EAGLE RIVER: The Eagle River Lions Club is offering a cash prize of \$100 in their Ambulance naming contest.

This contest is being held in conjunction with the drive to raise funds to pay for a new ambulance for the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company.

Anyone is eligible to enter, the condition being that they donate one dollar or more to the drive, and fill out one of the cards such as the one printed on page 4 of this issue of the Courier.

The card along with the money or the pledge to pay may be mailed to the Lions Club, Eagle River Alaska, or may be left at the Eagle River Electronics Store at mile 14 1/2.

Some names that have already been suggested are: "The White Flash," "The White Lightning," "White 1", "Chuga-lug-Charley", and "The Eager Eagle."

EKLUTNA: Tragedy struck the family of an unemployed drayline operator last Friday, when fire completely destroyed their converted camper bus.

The vehicle belonged to J.C. Prestridge, who had recently come to Alaska with his family from Lake Charles Louisiana.

According to State Police, the Prestridge family had been camped at the Eagle River Camp Ground, when they were forced to leave because of a new ruling which limited stays at public campgrounds to two weeks.

Prestridge said that they were enroute to Tok, where he had been told he might find work. The bus had stalled at approximately mile 31, and he pulled over to the side of the road to clean out the gas lines. When he attempted to restart the engine, it backfired, igniting the vehicle. The converted camper had originally been a Brill city transit-type bus. In the vehicle at the time was Mr. Prestridge and his son, Clyde. Mrs. Prestridge, and an older daughter Bonita were driving two other cars belonging to the Prestridge family and had stopped beside the stalled bus.

Prestridge said that he was afraid to attempt to salvage anything from the bus, because there was a fifty gallon drum of gasoline tied to the top and he was afraid it might explode. In addition to this gas barrel, there was a twenty gallon gas tank beneath the bus and a thirty gallon propane tank on the side.

The State police were called by a passing motorist who mistakenly reported that a Greyhound bus had run off the road and was burning.

The State Police called both local Fire Companies, and the Eagle River Fire Company responded.

Traffic was held up for forty five minutes and the area closed as streams of fire shot across the highway every time the pressure valve on the propane tank would release the gas.

The Prestridge family had come to Alaska two weeks ago, they said. They had converted the bus to a camper last year and driven it up from Lake Charles. The bus had been stored at the home of friends in Wasilla this past winter. The Prestridges are currently staying with these friends in Wasilla.

The fire broke out at approximately 4:00pm on Friday.

While poetry with an Alaska reference is preferred, no really fine poem will be excluded.

All poems must be in by October 18, 1965 as the volume must be in the publisher's hands by January 3, 1966.

TRY THIS UNUSUAL SALMON RECIPE -

This is the season when all true Alaskans think they have to go out and bring home some fish. The question common to many homemakers is: What to do with them?

Salmon is the common product brought triumphantly home by the family fisherman. Sometimes an awful lot of salmon too. Here's one recipe that's a little different, taken from the Cooperative Extension Service bulletin, "Seafood Recipes":

SALMON PUDDING - NORWEGIAN STYLE

- 1 1/2 pounds salmon
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 2 cups milk
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 cup butter or other fat melted

Remove skin and bones from salmon; grind enough to make 2 cups. Place fish, salt and nutmeg in large bowl and beat 10 minutes with an electric beater. Add butter slowly and continue beating. Add milk, 1/2 cup at a time, beating after each addition. Beat 15 minutes after final addition and place in a well-greased casserole. Place in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven, 350° F., for 1 1/2 hours or until it tests done as for custard. Serve hot. Serves 6.

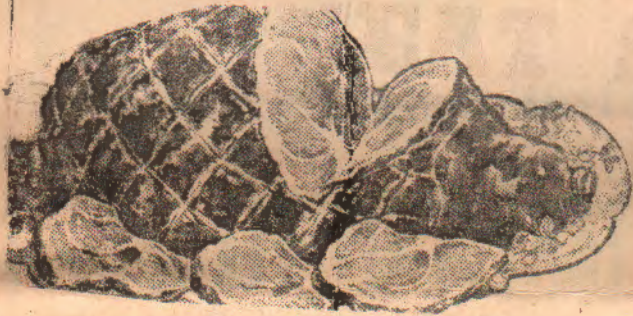

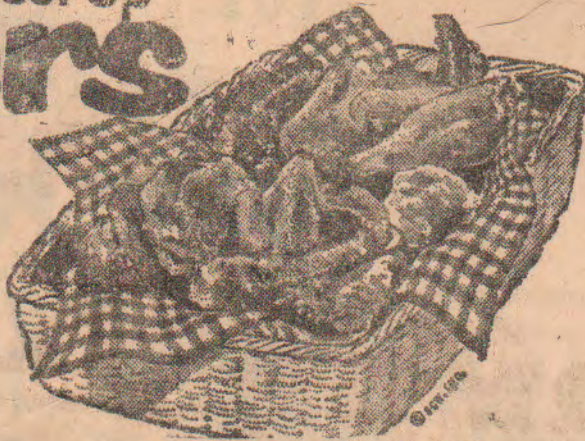

**BIRCHWOOD LODGE
DEDICATED**

BIRCHWOOD: Approximately one year ago, ground was broken for the new Lodge at Birchwood Methodist Camp.

