

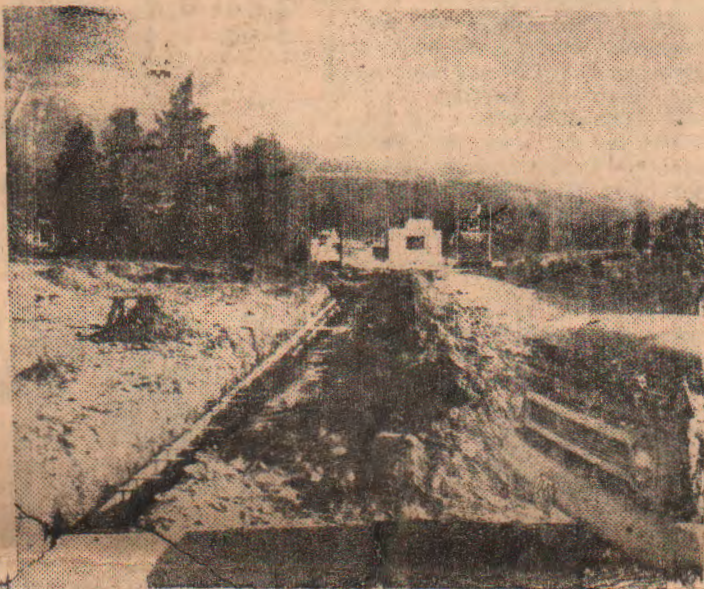

HEAD START PROGRAM TO BEGIN



WORK NOW UNDER WAY ON NEW ADDITION
TO THE EAGLE RIVER SHOPPING CENTER.

Borough Takes Over Areawide Health

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Health Council met Monday night with representatives of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough Health District, which will take over area health activities as of July 1st.

Meeting with the local group, were Mrs. Arnie Beltz, and Buelah Olgurson, both of the newly organized health district.

It was learned that well child clinics will continue to be held in this area. At present plans call for the clinics to be held on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays as in the past. The next well baby clinic will take place on July 14th. The place where the clinic will be held will be announced. The GAAB Health offices will be moved into the new quarters which they will share with the Chugiak Public Library.

At present a part time Public Health Nurse will be assigned to this area, with plans for a full time nurse in September.

Both Mrs. Beltz and Mrs. Olgurson praised the efforts of local Assemblyman Glenn Briggs for his efforts in behalf of this area. They credited him with the fact that the well child clinics would continue uninterrupted.

Shopping Center Expansion Starts

EAGLE RIVER: Expansion of the Eagle River Shopping Center began this week, with the project to be completed as rapidly as possible.

The new addition will house a number of new business to the community, as well as providing more space for some of the older ones.

Among the older establishments which will be housed in the new addition, will be the Eagle River Barber Shop, and the Miss Alaskan Shop, which is presently located in a house trailer on the shopping center property.

The Pegge Lee Bakery will be expanding into enlarged quarters.

Among the new businesses will be a branch office of Clary Associates, Insurance; a branch of the First National Bank of Anchorage and a Gun Shop. There are still two units of the new addition which have not been committed, but Glenn Briggs, spokesman for the shopping center corporation stated that transactions for the leasing of these are underway at the present time.

CHUGIAK: "Operation Head-Start" will begin at the Chugiak Grade School next week, with registration to take place between 9:00am and 1:00pm on Tuesday, July 6th.

All students are to report to their classes at 1:00pm on the 6th, and will be dismissed at 2:00pm. Students who pre-registered earlier in the summer need not report until 1:00pm.

Regular classes will begin at 8:30am on Wednesday, July 7th, and will be dismissed at 2:00pm.

The classes will be held on a five day week basis, from 8:30am until 2:00pm from July 7th until August 27th. A free lunch will be served each day, however parents must make their own transportation arrangements for their children.

To be eligible to participate in the Head-Start program, children must be six years of age or to reach their sixth birthday on or before November 1st, 1965. Birth certificate or other proof of age must be presented at time of registration.

There will be three classes in the head start program, with one teacher and one teachers-aid assigned to each class. Teachers will be Mrs. Ann Riordon, Mrs. Bob Fleming and Mrs. Theron McGrew. Teachers-aids will be Mrs. Charles Carter, Mrs. Fred Hutchison and Miss Gwen McGrew.

