LOCAL YOUTH GETS AFWC AWARD

ANCHORAGE: The Chugiak Ladies Club has received word from the Scholarship Committee of the Alaska Federation of Women's Clubs that their candidate was chosen to receive the Mildred Herriman scholarship.

The \$250 award will go to Jerry Rankin of Eagle River, who's name was submitted by the local club in competition with candidates from Women's Club affiliates throughout the entire state.

Jerry, who graduated from East Anchorage High School this spring, is planning to attend Purdue University this fall.

In addition to his high grades, Jerry impressed the judges with his being the State winner in the Science Fair, held at Alaska Methodist University earlier this year.

Jerry is the son of James Rankin of Eagle River. He also was awarded a \$300 scholarship which will apply toward his transportation. He is working this summer at North-east Cape, near St. Lawrence Island.

REMINDER OF PHONE CHANGE

ANCHORAGE: Local residents are reminded that the change over of Anchorage Phone system to all numerical dialing will effect local phoning procedures.

Beginning on the cut-over date of June 19th, Anchorage may be called from the Greater Chugiak Area by dialing the number which appears in the new phone book directly. Also, it will be possible to call either of the local exchanges from Anchorage by direct dialing.

In the past it was necessary to dial an ACS operator and ask for the number to be called.

This convenience will be slightly spoiled by the fact that local residents will lose the privilege of calling either Fort Richardson or Elmendorf Air Force Base toll free.

As of the cut-over date, it will be necessary to dial Long Distance (110) to call either of the two military bases. The toll charge for these calls will be forth cents for the first three minutes for station calls with a ten cent charge for each additional minute, or eighty cents for the first three minutes for person to person calls with ten cents for each additional minute.

CHUGIAK TEACHER PERMANENTLY DISABLED AS RESULT OF ACCIDENT

EDMONTON: Word from the University Hospital in Edmonton Alberta, is that Miss Trudi Souder, Chugiak Grade School teacher, who was involved in an accident near Haines last week, will be permanently disabled as a result of her injuries.

Miss Souder suffered a broken neck and a possible broken back when she was thrown from her car. Miss Souder had been driving back to her home in Boulder Colorado, and was hurrying to try to make the ferry when a wheel went off the road and onto the soft gravel of the shoulder. She lost control of the car, and was thrown clear of the vehicle which rolled over and over and was badly wrecked.

A Mrs. Sunde, a school teacher from Sitka, who came along immediately after the accident stayed

HERE AND THERE

A thousand persons a week are being in car accidents. Who cares?

Really, it is sometime difficult to believe that anyone cares. In a very real sense, most of our automobile accidents are caused by the driver -- not the weather, nor road conditions, not mechanical failure -- just the driver. Until the driver develops a conscience, we'll mow them down by the thousands every year. Who cares?

Many studies and surveys have been made and are being made. All of them are of some value, but mainly these efforts tell what happened: car crossed the center line, excess speed, following too close, and so on. What the studies haven't yet made clear is why did the driver veer too much to his left or to his right, go to sleep at the wheel, fail to apply brakes within a safe margin, yield the right of way. We know, of course, that drivers become sleepy, that they overdrive, that there is

something as driving hypnosis; but the missing element is why drivers allow themselves to reach these dangerous conditions.

My personal belief, for a long time, has been that the basic ingredient of safe driving is proper attitude -- call it a driving philosophy, if you like. Knowledge of road conditions, weather factors, laws, mechanical capabilities may improve one's driving and are certainly important, but there is no guarantee that such knowledge will make a safe driver.

For example, our speed limits in our area are pretty close to the safe limits. Yet, many drivers habitually exceed the speed limits by many miles per hour.

An accident is bad, and becomes tragic when there is injury or fatality. It is more tragic when the victims, as so often is the case, are actually victims of someone else's careless driving. And this means that as long as there is a single driver with the wrong attitude, there will be accidents.

WOOD PRESERVERS ADD LIFE

PALMER: Alaskans can add life to wooden homes and other buildings by using suitable wood preservers, Leland Cads, district Extension Agent, said this week.

A number of chemicals are recommended for dry and green timber, poles and posts.

