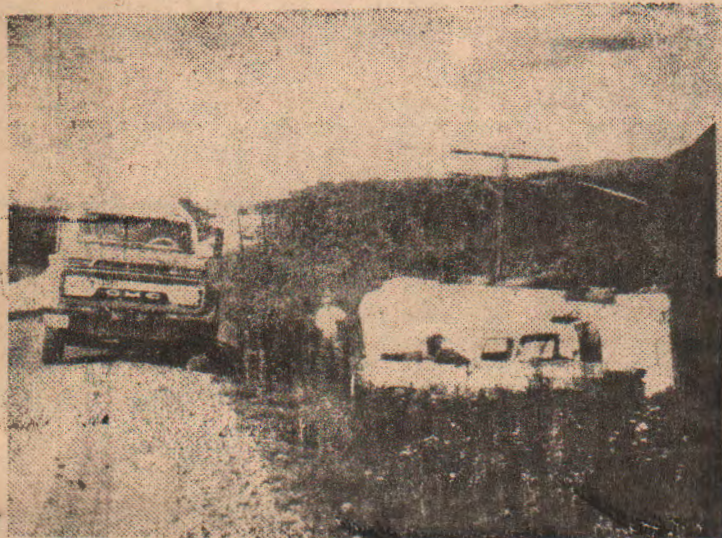

## MILK TRUCK WRECKED IN FREAK ACCIDENT



NO CRYING OVER SPILLED MILK HERE!  
PIONEER MILK ROUTE EMPLOYEES  
WASTE NO TIME TRANSFERRING MILK  
FROM WRECK TO A SECOND TRUCK.

**PETERS CREEK:** Around 2800 gallons of fresh milk were spilled at mile 22 1/2 last Wednesday afternoon, when a tank truck and trailer went out of control and was wrecked.

The truck belonged to Emanuel (Bill) Patrick of Palmer, who operates the Pioneer Milk Route, with a contract to deliver milk from the Matanuska Valley to the Matanuska Maid Creamery in Anchorage.

According to the driver, Charles LaRue Feaster, of Palmer, the air hose to the brakes of the trailer somehow became disconnected. This caused the brakes to "dynamite" (a safety device which automatically causes the brakes to lock when the air pressure is reduced suddenly.)

Feaster (who was south-bound at the time,) attempted to control the careening truck and trailer, but was unable to do so. State police believed that loose gravel which had been thrown up on the pavement from a recent grading of the shoulder had caused the left wheels of the trailer to skid while the right ones were holding on the blacktop. The truck traveled about 314 feet from one side of the road to the other before the trailer hitch broke. The trailer then rolled around 213 feet along the ditch on the right side of the road while the truck traveled for 180 feet before it went off the road on the left hand side, and turned over on its side.

The trailer, containing about 2500 gallons of milk was totally demolished, and all the milk lost.

The truck sustained about \$2,000 damage, and only about 300 gallons of the milk in the tank was split. The remainder of the milk was transferred into a second truck belonging to the Pioneer Milk Route, and transported to the dairy.

The driver was unhurt and was able to drive the second truck in to Anchorage with the milk.

Perhaps there is some esoteric ruling behind the refusal of Customs to admit opium pipes, but for the life of me, I can think of really no logical reason why such instruments should not be permitted when obtained for souvenirs.

It makes as much sense as the confiscation of a pencil because dirty words could be written with it.

There are several types of opium pipes, and it is seriously doubted that the uninformed person could actually identify any of them. I have a Chinese water pipe which almost always invokes the question, "Is that an opium pipe?" Confiscation of the pipe is certainly not going to have any effect on opium smoking because an addict (or any one else) can contrive a smokeable device with pipes and tubes found in the average household, or by purchasing required materials at a five and ten, a hardware store, or a plumbing supply house. Actually, many of our regular tobacco pipes would do very well for opium use.

This is certainly no advocacy of opium smoking, but for an object that has no inherent danger (such as a firearm), no encroachment on patent rights, no effect on price supports, and when the hophead is somehow going to devise a pipe, I just cannot understand why our government feels it necessary to refuse admittance to souvenir opium pipes, new or used.

Back at the old homestead, some of us are wishing that our old timers (and not-so-old timers) would jot down some of the history of our Chugiak - Birchwood - Eagle River - Peters Creek area.

