Death struck again at a tragedy plagued Knik family this week, with the accidental drowning of Everett Theodore age

State Police received a call at 5:35am on Tuesday, August 30th, from Oscar Munson of Birchwood.

Munson told the police that Theo-dore had taken a 14 foot dory eq-uipped with an outboard motor belonging to Munson and had gone across the Arm to Knik where he had picked up his father Bailey Theodore Sr. They then began the return trip to Birchwood where they planned to pick up Munson and the three would proceed to Fire Island to fish.

According to Theodore Sr. the boat was approximately 300 feet from the Birchwood shore when his son stood up and fell overboard. The father said that he piloted the boat back and forth over the area where his son had gone over, but was unable to find any trace of him. The accident took place at

approximately midnight.
Earlier this soring a brother of
the victim, Balley Jr. and a cousin
Harry Theodore were killed in a
collision with a mail truck near
Mirror Lake. Also killed in this accident was Harry's wife.

The Rescue Coordination Center was called in and were searching for Theodore's body, but as of press time, had not found it.

Theodore is survived by his parents and several younger brothers and several younger brothers.

Ine House Subcommittee on Fisheries and Wildhife Conservation has completed its hearings on my
bill, H. R. 12269, and similar bills which would establish a pilot project to manufacture fish protein
concentrate. Enactment of this legislation would help
solve the food problems of the world and would be
of great oconomic benefit to the American fishing
industry. The bill calls for the construction of five
experiment and demonstration plants (hopefully one
in Alaska) for the production of fish concentrates.

A Subcommittee of the House Committee on Agriculture has approved a hill that would authorize the Secretary of Agriculture to determine and convey to the University of Alaska all the right, title and interest of the United States in and to the lands of the Alaska Agricultural Experiment Station located at Palmer. In permitting the University to acquire complete control of the agricultural experiment station, the Congress is placing Alaska on the same basis as the other 49 States. The measure probably will be considered on the Elver of the House in early September.

The Assistant Secretary and Director of Economic Development, Mrs. Euguen P. Foley, has given approval to the release of Federal funds for four additional Centennial projects. Approved were \$65,400 for the Alaska Aviation Progress Museum; \$17,800 for the Girdwood Gold Mine Exhibit; \$135,000 for the Alaska Historical Museum and Fine Arts Center; and \$22,000 for the Point Barrow Community Center.

HEARING DATES ARE SET

Public hearings on proposed new and amended industrial safety regulations will be held in seven Alaska cities during August and September, according to commissioner of labor Gil Johnson.

Johnson says interested persons may present statements or arguments or ally or in writing. Regulations to be considered include but will not be restricted to these activities communication work; demolition; excavation work; explosive actuated tools; gas and electric welding; ladders and scaffolds; logging; machine guarding and abrasive wheels; material handling equipment and piling and storing of materials; motor veincle transportation of workers; material hoists, concrete bucket towers and workmen's elevator cars; and sawmill, woodworking and allied wood products industries.

A hearing is scheduled for Anchorage at 1:30 p.m. in Superior Court on Sept. 6.





ENROLLMENT SHOWS SLIGHT INCREASE

CHUGIAK: School enrollment in the Greater Chugiak Area showed a slight increase over last year as of the first day of school.

At the Chugiak Elementary School, the first day showed an enrollment of 356 students in grades I through 6, and 8 students in the special education class. This as compared with a first day enrollment of 375 in 1965.

At the Eagle River Elementary School first day Repres were 506 in Grades 1 through 7, as compar-

ed with 454 in 1955.

At the Chugiak High School first day total was 326, slightly higher than the first day in 1965 when 381 students enrolled.

This brings the total enrollment in all three area schools to 1266 as compared with 1210 in 1965.

TEETH TELL AGE OF MOOSE

Alaska Department of Fish and Game biologists have dis-covered that the age of a harvested moose can be determined by the front incisor teeth in much the same manner as a forester counts the annual

growth rings of a tree.

Robert R. Rausch, Fairbanks biologist in charge of Alaska's big game research, disclosed today that the technique for "reading the age of moose by counting the layers of tooth cementum deposited annually" has been perfected after several years of research.

The new method involves slicing a very thin section from the tooth and counting the annual layers under a microscope. Rausch said this method for

determining the age of moose makes it possible for hunters to cooperate with a minimum of

"All a hunter needs to do is bring the front teeth, together with information on the date and location of kill, and the sex of the moose, to any Department of Fish and Game office or check station," he said. "Years ago," Rausch stated, "hunters removed the entire

lower jaw of a moose so that we could determine the animal's age by comparing the wear of the molar teeth. Some hunters found it difficult to remove the lower jaw, he said, and biologiet did not always agree on gists did not always agree on the age of the animal.

We have checked the new technique with ear-tagged moose of a known age and find it is very accurate," he said. Hunters in the Matanuska

Valley and the Lower Susitna Valley may find their gigantic moose sporting a metal ear tag with a bright plastic streamer. "If you see one of these mon-strosities," he added, "don't quit hunting—the colorful brand is there for a purpose".

The biologist requested that hunters taking an ear-tagged moose contact any Department

of Fish and Game office as soon a possible so that the skull and other specimens can be recover-

"Front teeth and the information on ear-tagged moose are vitally needed to help determine the condition of our moose herds," Rausch said, "and hun-ters who cooperate will help to enhance their moose hunting in the future".