Penta is the best treatment for dry wood. Chromated zinc chlorides, copper sulphate and others can be used for green wood.

A bulletin on the topic entitled "Preserving Wood for Alaska's Farms and Homes" is available at the Extension office.

It was authored by Ivan Branton, of the Alaska Agricultural Experiment Station at Palmer.

Since wood preserving chemicals are poisonous, caution must be exercised in their use.

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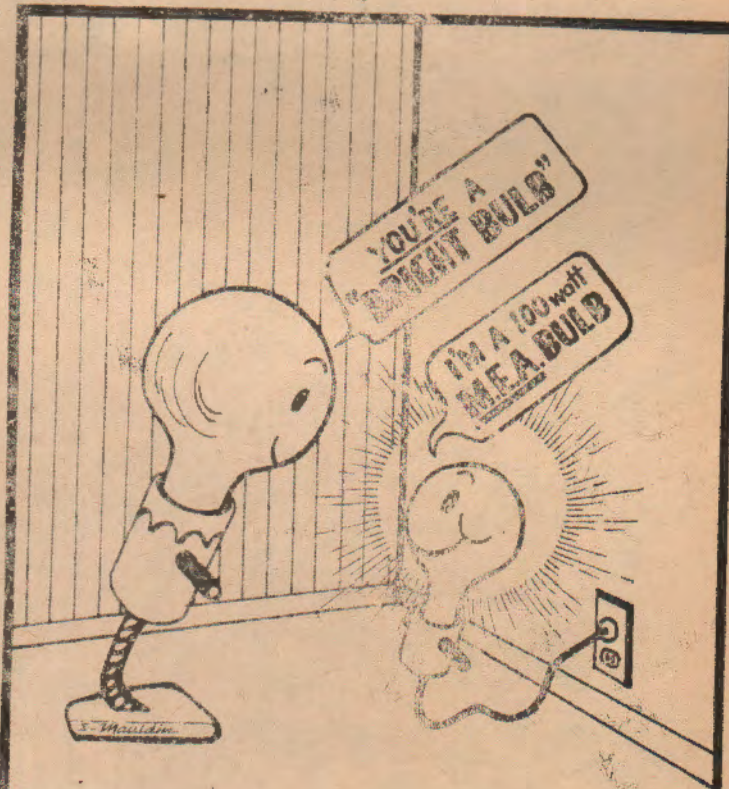

THIS WEEK IN
WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON: The U.S. Department of State informs me that the Executive Branch "warmly supports a proposed lease of land northeast of Fairbanks to the European Space Research Organization, assuming that arrangements satisfactory to the State of Alaska can be worked out. ESRO, a non-commercial space research organization, desires to construct a satellite telemetry command station at this site.


...An estimated \$44 million would be spend in fiscal 1966 for military construction in Alaska under an authorization bill adopted by voice vote in the House of Representatives this week. Major expenditures would go for construction at Adak, Elmendorf and Ellsner Air Force bases, Barrow and for an Army pipeline between Whittier and Anchorage. Other expenditures would go for construction at 24 other sites in the state.

...I am hopeful of committee action this month on a bill I have introduced to promote the modernization and expansion of our domestic merchant marien and fishing fleet. Under this legislation, also sponsored by Senator Bartlett in the Senate, vessel owners would be able to contract with the Government to put certain of their income into a fund in exchange for deferment of taxes thereon, with the right to later withdraw such deposit for use in purchasing new vessels.

...Shipment of vehicles of military personnel in Alaska would be permitted via highway carrier, the Alaska Ferry system, ship or railcar barges under a bill I introduced this week. Existing law allows such shipment at government expense to be by sea-going vessels only.

...VISITORS FROM ALASKA this week included Alaska's two Presidential scholars, Lynn Kirkpatrick, Elmendorf Air Force Base, and Bruce L. Heflinger, Fairbanks, Jack Hermle and Jack Clugreath, both of Juneau.

She had been a second grade teacher at the Chugiak school.

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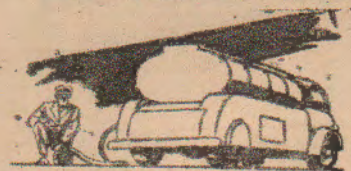
