BIRCHWOOD WOMAN FALSELY ACCUSED ON BAD CHECK CHARGE

BIRCHWOOD: Mrs. Walter Fitzpatrick, of Birchwood, was startled last Monday evening when two State Troopers appeared at her door with a warrant for her arrest. They told her that she was accused of passing a large number of bad checks in Denver Colorado during the past months.

Mrs. Patrick, who has not left Chugiak in over a year, was understandably confused.

The matter was soon cleared up when it was discovered that someone using a drivers license bearing Mrs. Fitzpatrick's name was responsible.

Mrs. Fitzpatrick had lost a billfold containing her drivers license and other identification while visiting in Grand Rapids Michigan in February of 1964. She had reported the loss to local authorities at the time.

Apparently the person who had found the billfold had taken Mrs. Fitzpatrick's drivers license to Colorado, where, posing as Mrs. Fitzpatrick, had applied for a Colorado Drivers license in her name. This person had then proceeded to write

CHUGIAK: The following school bus schedule for the Greater Chugiak Area has been announced for the coming year by the Greater Anchorage Area Borough School District.

Buses will begin operating next Tuesday, August 31st, the first day of school. Listed below are bus routes and number (beginning with the first stop).

CHUGIAK ELEMENTARY

Bus # 21, Eklutna Elementary Bus Run: This bus should leave the garage 7:25am. Proceed to Eklutna, picking up students on east side of Glenn Highway enroute. Turn around and pick up students on west side of Highway as far as the Peters Creek Service Station. Proceed to the Chugiak Elementary School, arrival time 8:05am.

BUS #22, Birchwood Airstrip Elementary Run. This bus should leave the garage at 7:25am, Proceed north on the Glenn Highway to the Birchwood Loop Road, turn left on the Loop and proceed as far as the French residence and then begin picking up students. Continue to the Railroad, turn around and proceed to the school. Arrival time, 8:10am.

BUS #23, Middle Birchwood Elementary Run. This bus should leave the garage at 7:25am, proceed north on the Glenn Highway, Turn left on the Birchwood road and start picking up students at the "Y" and continue to pick up as far as the Nation's residence. Then proceed to the school Arrival time 8:05am.

BUS #24, South Birchwood Elementary Run. This bus should leave the garage at 7:25am and proceed south along Glenn Highway picking up students along the way, as far as the Birchwood Loop Road, turn right and continue picking up students to the Nation residence, proceed to the school. Arrival time 8:10am.

BUS #25, Peters Creek North Birchwood Elementary Run. This bus should leave the garage 7:25am, proceed to Peters Creek Service and turn around. Start Picking up students, continue to the Birchwood Road, turn right on the Birchwood Road and pick up students to approximately the French residence. Turn around and proceed to the school. Arrival time 8:10am.

EAGLE RIVER ELEMENTARY

Bus #40, Route 1: 7th grade only. From south to north end of Birchwood Loop. First pick up 6:50am. Continue to pick up to the north end of the Birchwood Loop along the Glenn Highway. Continue on north to Eklutna, turn around, and pick up students on return, turn right on north end of Birchwood Road and continue to School. Arrival time 7:50am.

BUS #41: Route 2: Fire Lake Run. south end of Birchwood Road, first pick up 7:40am. Continue pick up, going south on Glenn Highway. Arrival time 7:55am.

SCHOOL BOARD VOTES TO CORRECT LOCAL SCHOOLS WATER PROBLEMS

ANCHORAGE: The GAAB School Board voted last night to authorize the School Administration to take immediate action to correct the water problem at the Chugiak High School.

This was brought before the board by Dale Pierson, school board member from the Greater Chugiak Area. According to Pierson, the problem at the High School was inadequate water supply from the schools two wells, coupled with faulty electrical pumping equipment.

The board also took up the matter of water shortages at the Chugiak and Eagle River grade schools.

Pierson said that the School District was presently in the process of upgrading the water systems at all outlying schools, and the two local schools would be taken care of as soon as possible.