The program will be conducted along the lines of an ungraded kindergarten, with emphasis on first hand experiences. A day camping program at Russian Jack Springs near Anchorage is planned for sometime this summer.

Arrangements will be made for physical examinations for all students sometime during the summer.

The Eagle River School will offer a regular pre-school kindergarten which will not be a part of the Head-Start program. This will begin on July 12th, with detailed information to be published in next week's Courier.

It was with varied emotions that I recently read of an eighty one year old gentleman taking unto himself a bride of ninety one. It is easy to predict that this union will last until death do part. This is not quite a recommendation to wait to the age of the couple mentioned above, but it is interesting to note that the older the partners at the time of marriage, the more likely for a successful marriage.

The reverse of this is also true; the younger age at which one marries, the less likely is the marriage to succeed. For example, if neither person has reached twenty, their marriage has hardly more than one chance out of four to be successful. If the youngsters are much younger than twenty, chances get even poorer. Of course, we all know youthful marriages that are highly satisfactory, but the tragic fact remains that successful marriages at this tender

age are proportionately few. We also know of older couples who become divorced, but the divorce rate goes down considerably and rapidly with age. Even when marriage occurred when both were between the ages of twenty one and twenty five, the divorce rate is only about six percent - somewhat down from the over 20% when under twenty years. When the marriage ages are thirty one and over, the divorce rate goes down to something like 2%.

The reason for the high failure rate of youthful marriages is basically simple. It is just that the participants have not yet developed the maturity required to achieve a successful marriage. Marriage is simply not a "they lived happily ever after" sort of affair.

There's rent to pay, groceries to buy, and usually, sooner or later there's a baby that insists on his being fed at two in the morning, (not to mention diapers to wash all the time.) To say the least,

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON: The House Civil Service subcommittee hasn't approved a GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEE pay bill yet, but reports are that when it is approved, it will provide for more than the 3 percent recommended by the President. Subcommittee members have indicated that they favor a raise of 5 or 6 percent, and several of them predict that such an increase will be approved by the Congress.

... I expect House approval this week of the HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT ACT, a bill that would extend a number of programs such as public housing, urban renewal, and FHA-insured loans, and would establish a program of rent-supplements, and grants for community beautification for acquisition of developed land for local parks.

The rent-supplement proposal, a plan to aid low-income families in obtaining decent private housing through partial payment of their rent by the Federal government, has generated much controversy and there's a possibility it might be stricken from the bill.

... A NATIONAL FOUNDATION ON THE ARTS AND HUMANITIES would be established under a bill (of which I was sponsor) approved this week by the House Special Subcommittee on Labor. The bill would set up a \$10 million program of scholarships and fellowships in the arts and humanities.

... Direct Federal SCHOLARSHIPS FOR COLLEGE STUDENTS would be available under the Aid to Higher Education bill reported this week by the House Education and Labor Committee. Cost of this new program this year would be \$64.4 million. The bill also includes subsidies for interest on student loans, funds

for college construction, and funds for general assistance to colleges and universities.

ANCHORAGE: Three local amateur radio operators participated in the recent Field Day exercise conducted by the Northland Amateur Radio Club of Anchorage (NARC), at its site on the Arctic Valley Ski Bowl Road above Fort Richardson. Local "hams" were John Steeby of Birchwood, WL7FKF, Steve Swanson of Old Chugiak, WL7FKV, and Paul Fillmore Jr. of Eagle River, WL7FCK.

Steeby and Swanson are recent graduates of the Navy MARS course supervised by John Trent, KL7DG, an employee of the Anchorage office of Federal Communications Commission.

NARC is a club desinged to foster interest in amateur radio; however holders of General tickets are also invited to become members.

The next meeting of the Club is scheduled for Tuesday, July 13th, at 7:00p.m., at the National Guard Armory, near International Airport.

EROSION CONTROL PROJECT UNDERWAY AT EAGLE RIVER

EAGLE RIVER: An erosion control project at the point where Meadow Creek parallels the Glenn Highway at Eagle River is currently underway.

This \$30,000 project is under contract to the Ramstad Construction Company, and calls for straightening the channel and lining it with riprap.

Two access approaches are being improved with double pipe culverts.

The main purpose of the project is to protect the embankment and the highway fill from being weakened by the erosion of the creek.
