The recipes cover conventional blueberry pie, Alaska blueberry pie, blueberry buckle, blueberry slump, blueberry crisp, blueberry kuchen, blueberry pockets, blueberry topping, spiced blueberry jam, uncooked blueberry jelly, blueberry sauce and blueberry syrup.

Of course, a handful of blue-berries in the sourdough pancake batter is a touch that starts the day off right, too.

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