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON By Ralph J. Rivers, M.C.

WASHINGTON: Publication of two volumes of documents during the Centennial Year relating to the 1867 Purchase of Alaska is being considered by the National Historical Publications and is a good prospect.

Discussions of this week with the Executive Director of the Commission, Dr. Oliver W. Holmes will be followed by another meeting before the month is out.

...Hearings on a bill that would authorize the disposal of ACS long-lines communications in Alaska will be held in six Alaskan cities if the chairman of the House Armed Services Committee approves a request I made this week. In that request, I urged that hearings be held in Anchorage, Nome, Fairbanks, Bethel, Sitka and Juneau. The Bill, which would authorize the lease or sale of the long-lines, was sent to the Congress at the request of the Department of Defense.

... In the interest of the morale of Alaska's classified Federal employees, I am hopeful that the Civil Service Commission will not seek again to end cost-of-living allowances for Alaska not that this Congress has rejected the proposal. This week's rejection (by a subcommittee) marked the second failure of the proposal in the Congress.

... Participation by the Smithsonian Institution in the Alaska Purchase Centennial is also likely in the new week by representation in the office and Senator Bennett's office.

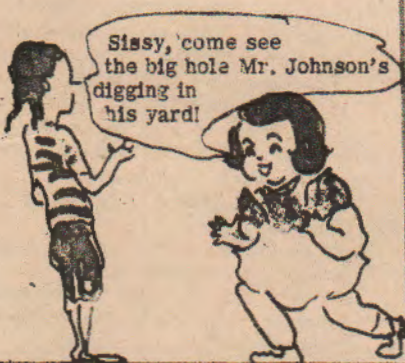

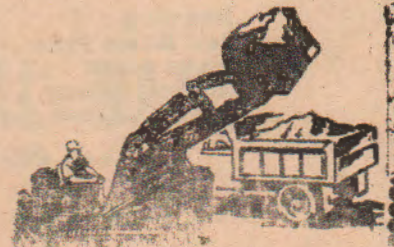

bad checks, signing Mrs. Fitzpatrick's name and using the false drivers license as identification.

Mrs. Fitzpatrick said that the person was apparently an accomplished forger, as the signature on the fraudulent license was identical with her own.

Mrs. Fitzpatrick convinced the State Police that she was innocent and had proof that she had not been out of the State of Alaska during the period in question. The police had traced the original license to her by checking with the department of revenue in Juneau. She was told that the checks that had been forged using her name totaled into thousands of dollars.

