HERE AND THERE By: R. Fleming

One of the most tragic situations with which I am acquainted is a town where school facilities are at least ten, if not fifteen years behind the very basic need for classrooms and equipment. The ancient elementary school building was a veritable firetrap and when it was finally razed, one wondered why the old, dry material had not exploded through spontaneous combustion. One large building of the high school complex was used for years after it had been condemned. Usage finally terminated when state law held school board members and other officials personally responsible. Loss of the building simply made crowded conditions more so.

Bond issues for education were prosented and voted down again and again. Finally, the bond election passed, and adequate facilities will soon be readied, about three years later. In the meant9me irreparable damage has been done to the education of a generation of children. In-

adequate facilities are not conducive to better teaching. And better teachers are not inclined to serve in communities which have shown little interest or support toward the school system.

An investment in education is perhaps the most profitable one that cane be made, and, if you please, simply from a dollar and cents standpoint. To put it bluntly, in today's society, if a person is not sufficiently educated to be a productive citizen, he (or she) is then supported through welfare programs. It doesn't take a very sharp pencil to determine that it's a heck of a lot cheaper to educate than to support.

We of this borough are extremely fortunate to have the outstanding school system that exists here today. Personnel of our system at all levels, with few exceptions, are highly professional, capable and willing, and aware of our peculiar problems. But our paid personnel are not exclusively responsible for this school system; it also, and very importantly so, includes the citizenry - you and I. Let's keep this in mind when we vote on 5 October.
