Ambulance Drive Nears Goal

EAGLE RIVER: The Lions Club Sponsored Drive to purchase a new Ambulance for the Eagle River Fire Company is very near its goal, according to Lions First Vice President, Carrol Dodd.

Dodd said that the Spaghetti Feed netted approximately \$300 on Friday night, and around \$600 on Saturday night. He also said that around \$800 in cash donations were taken in during the two days that the Ambulance was parked in front of the Eagle River Shopping Center. He said that the amount of pledges has not yet been computed, but is confident that the goal will soon be reached.

The Ambulance is being purchased to replace the one which has been in use until it recently broke down.

The new vehicle is a brand new Dodge Sportsman Van. It has been equipped with all emergency equipment, including stretcher, resuscitator, revolving beacons and siren.

Other fund raising projects which are being employed are a contest to name the new ambulance. Each

Cyclist Run Off Road By Car

PETERS CREEK: A Fourteen year old Anchorage boy was uninjured following what appeared a deliberate effort on the part of a motorist to run him off the road.

Keith Sheldon Harker told the State Police that he and another boy, Terry Mike Fitzpatrick (15) also of Anchorage were riding their motor cycles on the Glenn Highway near mile 22 1/2 when they attempted to pass this car. Harker said that they had made several unsuccessful attempt to pass before it appeared that they would be able to do so. Harker had just drawn abreast of the car when the driver appeared to deliberately move over into the passing lane forcing Harker's cycle off the road and into the ditch. Young Fitzpatrick managed to avoid being forced off the road. The State Police said the witness confirmed the story that the attempt to force the boy off the road appeared to be deliberate.

The driver of the car, Gene Merle Rock, a tourist from California who is presently residing at the Martin Arms Apartments in Anchorage was cited for negligent driving.

EKLUNTA LAKE: A twenty one year old college youth was seriously injured when he fell down a 100 to 150 foot cliff near the Eklutna Glacier last Saturday.

James H. McLendon, of Alaska Methodist University was rescued by helicopter and is presently in Providence Hospital in serious condition suffering from internal injuries.

The helicopter was dispatched by the Rescue Coordination Center at Elmendorf. The copter first landed at the Half Way House at mile 23, where they picked up a woman companion of McLendon who had brought out the word of the accident. She directed them to the scene, where they discovered that because of the rugged terrain it would be impossible to land near the injured man. He was lifted with a hoist to the higher level where the helicopter had landed.

LIBRARY BROKEN INTO

EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Branch Library was broken into sometime over the weekend and a \$1.00 in cash, a stamp pad and a rubber date stamp taken.

Entrance was gained by breaking out a panel in the wooden door.

State Police were notified and are investigating.

Planning now would ensure a certain flexibility with retention of individuality. And, at this present stage, our own ideas would receive important consideration. Planning will come, in some form - the other - now, five years from now, or ten. If delayed very long, it will become a purely professional job, somewhat insensitive to personalities, bordering on patchwork, and inadequate because it came too late.

It seems to me that is a sad commentary that our most important national holiday has become hardly more than the occasion for a debate as to whether fireworks are to remain legal. When we finally settle the pyrotechnical situation, maybe we can again remember what happened back in 1776. Such an observation might have been somewhat more timely a couple of weeks ago, but the bursting of 88's cherry bombs etc., caused me to enter a shall of noncommunication.

There is probably a large map in some agency's office, showing the Greater Chugiak Area outlined in a particular color, with heavy lines indicating the major highway. There is probably a portion outlined or shaded indicating businesses; other colored portions indicating agriculture or residential usage. At the top of the map, or maybe at the bottom, is the title: MASTER PLAN.

What is such a map to look like a few years from now? Is it to show what has haphazardly occurred, or will it depict the following of an intelligently projected and directed plan? What is being suggested is that a plan for the orderly growth of our community is needed now.

