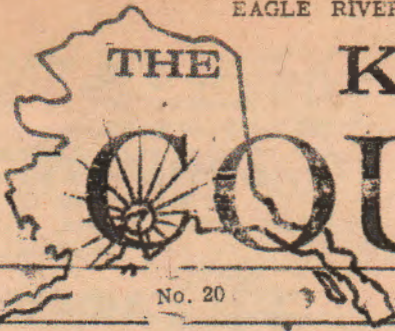

MEA OFFERS FUNDS TO LOCAL FIRE COS.

TALKEETNA: The Board of Directors of the Matanuska Electric Association, at a special meeting held at Talkeetna last week, voted to offer a degree of financial assistance to Volunteer Fire Companies within their service areas.

This assistance is to be in the form of a yearly contribution of \$60.00 to each duly organized Fire department, with said contribution to be noted as a credit to their electric account with MEA, against which the regular monthly bills will be charged until the credit is exhausted.

Self-billing consumers will read their meter on the last day of the month and report the meter reading to the MEA office by the 10th day of the succeeding month.

At such time as the \$60 credit is exhausted, payment of monthly bills will be due and payable as set forth in the rules and regulations of the Association.

MTA Buys Willow, Talkeetna Systems

PALMER: Acquisition by the Matanuska Telephone Association of the Willow and Talkeetna telephone systems was completed on April 29, Max Clements, manager of MTA, announced this week.

The local telephone cooperative purchased the two systems from the Trans-Alaska Telephone Company.

MTA will begin a program immediately to repair facilities and to improve service into these areas, Clements said.

He added that MTA will accept collect calls from persons living in the Willow and Talkeetna areas who have inquiries about service or who have line trouble to report.

MTA will start a survey shortly of both areas to determine their future needs, the manager said.

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON: Reliable reports here say that the President's MILITARY AND FEDERAL EMPLOYEE PAY PROPOSAL, expects this week, will include increases ranging from 3 to 5 percent, with the higher boosts going to military personnel. Persons present at the closed door sessions of the President's advisory panel on federal pay scales say, too, that Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara's strong recommendations for improved pay and benefits are deserving of much credit.

... Of much importance to the nation's future, but little publicized, is THE WATER QUALITY ACT OF 1965, now nearing the final stages of the legislative process. Differences between House and Senate

versions of the bill remain to be resolved, but both have the same purpose: to prevent the continued pollution of America's rivers and streams. Such pollution threatens not only our supply of clean water for the future, but impairment of needed outdoor recreation opportunities. Under this bill, the federal state partnership in construction of waste treatment facilities would be expanded.

... More efficient and effective planning for utilization of WATER RESOURCES IN ALASKA, including hydro-electric projects, is the objective of a bill I've introduced that will soon be taken up by a House subcommittee. This bill would remove the present ceiling of \$250,000 annually authorized for water resource planning in Alaska by the Department of Interior.

.... Hearings begin this week on the PUBLIC WORKS AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ACT OF 1965, a bill that would continue development loan programs of the Area Redevelopment Administration and would provide a grant program for necessary public facilities, such as streets and water facilities. The constructive goal of the bill -- the redevelopment of areas of economic stagnation -- is one which I am supporting.

MEA DEFINES POLICY FOR PAYMENT OF SERVICE FEES

TALKEETNA: The Matanuska Electric Association Board of Directors, at a special meeting held May 3rd at Talkeetna, defined the following policy concerning the payment of service fees.

Bills for electric service are due one the first of each month, delinquent on the 11th and a penalty of \$2.00 per month will be assessed on all delinquent bills.

In the cases where it is necessary for the Association to make a trip concerning delinquent accounts, a fee of five dollars will be charged for each trip made.

Dishonored or insufficient funds checks shall be treated in the following manner: Any account paid by such check will be considered as delinquent and subject to disconnect and all resultant penalties.

In addition to all applicable penalties, a fee of two dollars (\$2.00) will be charged for processing such a check. If a consumer has a dishonored check more than once in any given six month period, all future transactions shall be strictly on a cash basis or by certified check or money order.

A reconnection fee of five dollars will be made for opening an account for any consumer whose last previous service from the association was disconnected due to non-payment of account. Service will not be restored until all charges penalties and fees are paid.

A charge of thirty-five dollars (\$35) will be made for connecting an account outside of the regular working hours which are 8am to 5pm Monday through Friday, (holidays excepted.)

The effective date of this policy will be June 1, 1965.

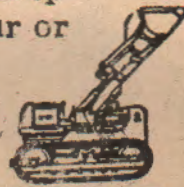

The number of membership card holders grows each time the Chugiak Public Library is open. Many people ask how much it costs, so it has been asked that it be stated clearly that the Chugiak Public Library is a free public library. There is no cost. Individuals can register, get their cards and take out two books for each member of a family at their first trip to the library. Only one card is issued to a family, and children under 14 must have their registration cards signed by a parent or guardian.

There is a good general selection of fiction, a World Book encyclopedia, and an Encyclopedia Americana. Non-fiction covers a variety of subjects, and there is a good supply of biographies. When an individual is unable to find a book they may want, a request for that specific type of reading may be submitted to the Loussac Library in Anchorage.

The library is open 3 to 6 o'clock on Wednesday afternoons and 6 to 9 o'clock on Friday evenings. These hours may be changed if a different time is found to be more convenient to the general public.

Cost of a rabies shot will be \$2.50 per animal. Dog licenses will be available.

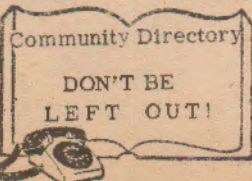
