS LARGE TURN OUT

EAGLE RIVER: The first annual AJBC City Championship Bowling Tournament, held last weekend at the Eagle River Bowl had a large turn out.

A total of 75 teams of Bantam, Junior and Senior Bowlers had entered, including seven local teams.

Trophies will be awarded at a Banquet to be held this Sunday, May 2nd at the Penguin Club in Anchorage. The banquet will begin at 1:00pm, and is open to all Junior Bowlers and friends or parents.

The charge for the banquet will be \$2.50 a plate for adults, and \$1.75 for children. All adults who plan to attend must be accompanied by a child.

TOURNAMENT TO DETERMINE LOCAL CHAMPS

EAGLE RIVER: A Singles Bowling Tournament, scheduled for the weekends of May 1st and 2nd and May 8th and 9th, will determine the man and woman who are the Champion bowlers of the local lanes. league bowlers only. Deadline for entering is midnight April 30th, with an entry fee of ten dollars per bowler. Prize money will be returned 100%, with separate prizes for men and women. The champion in each division will be awarded possession of the perpetual trophy for the following year. Dear Martha,

Could you advise use on how to select a good baby-sitter?

What is the best age for the sitter to be? Do you ever recommend hiring boys to baby sit? How about older women?

I am very anxious to have some advise on the subject. We have never left our children with anyone, but now I feel that I would like to get out once in a while. You seem like such a sensible person, my husband suggested we write to you for advise.

Dear Mrs. B.J.

The best age of a sitter varies depending on the person. Some twelve or even eleven year olds are very capable and dependable, while there are some in their late teens that I wouldn't trust to baby sit my dog. A boy can be a very capable baby sitter, but most boys are a little leery of very small babies. I would not recommend a boy for a sitter if your children are all girls.

A boy or girl with younger brothers or sisters is usually the best one to get for a sitter, that is with the exception of older women. An older person makes the best sitter of all, although they usually charge a little more.

I suggest you talk to some of your neighbors and ask them to recommend someone reliable.

Seniors attend East high who wish to apply must have their folders at the Chugiak High School office by the deadline.

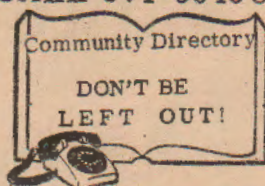

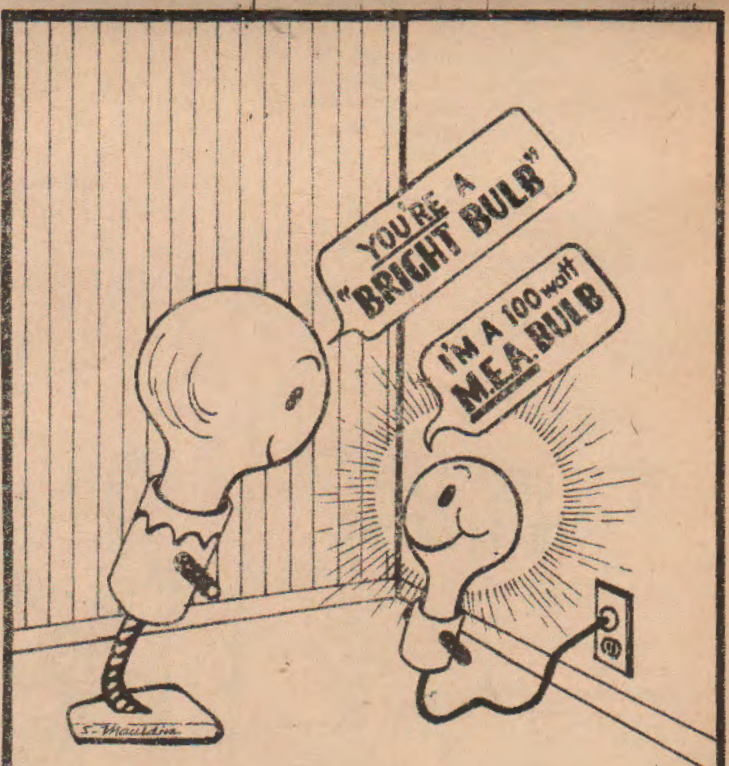

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON: Now that Congress has completed its FIRST 100 DAYS, newspaper reviews of its work are appearing. Among these was one in the Washington Post. This editorial praised the Congress, and concluded by saying: "To its great credit, the present Congress is legislating without resort to either the rubber stamp or blind obstructionism. It is giving the country, as President Johnson noted the other day, a fine example of representative government in action."

...Praise for another kind of fine example is certainly in order for three of my ALASKAN APPOINTEES TO SERVICE ACADEMIES. On the Dean's List at the United States Air Force Academy are James Nelson Roberts, Anchorage, and William A. Swick, III, Spenard; on the Dean's and Superintendent's List at the United Cooley, Anchorage.
...Formation of a representative council to plan for the distribution of funds expected from land claim judgement is one step closer to authorization, with Senate approval of the TLENGIT-HAIDA land claims amendment. I am hopeful for House action before the month ends.

...A sampling of responses to questionnaires received so far suggests that Alaskans agree with my recent votes in support of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 and the Medical Assistance for the elderly - Social Security bill.

...Lacking home rule for so many years, Alaskans will also agree, I think, with my support of HOME RULE FOR THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA. Together with about one hundred of my colleagues, I appealed this week to the House to make sure that home rule bills do get to the floor to permit debate and voting.

...Although Easter recess is upon the Congress, I'll be in the office every day but two. I have a two-day hearing on an eastern recreation area I must conduct as Chariman of the House Subcommittee on Parks and Recreation.

...VISITORS FROM ALASKA this week included Governor William A. Egan, Floyd Cuertin, and Bob Sharp, all of Juneau; Arthur E. Makholm, Fort Richardson; Lee Christensen, Douglas; Ed Lew Dischner and David J. Lee, both of Anchorage.

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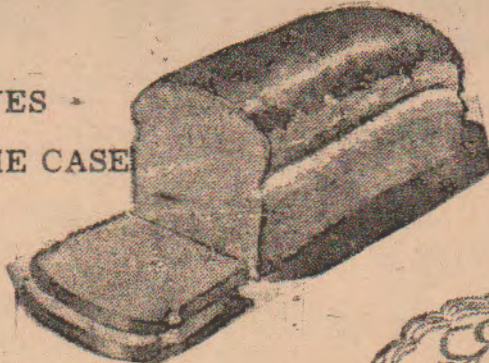
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