Because of its geographical complexion, this area is extremely vulnerable to about as disorderly, confused and irremedial situation as could possibly be imagined. Our area has the basic makings of a "ribbon city" - principal growth along one major traffic artery. However, the ribbon is already being widened and elaborated. Situations will develop soon that will be to political and economic sensitive to allow adjustment.

We have a beautiful, wonderful area. And we are at the stage in our growth when we can ill afford to delay the formation of guidelines to steer the overall development of our future growth.

LOCAL SCOUTS TO COMPETE IN "CUBMOBILE DERBY"

EAGLE RIVER: Cub Scouts of Pack 6 will compete in a "Cubmobile Derby" at 2:00pm on Sunday July 18th.

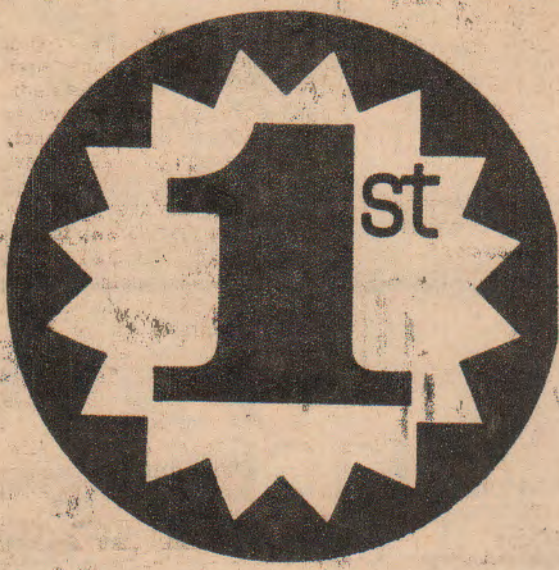

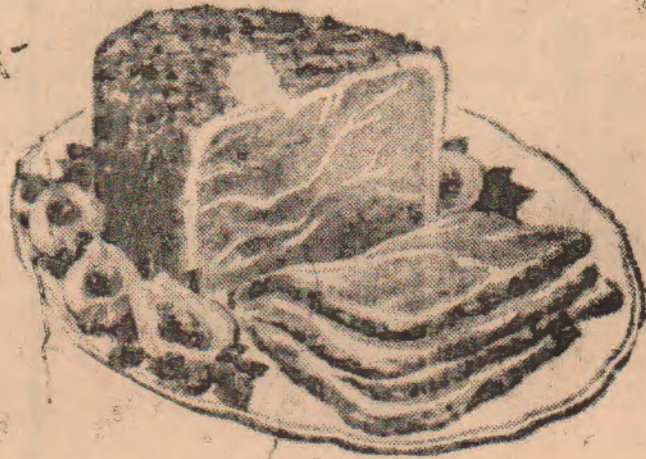

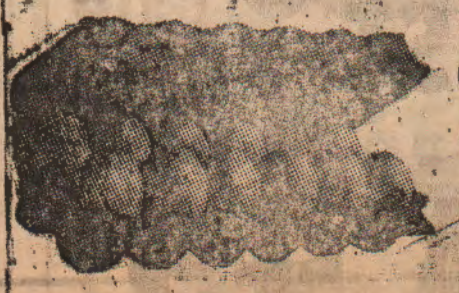

YOUTH REPORTS
SIGHTING BEAR

OLD CHUGIAK: The sighting of a brown bear in the vicinity of his home was reported to the Knik Arm Courier by nine year old Mike Buxton of Old Chuglak.

Mike said that he had been playing not far from his home and had climbed to the top of a tree there. While in the tree he said he saw a brown bear walking through the underbrush near the tree.

He kept quiet and the bear did not appear to notice him. He said the bear continued walking away and disappeared.

This is the second report of brown bears in the Greater Chuglak Area this summer. Earlier in the year, two year old cubs were shot in the Peters Creek Area by a local resident.

