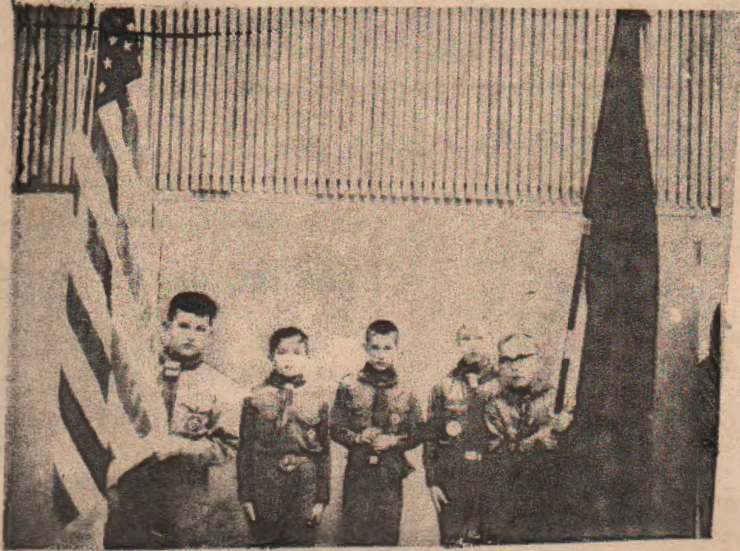

MAN HURT IN CYCLE WRECK

PETERS CREEK: Roe Huling of Oberg Road in Peters Creek was seriously injured last Thursday when he was thrown from the motorcycle he was riding.

Huling had just turned out of Oberg Road onto the Glenn Highway, and was proceeding north, when he approached a group of children waiting for the school bus.

As he approached the group three dogs ran in front of his motorcycle. Huling attempted to dodge the dogs, but struck one, killing the animal, and spilling his Harley Davidson cycle.

Huling was taken to the ro40th Air Force Hospital by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance, where he was found to be suffering from a fractured skull.

Huling is still in serious condition in the hospital, where he has not yet regained consciousness.

BAR LICENSE HEARING POSTPONED

EAGLE RIVER: The Public Hearing, which had been scheduled for last Friday at the Eagle River Grade School has been postponed according to Charles Strong local representative for the Alcohol Beverage Control Board.

The hearing concerned the bar license which had been applied for by the Eagle River Bowl, and which had been issued on a temporary basis.

Strong said the postponement was made at the request of the group who questioned the population figure which had been submitted by the individuals applying for the license. They gave as their reason for requesting the postponement, the State policy which requires a ten day minimum notice of any such hearing.

The date at which the hearing will be rescheduled has not been set, Strong concluded.

BOROUGH ELECTION OFFICIALS NAMED

CHUGIAK: The local election officials for the coming borough election were named today by Arlee Jones, Borough election clerk.

For the Peters Creek voting precinct, Chairman will be Margaret Halverson with Judges Cleda Stephens and Elsie Oberg. Clerks are Diana Nentwich and Madeline Mackey.

For the Chuglak voting precinct, Chairman will be Eleanor Brion, with Judges Eva Jones and Dorothy Fetrow. Dora Monroe and Polly Kallenberg are the clerks.

For the Eagle River voting precinct, Chairman is Katherine Cotten, with Judges Louise Long and Carol Jones. Clerks will be Eloise Thomas and Bonnie Flint.

Polling places are, for the Peters Creek precinct, the Clarence Halverson residence at mile 23, for the Chuglak precinct, the Chuglak grade school and for the Eagle River precinct, the Eagle River Grade school.

The election will take place on Tuesday October 5th, with the polls opening at 8:00am and closing at 8:00pm.

SCHOOL BOND ISSUE EXPLAINED

CHUGIAK: The \$11 million school bond issue, which will appear on the ballot of the October 5th Borough election, was explained to the residents of the Greater Chuglak Area, at a special meeting held Monday night at Chuglak High School.

Explaining the bond proposition, was Mr. Don Fridley, Associate Superintendent of the GAAB School District. Along with Mr. Fridley, to answer questions were members of the GAAB School Board, Dale Pierson, Virgil Flint and Keith Lesh.

Mr. Fridley began his talk by explaining the Master Building Plan of the School District as based on projections of pupil enrollments, required classrooms and cost and location and the alternate means of raising the money to pay for these schools.

He said that by 1971 it is expected that there will be an additional 15,000 students in the GAAB, with 560 additional classrooms needed at the cost of \$32,000,000.

"The voters have no choice but to authorize the bond issue", Briggs said. "With the expanding school program, there will be an increase in borough taxes whether the bonds pass or not. The tax base will not increase enough to cover the cost of schools (85% of the total budget.)

In regards to the proposition asking that the voters change borough status from second to first class, Briggs said, "We are not yet ready to assume the responsibilities of a first class borough. We have barely gotten into service with Planning and Zoning and Health. It will take at least another year before these services are in full operation."

Briggs said his stand was unalterably opposed to any other borough service until the tax base of the borough is broadened to relieve the real property owners of the burden of taxation for the support of these services. "The only legal alternate source of revenue," Briggs

(briggs) said, "is sales tax. By canvass of the area last year, there was an overwhelming majority for the elimination of all personal property tax and the substitution of a 2% sales tax, earmarked for borough schools."

