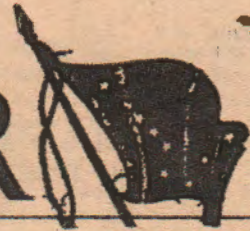

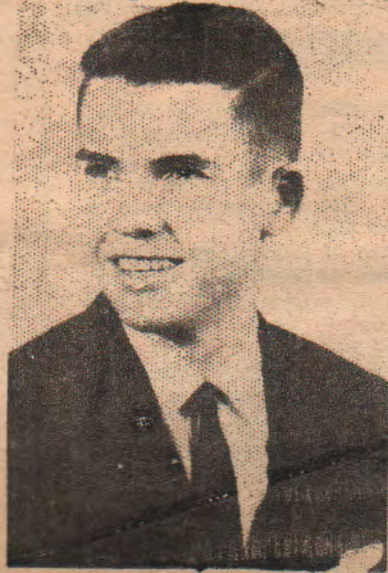

BIRCHWOOD MAN ARRESTED FOR ARSON

LOCAL STUDENTS EARN PLACE IN HONOR GROUP

ANCHORAGE: Seventy one Anchorage Area high school seniors have earned a place in the Honors Groups of East Anchorage, West Anchorage and Chugiak Area High Schools, it was announced today by Rick Arndt, Principal of East High School, Leslie Wells, Principal of West High School, and Bernard Sabo, Principal of Chugiak High School.

Membership in the Seniors Honor Group is determined by a combination of the total number of courses taken, plus the total grade points achieved in these courses. All the Honors Group students also must be adjudged as good school citizens.

The Honors Groups were initiated in the 1963-64 school year, as a means of giving recognition to the many top quality students who deserve it. The former system, of choosing only a valedictorian and a salutatorian, limited this recognition. Student speakers at the

LIONS TO BEGIN WORK ON SCOUT PARK

EAGLE RIVER: The local Lions Club will begin work on a Community Park, which will be dedicated to the Boy and Girl Scouts of the Greater Chugiak Area.

The park will be located on a 40 acre tract, which the Lions have acquired one mile up the Eagle River Road.

The first work party will be held on Sunday, May 23rd, from 8:00am until 4:00pm.

The Lions are calling for help from local residents, with particular emphasis on the families of Scouts.

Fathers and big brothers are needed, and are asked to bring along chain saws, axes, shovels picks etc.

Each family is asked to provide either 15 sandwiches or cookies, as lunch will be served the workers.

The Lions hope to prepare two campsites this Sunday. Each camp site will have rest room facilities, and outdoor fireplace for cooking.

Plans for future development of the park call for the drilling of a well, and preparing additional campsites.

CHUGIAK: The State Police have announced the arrest of a Birchwood man in the connection with the burning of two house trailers belonging to Grasse and Miller and which had been located at the site of the Sanitary Fill South of Eagle River.

Richard Kramer, who is in the Army and stationed at Ft. Richardson, was accused of having deliberately set fire to the trailers for the express purpose of getting the frames.

The first trailer was discovered burned on May 2nd. On the 3rd of May, an unsuccessful attempt was made to burn the second trailer. A final and successful attempt was made at burning the trailer on May 4th.

State Police then staked out the area, and last week, spotted Kramer removing the burned trailer frames from the site.

He was followed to his home in Birchwood where he was questioned, prior to being charged with third degree arson.

The trailers had been moved to the site of the Sanitary Fill by Grasse who holds the contract for operating the fill. They were to have served as an office and living quarters for a caretaker.

His visit to the local post will take place on May 30th, between 9:30am and 10:30am.

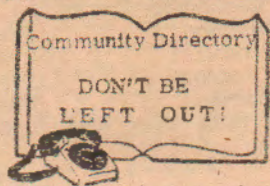

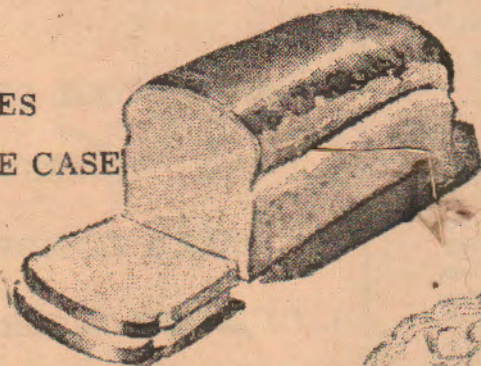

POLICE HAVE NO RECORD OF WRECK

PETERS CREEK: The State Police appeared to have no record of a one car accident which occurred on the Peters Creek Hill on Monday, May 10th at approximately 10:45pm.