Mike is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ermin Buxton of mile 18. The Buxtons operate the Chuglak Gardens.

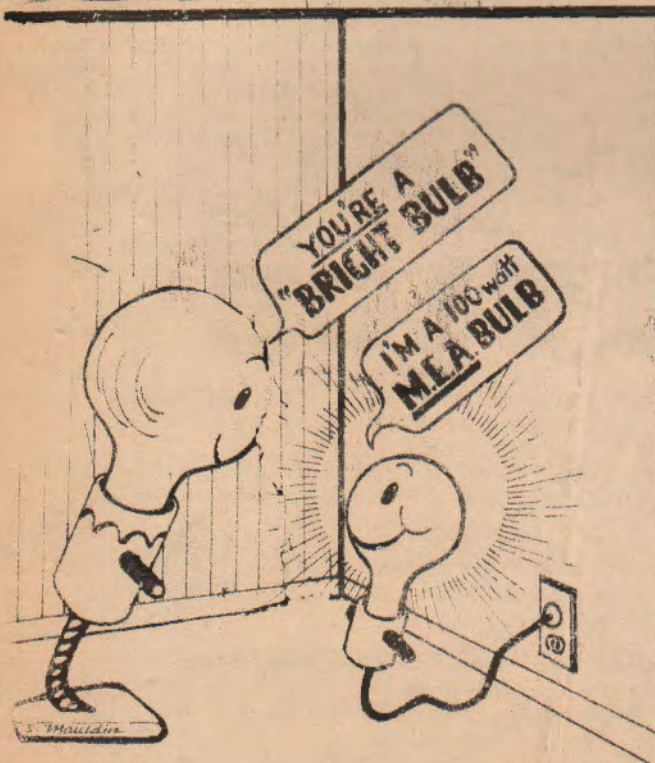

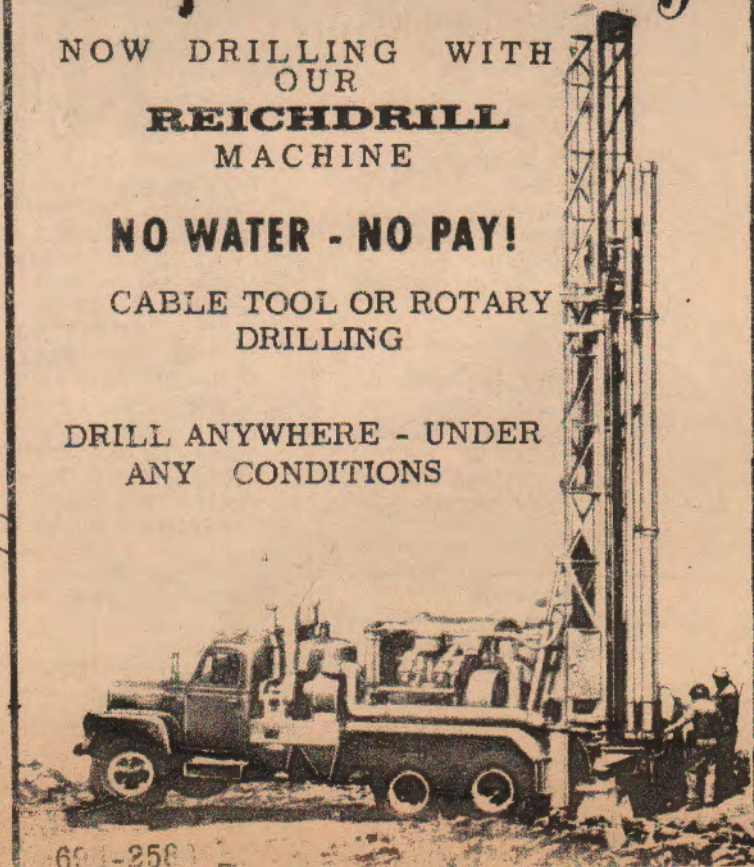
