## EAGLE RIVER VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY

Annual Report July 1, 1964 - June 30, 1965

As an organization dedicated to the saving of life and property, the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company responded to 26 fire calls and 24 ambulance calls during the past year.

Last fall, with the help of the Eagle-River Lions Club, the Fire Company conducted a door-to-door campaign to enlist the support of the people of the community. The unanimous support given at that time made possible for the Fire Company to operate for the year. We were able to upgrade our old equipment and purchase some new equipment

One of the most effective additions of equipment the past year was the automatic alarm system, whereby the telephones of all firemen ring simultaneously when the fire number is dialed. Prior to the installation of this system, many precious minutes were lost relaying the fire to individual firemen.

Save Your Crops!

Every year about this time, Old Mother Nature shows her authority by turning down her thermostat for a night or two Not quite for good, but usually long enough to put an end to tender growing things. The additional week or two of warmer weather that follows is often the difference between a good crop or none, but with dead plants there is nothing at all.

The home gardener can ofter save a good crop by being prepared for early frosts. The idea is usually to cover the plant with something. A big piece of plestic will help, but laying it directly over the plant leaves gives very little protection. You should make a light frame to hard the plastic a few incommendations and the plastic a few incommendations are plants. Some of

of the heat radiated from the soil will be trapped by the plastic, and will help keep the air around the plant above freezing.

Of course, a double layer of plastic is much more effective than a single sheet. By adding ing a little heat from heaters placed temporarily under the plastic cover, quite a heavy frost can be overcome.

Newspapers are often used, but they should be tied or weighted in place so they won't blow away.

Blazo cans give good protection to the individual plants, as do large cardboard boxes.
Loose hay also works fine, and
can be left between rows for
quick covering of plants when
needed.

In any case, temporary coverings should be removed each day, or the plants will soon die, even if no frost can get to them.

Another common practice is to keep sprinklers turned on during the frost periods. Don't be alarmed if a little ice forms, but be sure to keep the sprinklers running, even after it warms up, until all the ice has melted again.




