EKLUTNA LINE CAUSES MAJOR OUTAGE

CHUGIAK: An outage on the Bureau of Reclamation Line from the Eklutna Hydroelectric Project was responsible for plunging Anchorage, Chugiak, the entire Kenai peninsular and the Matanuska Valley into "darkness" yesterday.

Some areas were without power for as long as 96 minutes.

The Knik Arm Courier was on auxiliary power for 1 hour and ten minutes.

The exact cause of the outage was not known at the time of publication.

ANNUAL POETRY CONTEST

JUNEAU: The fourth annual poetry contest, sponsored by the Poetry Society of Alaska, Inc. is offering one first prize of \$25 and a second prize of \$15, plus a new prize of \$10 for the best HAIKU poem.

Anyone may enter who is living in Alaska, or who is stationed here as part of the Military. Members of the Contest Committee and of the Board of the Alaska Poetry Society are not eligible.

Entries will be received in any form and content, except we are adding HAIKU poetry. Due to its snort length, six (not to exceed 18 lines) will be accepted, in lieu of one other poem.

No person may submit more than three poems, and entries must be the original work of the person submitting them, and they must not have been published before.

Entries must be received no later than August 15, 1965.

Names of the prize winner will be announced October 15, 1965, which is World Poetry Day, at the Juneau Poetry Festival in Juneau Alaska.

Manuscripts must be submitted typed, double-spaced (if possible) in triplicate, and should be accompanied with one dollar from each person submitting (not for each poem).

Names of contestants should not be placed anywhere on the manuscripts. Manuscripts should be placed without identification with an unsealed inner envelope bearing the name and address of the writer. Identical serial numbers will be assigned to both envelopes and poems as they are received.

No manuscripts will be returned unless a self-addressed stamped envelope is enclosed.

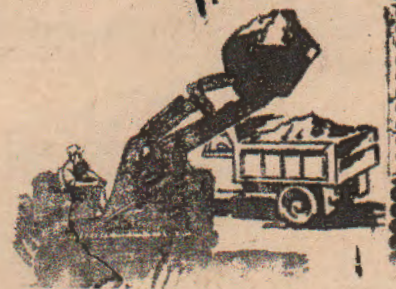

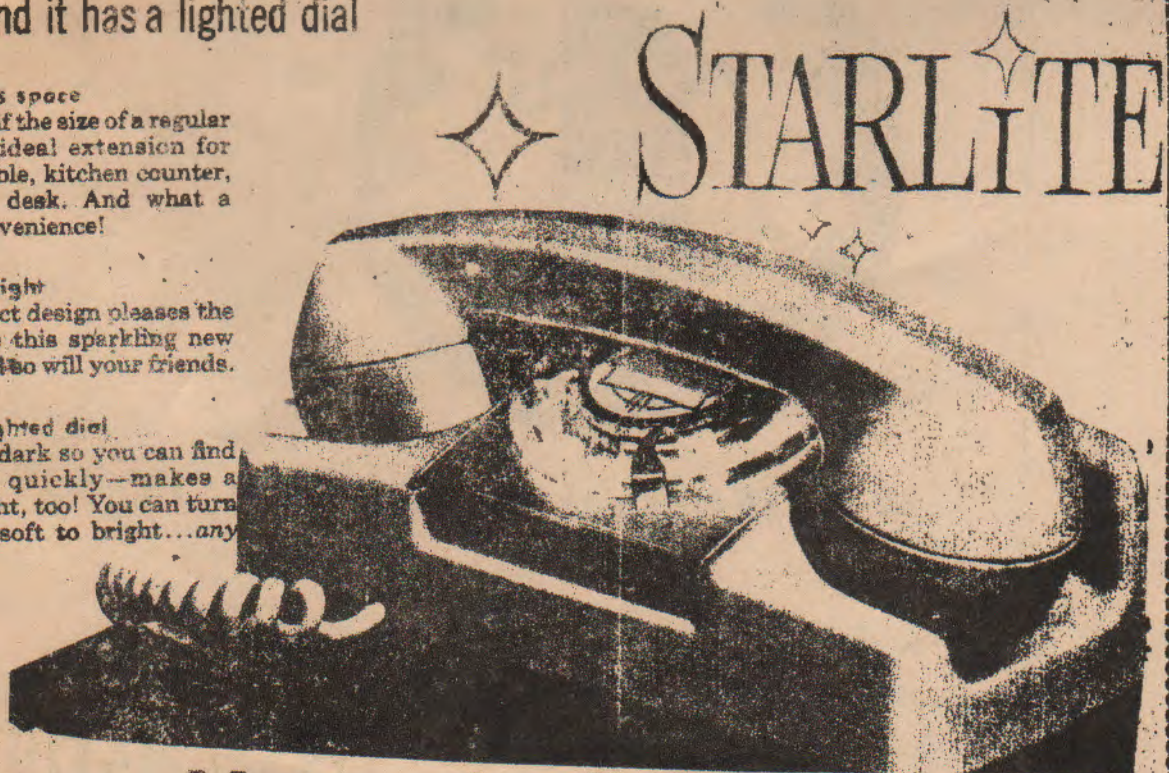

A 3-inch piece of vanilla bean is enough to flavor a couple of cups of milk for a custard. Scald the milk with the bean, then remove the bean, dry and store for re-use.

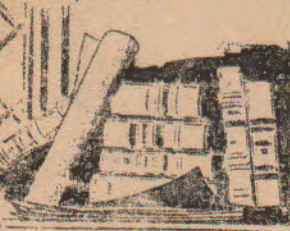

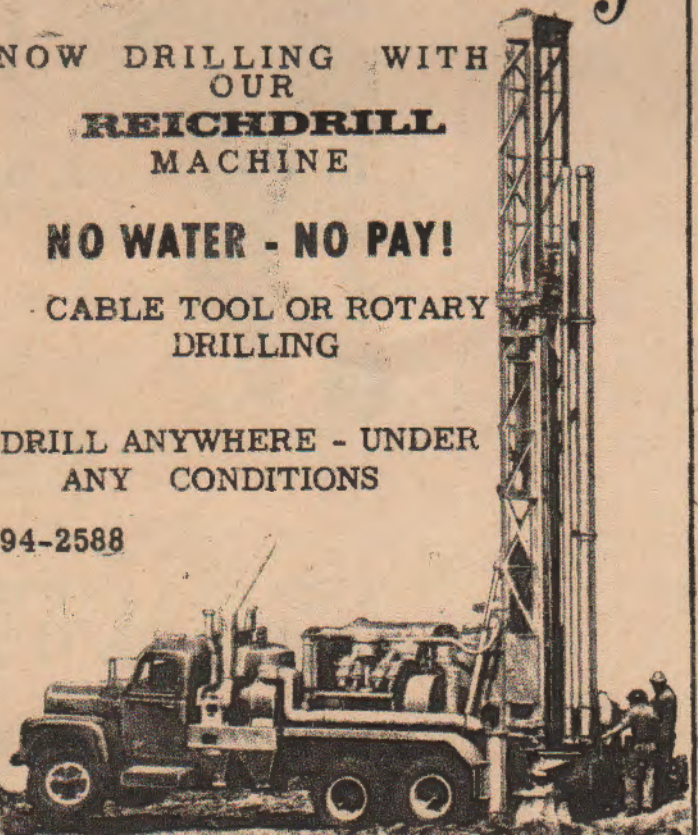