On Sunday, July 11, 1965, nearly two hundred persons participated in the dedication of the completed Lodge.

Rev. Leo C. Cramer, former pastor of the Chugiak Methodist Church, who is now pastor of the Anchor Park Church, spoke briefly on "Birchwood Camp - Then and Now."

He said that when the homestead was purchased, it consisted of one building known as the "Trapper's Cabin," 160 acres of land, and bears, moose and mosquitoes. "Today we have added people! In 1959 there was no road, and no truck - the first year the camp was opened one small garden tractor was used to haul all the camp equipment into the area. The "Trapper's Cabin" (also known as "Uncle Tom's Cabin") was used as the kitchen. The following year, a road was put in, and the camp truck, better known as "Old Spot," was purchased. It was suggested by one camp family that when a new truck is eventually purchased, "Old Spot" should be enshrined forever at Birchwood Camp in tribute to her long years of faithful service!

"The next building to be added was "Caribou Cabin," which was the residence of the camp manager and his family, Rev. and Mrs. Hull and their sons, Steve and Danny. It has been used as the camp kitchen for the past two years.

Added at the same time was the garage. Later, the well was drilled; the garage houses the generator, pump and storage tank for water. The Lodge was added this year, at a cost of \$10,000 per square foot. It will serve as a training room, lodge building, and spacious kitchen, which is 23' x 34'.

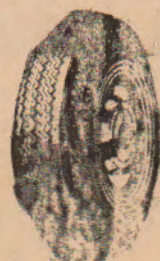

The Parade will be gin at 4:00pm and will be followed immediately by Time Trials.

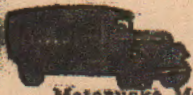
The races will be held at 6:00pm. The event takes place on the abandoned section of the Glenn Highway which leads to the site of the old Eagle River Bridge.

At the present time, one of the rooms is serving as sleeping quarters, also. The construction of two additional cabins is anticipated this summer camping program. The work of the Birchwood Camp is of extreme importance here in Alaska. At this week's session, 43 fifth and sixth graders are in attendance, with a staff of 7 counselors and Mrs. James Kirsch as Camp Cook. As Rev. Walter Hays expressed, "Camping is an excellent learning experience - it is part of the fabric of the total growth of an individual."

In addition to the young people attending camp sessions, Birchwood Camp has had the services of 12 college students in the Methodist Student Movement, who, under the direction of Rev. John Shaffer of the Chugiak Methodist Church, who said "We pray that we may be guided to a deeper learning and to a fulfillment of wisdom that will give us strength for the coming year."

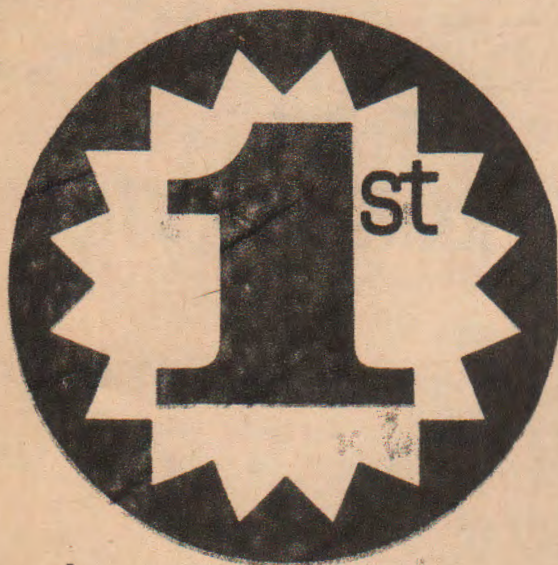

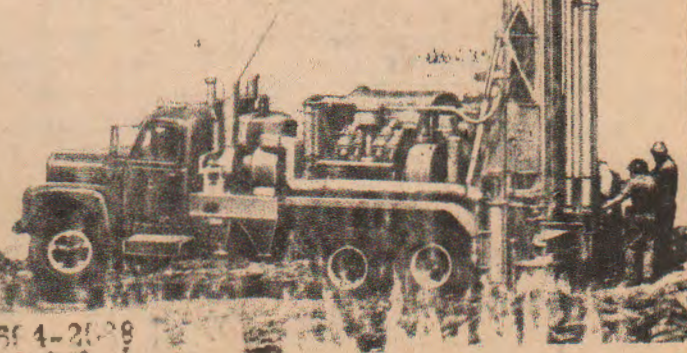