Concerning dog control, Briggs said, "I realize that there must be some solution to the dog problem in the borough. The only means devised so far by the city and the SPUD to cope with the problem has been by hired dog catchers. It has proven to be very costly, without obtaining the objective. If this proposition is passed to be applied borough wide, we would follow the same pattern used by the City and SPUD at an additional cost of not less than 1/2 mill boroughwide taxes. Until someone comes up with a more realistic solution for solving our dog problem, and until we get a sales tax, I don't believe the borough should assume this added service at this time.

CHUGIAK PTA TO CHANGE MEETING NITE

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Grade School at their last meeting voted to change their meeting night from the second Tuesday of the month to the first Tuesday. The reason for the change was to avoid conflict with the meeting night of the Eagle River Grade School PTA.

The group heard a report by sixth grade teacher Mr. Lane concerning a new reading program which places children in reading classes according to their reading grade.

Also discussed was the procurement of I.D. tags for the school children.

There was discussion of rumor that there was trend among some of the school children. There was a record of several cases in the community and parents were advised to take precautionary measures.

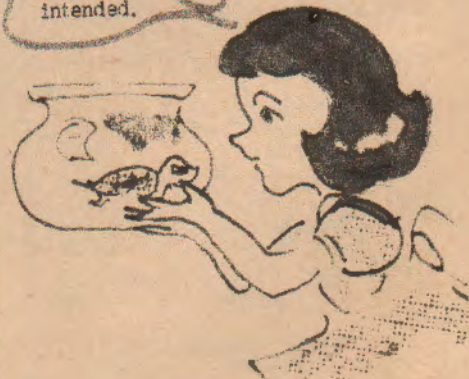

EAGLE RIVER WOMAN GETS PHONE THREAT

EAGLE RIVER: State police are investigating a report by Mrs. Ralph Long of Eagle River that she received two anonymous phone calls on the morning of September 20th.

The police stated that Mrs. Long told them that the first call came at 8:15am. She said the caller reminded her that her husband was a Federal employee, and hinted that he might lose his job under the "Hatch Act" (which prohibits Federal employees from engaging in partisan politics). The second call came at about 8:55am the same day, State Police were told. This time the caller asked Mrs. Long if her home were adequately insured against fire, intimating that her home might be burned.

Mrs. Long told the police that she could not determine whether or not the caller was a man or was a woman as the voice was disguised.

Mrs. Long told the trooper that she felt that the threats may have been made because of her activities in a current dispute concerning the legality of a liquor license in the area.

The State Police tended to discount that theory and felt rather that the calls were made by a crank or juvenile who is aware of the bar license dispute and is using it as an opportunity to harass Mrs. Long.



He went on to say that the School District hopes to raise this money by 3 separate bond issues, the one this year to be \$11 million dollars, one next year of \$11 million dollars and the remainder to be raised the third year.

"There are only funds enough to complete work presently under construction, the Anthony Dimond High School and 2 classroom addition to Wendler Junior High School" Mr. Fridley said. He added that he anticipates no change in the growth trend.

Mr. Fridley then referred to the Greater Chugiak Area, pointing out that residents in the rest of the borough are becoming aware of the 7 to 8 thousands people living in this area, and the fact that this is a very desirable residential area. This, he feels will cause the population of this area to increase even more in the future. He said that there are 1300 students enrolled in all three Chugiak Area schools at the present time. The projection for 1970-71 is an enrollment of 1600 to 1700 students.

He pointed out that local facilities, particularly at Chugiak High School are already overtaxed. He added that high school enrollment would increase even more if it should be decided by the administration to transfer some of the

Registration for voters living within the Greater Anchorage Area Borough is now open. Registration is required for voters at all borough elections.

**REGULAR BOROUGH ELECTION
OCTOBER 5, 1965**

Registration will be open daily at the office of the City Clerk, City Hall Annex, 5th Avenue between F and G Streets, Anchorage, Alaska and also at the office of the Borough Clerk, 104 Northern Lights Blvd., Anchorage Alaska, from 8:00 A.M. to 9:00 P.M. September 20 through September 24, 1965, following which time the registration book shall be closed until following the elections.

Qualified electors who have registered shall forfeit registration and the right to vote in any borough election if:

- (1) Such elector removes his residence beyond the borough limits;
- (2) Such Elector shall have changed his former name since registration.
- (3) Such elector does not vote in any borough election for 49 consecutive months.

Any person who has forfeited his registration shall be required to register anew before being entitled

to vote. Those voters who have changed their residence within the Borough or changed their name shall be entitled, upon application by personal appearance at the office of the Borough Clerk, or by giving written notice to have their registration transferred from one precinct to another.

Those persons who voted in the borough's 1953 General Election and who have not changed their residence are registered for all Borough Elections.

ABSENTEE BALLOT APPLICATION: Not more than sixty or less than five days before any municipal election, any voter properly registered and qualified who expects to be absent from his election precinct, or unable to vote therein on the day of such election, may file either in person or by mail, his written application with the Borough Clerk for an absent voter's ballot. The application shall be signed by the applicant, show his place of residence, and shall make clear to the Borough Clerk the applicant's right to a ballot.

The voters will be asked to elect two members to the GAAB School Board. Only two candidates have filed for these positions, Dale Pierson and Richard Gay.

The voters will also be asked to vote on three propositions. Proposition A: asking that dog control be exercised within the Borough. Proposition B: asking that the GAAB be changed from second to first class Borough status.

Proposition C: Asking the voter to approve an 11 million dollar school bond issue.

Sections two and five will each elect an assemblyman. Only the residents of the two above sections will vote on the latter.