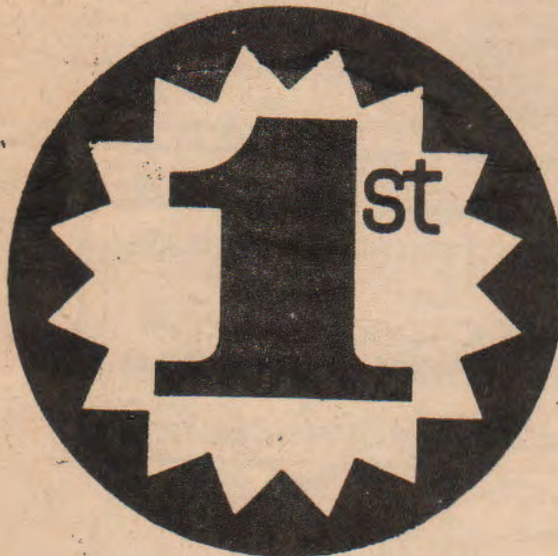

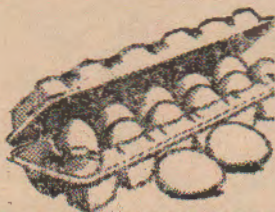

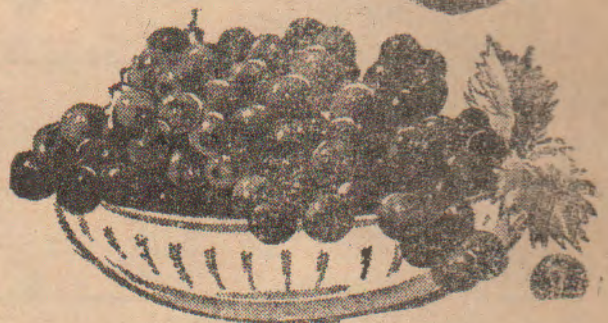

FALL BALLOT TO ASK FOR FIRST CLASS STATUS

ANCHORAGE Glenn Briggs, Assemblyman from Section one of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough, pointed out that two items very likely to appear on the October ballot will be a proposal that the borough assume dog control and one asking that the borough be changed from second to first class status.

Briggs was anxious that the voters of the borough be aware of these two propositions, in order that they may fully consider all the implications involved and have sufficient time to decide whether or not they favor them.

Briggs himself, went on record as being opposed to both propositions at this time.

He feels that dog control would be both expensive to administer, and in an area such as this ineffectual. He also feels that to take on the responsibilities of a First Class borough at this time would only add to the burden of taxes which the residents of the borough now carry.

Briggs said that there is no doubt that with the increased cost of school administration, and the cost of Health Service within the borough, taxes will be higher next year without taking on First Class Status. He feels that the Borough has yet to learn to administer the Second Class form of government without taking on additional responsibilities.

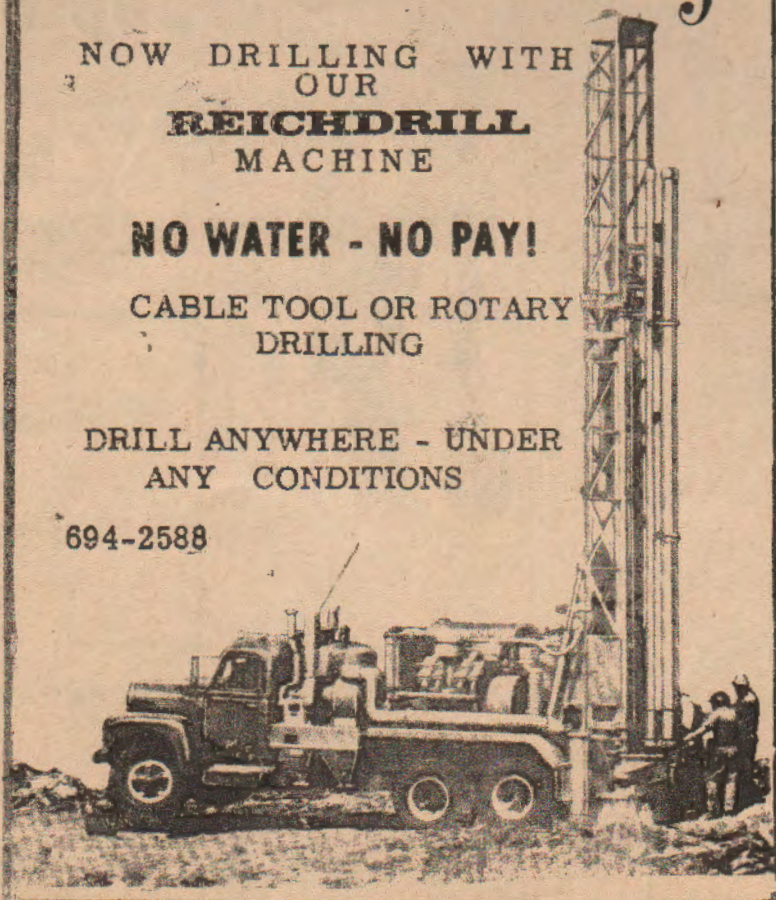

BLUEBERRY TIME IS HERE

PALMER:

What can you do with blueberries? The answer to this question, a common one at this time of year when blueberries are ripening all over Alaska, can be found in a publication available from the Cooperative Extension Service.

"Wild Blueberries and Huckleberries," Publication No. 13, has drawings of the berries as well as thirteen of the best blueberry recipes being used by Alaskan homemakers.