We still have some of our original settlers with us as basic sources of information.

Before long, the ever increasing growth and development of this relatively new area will weaken the objectivity of such recording, and the new generation may find our history second-hand.

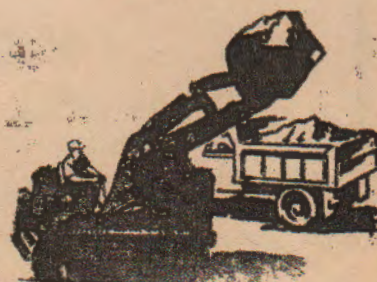

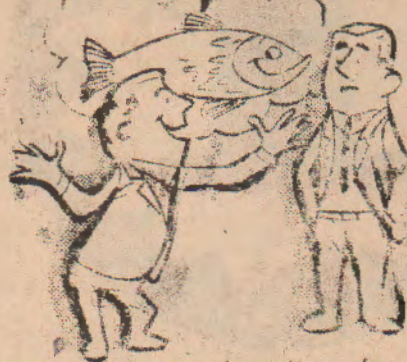

OUTSTANDING YOUNG  
AMERICAN CANDIDATES**

**JUNEAU:** Governor William A. Egan has asked assistance of residents of this area in locating candidates for medals which will be awarded for Bravery and Service for the past year.

Governor Egan stated that he received word from the Attorney General of the United States that he desires young Alaskan be nominated for the awards of the Young American Medals for Bravery and Service for the calendar year of 1964.

The Governors of the several states, territories and possessions of the United States make the award nominations. There is no limit to the number of nominations from each state.

The Bravery and Service Medals are awarded annually under an Act of Congress, passed August 3, 1950, to boys and girls who have performed acts of extraordinary courage or who have achieved an outstanding record of endeavor, service or recognition of character. Not more than two medals may be awarded annually under an Act of Congress, passed August 3, 1950, to boys and girls who have performed acts of extraordinary courage, or who have achieved an outstanding record of endeavor, service, or recognition of character. Not more than two medals may be awarded annually in each category, for a total of four.

The regulations require that the act of bravery or the record of achievement must have been performed during 1964 before the boy or girl reached his or her nineteenth birthday. Each nomination must be accompanied by a full statement and documentation of the act, including time and place, supporting

statements by witnesses or persons having knowledge of the relevant facts, authenticated evidence of the nominee's date and place of birth, a biographical sketch, and a glossy photograph of the nominee.

The deadline for the nominations is October 1, 1965. Governor Egan said that he could like to make a selection of nominees by September 15. Governor Egan believes that there must be many young people in this State who have performed outstanding deeds, and many young people who have outstanding records of endeavor and service.

This is not a contest, in the usual sense, the Governor, added. Location of deserving candidates will, for the most part, be done by friends, relatives, and acquaintances of young people who have the qualifications. In other instances, the persons or organizations benefiting from the acts of heroism or service may tender names. Such names and supporting information required by the rules may be mailed

to the Knik Arm Courier for transmission to Governor Egan or may be mailed directly to his office at the State Capitol in Juneau.

In order for the Governor to make a selection by September 15, all candidates' names and date should be mailed to the Governor at Juneau by September 1st.

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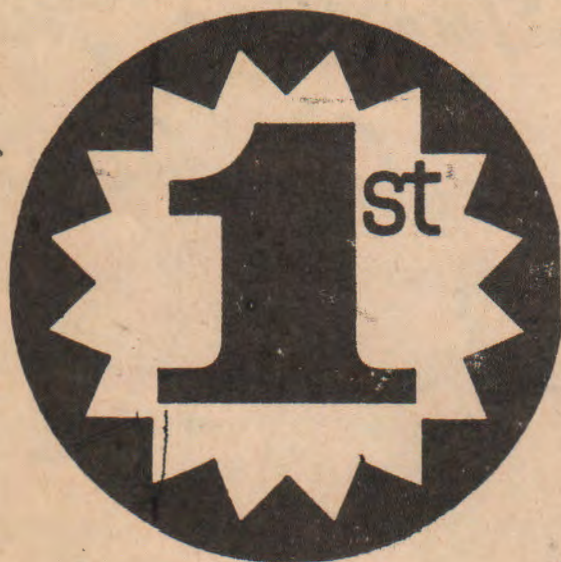
