


## AD START PROGRAM TO BEGIN

### **Shopping Center Expansion** Starts

EAGLE RIVER: Expansion of the EAGLE RIVER: Expansion of the Eagle River Shopping Center began this week, with the project to be completed as rapidly as possible. The new addition will house a num-ber of new business to the commun-

ity, as well as providing more space for some of the older ones.

Among the older establishments which will be housed in the new addition, will be the Eagle River Barber Shop, and the Miss Alas-kan Shop, which is presently loc-ated in a house trailer on the shopping center property.

The Pegge Lee Bakery will be expanding into enlarged quarters. Among the new businesses will

a branch office of Clary As-tates, Insurance; a branch o. be sociates. the First National Bank of Anchorage and a Gun Shop. There are still two units of the new addition which have not been committed, but Gienn Briggs, spokesman for the shopping center corporation stated that trans-actions for the leasing of these are underway at the present time.

CHUGLAK: "Operation Head-Start" CHUGIAK: "Operation Head-Start" will begin at the Chugiak Grade School next week, with registrat-ion to take place between 9:00am and 1:00pm on Tuesday, July 6th. All students are to report to their classes at 1:00pm on the 6th, and will be dismissed at 2:00pm.

Students who pre-registered earlier in the summer need not re-port until 1:00pm.

Regular classes will begin at 8:30am on Wednesday, July 7th, and will be dismissed at 2:00pm. The classes will be held on a five day week basis, from 8:30am until 2:00pm from July 7th until August 27th. A free lunch will be served each day, however parents must make their own transportat-ion arrangements for their children

To be eligible to participate in the Head-Start program, children must be six years of age or to reach their sixth birthday on or before November 1st, 1965. Birth cert-ificate or other proof of age must be presented at time of registration.

There will be three classes in the head start program, with one teacher and one teachers-aid assigned to each class. Teachers will be Mrs. Ann Riordon, Mrs. Bob Fleming and Mrs. Theron McGrew. Teachers-aids will be Mrs. Charles Carter, Mrs Fred Hutchison and Miss Gwer McGrew.

Carter, Mrs Fred Hutchison and Miss Gwen McGrew. The program will be conducted al-ong the lines of an ungraded kinder-garten, with emphasis on first hand experiences. A day camping pro-gram at Russian Jack Springs near Anchorage is planned for somethine this summer.

Arrangements will be made for physical examinations for all stu-dents sometime during the summer. The Eagle River School will offer

a regular pre-school kindergarten which will not be a part of the Head-Start program. This will begin on July 12th, with detailed in-formation to be published in next week's Courier.



not quite a recommendation to wait to the age of the couple mentioned ab-ove, but it is interesting to note that the older the partners at the time of marriage, the more likely for a successful marriage. The reverse of this is also true; the younger age at which one mar-ries, the less likely is the marriage to succeed. For example, if meither person has reached twenty, their marriage has hardly more than one chance out of four to be successful. If the youngster s are much yonger than twenty, chances get even poorthan twenty, chances get even poor-er. Of course, we all know youthful marriages that are highly satisfactory, but the tragic fact remains that successful marriages at this tender

age are porportionately few. We also know of older couples who become divorced, but the divorce rate goes down considerably and rapidly with age. Even when marriage occurred when both were between the ages of twenty one and twenty five, the divorce rate is only about sixpercent orce rate is only about sixpercent-somewhat down from the over 20% when under twenty years. When the marriage ages are thirty one and over, the divorce rate goes down to something like 2%. The reason for the high failure heat of youthful marriages is basically simple. It is just that the participants have not yet developed the maturity required to achieve a successful marriage. Marriage is

#### DOG-NAPPERS RELEASE VICTIM


PETERS CREEK: The victim of a dog-napper was released this week, after being taken from her owner, George Smith of Peters Creek.

#### THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON By Ralph J. Rivers, M.C.

WASHINGTON: The House Civil Service subcommittee hasin't ap-proved a GOVERNMENT EMPLOY-EE pay bill yet, but reports are that when it is approved, it will provide for more than the 3 percent recommended by the President, Subcommittee members have indicated that they favor a raise of 5 or 6 percent, and several of them perdict that such an increase will be approved by the Congress.

.... I expect House approval this week of the HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT ACT, a bill that would extend a number of programs would extend a number of programs such as public housing, urban ren-ewal, and FHA-insured loans, and would establish a program of rent-supplements, and grants for com-munity beautification for acquisition of developed land for local parks

of developed land for local parks. The rent-supplement proposal, a plan to ald low-income families in obtaining decent private housing through partial payment of their rent by the Federal government, has generated much controversy and there's a possibility it might be stricken from the bill.

....A NATIONAL FOUNDATION ON THE ARTS AND HUMANITIES would be established under a bill(of which I was sponsor) approved this week by the House Special Subcommittee on Labor. The biH would set up on Labor. The bill would set up a \$10 million program of scholar-ships and fellowships in the arts and humanities.

..., Direct Federal SCHOLARSHIPS FOR COLLEGE STUDENTS would be available under the Aid to Higher Education bill reported this week by the House Education and Labor Committee. Cost of this new pro-gram this year would be \$64.4 mil-lion. The bill also includes subsidies for interest on student loans, funds