The accident was reported by two local residents one of whom came upon the car involved only seconds after the accident happened. According to this witness, Bob Fleming (next col)

ing, of Swanee Slopes; the driver of the car, which was headed south on the Peters Creek side of the bridge appeared to lose control of the car and it rolled over into the ditch. Fleming said that the driver was being helped from the car by several other men who had apparently been driving in a car preceding him and had observed the accident. The victim appeared to be dazed, possibly in shock, Fleming said.

Fleming said that the other men appeared to be acquainted with the victim and were planning to take him to the 5040th Air Force Hospital. Fleming offered to notify the State Police, and returning to his home to do so.

A short time later, Ed Bellringer of Peters Creek came upon the wrecked car, and not seeing anyone around it, thought that perhaps someone might be trapped in the vehicle. He went to his home for a flashlight and at that time he also called the State Police in Anchorage and reported the wreck.

When he returned to the scene of the accident he found several men there who had just turned the car back on to its wheels. When he informed them that he had notified the police, and suggested that they not move the car until the Police arrived they immediately got into their own cars and drove off. Bellringer said that he then followed the cars until he was able to get the license numbers on them.

When he drove back to the wrecked car, he found a State Trooper inspecting it. He told the Trooper of the incident and gave him the numbers of the other cars.

Bellringer said the car appeared to be a late model Dodge Dart, with a Fort Richardson sticker on it. He said the vehicle appeared to be badly damaged with the top crushed in and the windshield broken.

When the Conrier called the State Police in an attempt to learn the name of the driver and his condition, they were informed that there was no record of the accident.

**TOO LATE TO CHANGE
TAX VALUATIONS**

ANCHORAGE: Last minute demands by borough residents that the valuation of their property be changed has caused the Borough Assessor to make the following appeal to the Borough Assembly.

"Now that it is time for the tax payer to pay their statements, we are having many requests to change the valuations. According to the law, we are to send notices of assessed valuations to the taxpayers and allow them 30 days in which to protest. We then hold a Board of Equalization hearing and finalize the roll. The roll is then certified and no changes are to be made after that time.

As always happens, many persons completely disregard the notices and then, during payment time, they ask us to change valuations that they think are in error.

In some cases we have made a mistake in valuations either in our figuring or in data processing. According to the law, I cannot change these figures even if they are wrong.

It is the taxpayers responsibility to inform the assessor if he has made a mistake.

It will be appreciated if the Assembly could direct me as to how to handle these cases."

Assemblyman Glenn Briggs, from section one, reminded residents that the schedule and procedure for tax-process is stated on the reverse side of the assessment notices.

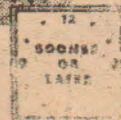

high school commencement ceremonies will be chosen by the Honors Groups from their members.

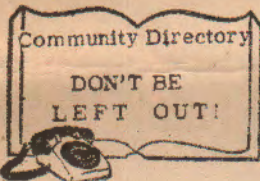
Honors groups members from the Chugiak Area High School are; Lora Lee Pierson, Diann Dickey and Everett Clifton Chron.

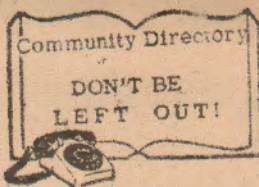
The last half of the taxes will become delinquent on August 15th.

BOROUGH ASSEMBLY PASSES "JUNK YARD" ORDINANCE

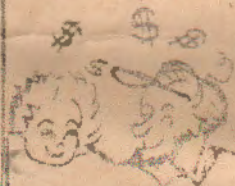
ANCHORAGE: The GAAB Assembly has passed an emergency ordinance effective on passage to regulate and control junk yards and accumulations of junk.

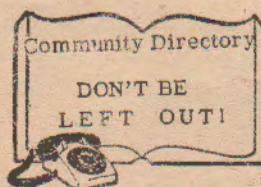

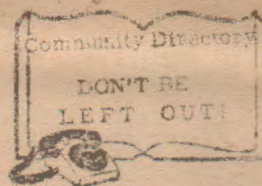