The recipes cover conventional blueberry pie, Alaska blueberry pie, blueberry buckle, blueberry slump, blueberry crisp, blueberry kuchen, blueberry pockets, blueberry topping, spiced blueberry jam, uncooked blueberry jam, uncooked blueberry jelly, blueberry sauce and blueberry syrup.

Of course, a handful of blueberries in the sourdough pancake batter is a touch that starts the day off right, too.

Contact your local Cooperative Extension Service office for a copy of "Wild Blueberries and Huckleberries," or write the Information Office, Cooperative Extension Service, University of Alaska, College, Alaska.

EXTENSION SERVICE BULLETINS ANSWER MANY QUESTIONS

PALMER:

Take a soil sample so you will know what fertilizer to order for next year.

Pick up a copy of "The Hunter Returns with the Kid" from the Extension Service office.

Check your food preservation supplies, cans, freezer paper and tape, etc.

Stop cutting and fertilizing the lawn so it can get ready for winter.

Get your freezer in shape for the coming crop of garden vegetables, wild berries and wild game.

Put up some wild berries to send to friends "outside" for Christmas.

Check your summer clothing and outdoor living supplies so you can take advantage of the fall sales on summer stocks.

Call the Extension Service office for information on wild berries.

Some good cooks like to rub half a lemon over the inside of a chicken that is to be roasted.

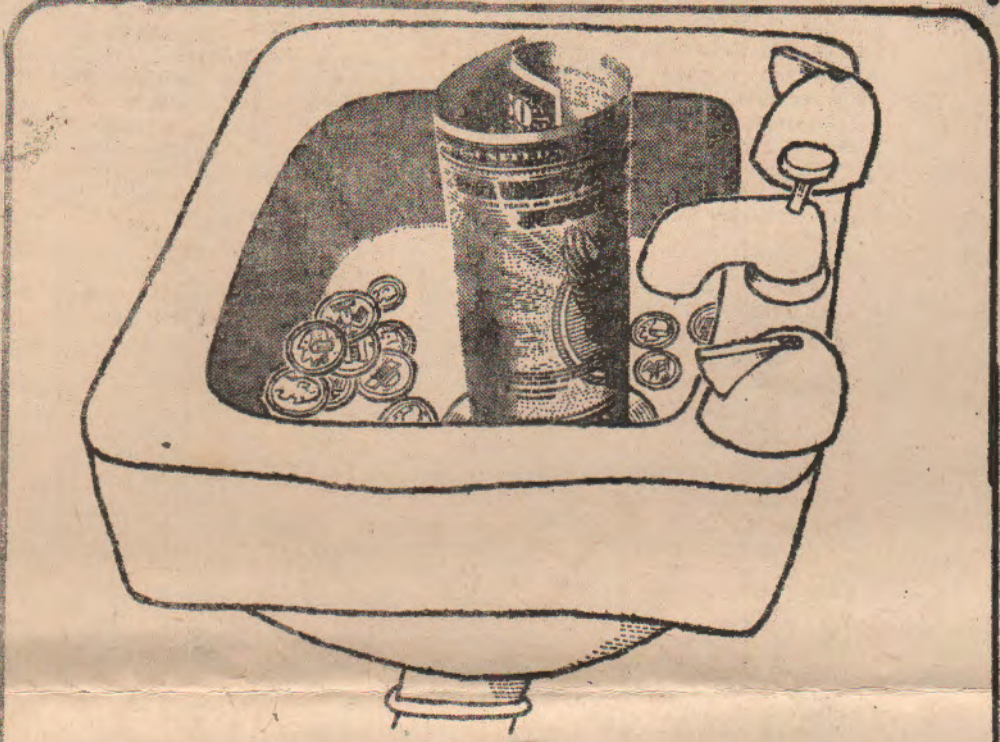

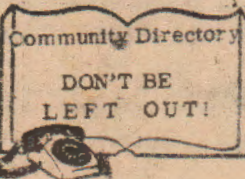
