



FIRE CO. TO KEEP OPERATING

WORK PARTY REBUILDS LOWER PETERS BRIDGE

LOWER PETERS CREEK: A group of local land owners in Lower Peters Creek, are presently engaged in a major repair job on the bridge which spans the creek at the end of Birchwood airstrip.

The bridge, which was originally built by these same land owners, gives access to the homesites which lie across the creek at the mouth. The bridge was built of log and plank and has been in need of repairs for some time.

Although the work is all being done by volunteer labor, the State of Alaska is assisting to the extent of furnish steel, which is being used to reinforce the structure. The State Division of Aviation has a need for access to the north side of the creek at the point to reach some land which they have there, and for this reason agreed to supply the steel, although they are not furnishing any other material or use of equipment.

The project is expected to be completed in about three weeks. The men working on the bridge are attempting to keep the bridge open to traffic of residents most of the time that the repairs are in progress.

GAAB SCHOOL DIST. TO TAKE SURVEY

ANCHORAGE: A street by street, house by house survey of the Greater Anchorage are must be made this fall to determine the kindergarten classroom needs of the Anchorage Borough School District, according to Dr. Carlisle Kramer, superintendent of schools.

"The survey will be made by members of the individual Parent-Teacher Associations with guidance from the Anchorage PTA Council, Dr Kramer said today, in announcing the survey.

Until this year, the burden of financing kindergarten programs rested with the individual school districts, but a change in the state school foundation law last spring opened the way to provide state aid for kindergarten. As a result, the Anchorage Borough School Board voted last spring to plan for a full kindergarten program here in the fall of 1967.

The areawide survey will enable the administration to determine what funds must be budgeted to meet the classroom needs for the new kindergarten program.

The only ones who could be counted on to vote for the fire districts were the same few loyal souls who had faithfully paid their annual subscription and hoped that by the creation of the fire districts, that the load of supporting the fire companies might be spread out to include those who have been free loading all these years.

The firemen are still dependent on the faithful few if they are to continue to exist. Let us hope that those who voted against the fire district will at least dig up the subscription fee when the call comes around again.



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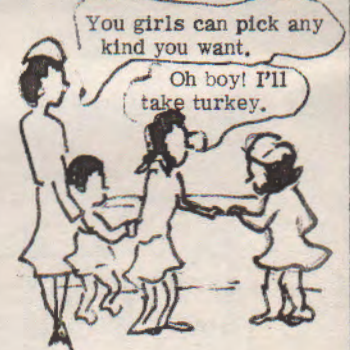

Dr. Kramer announced the assignment of Ted Darby, director of testing and research, to work out the survey program with Gerald Markee, chief of student accounting, and coordinate the program with the PTA Council.

Darby said he planned to test out the survey plan in the Airport Heights elementary school attendance district in advance of the area-wide survey.

Darby said he feels the most important result of the survey will be ability of the school district to pinpoint the individual classroom needs of the schools.

"It is possible to make an educated guess of the number who will be attending kindergarten just by computing a growth factor into the present number of first graders -- 2,233," said Darby, "but the overall total is not the important figure. We must know how many kindergarten aged children are presently in each school attendance zone.

"It is, for example, reasonable to expect that some schools will have far fewer kindergarten youngsters than adjoining schools of the same general size. When this occurs, we have to adjust our boundaries accordingly."


Markee currently is obtaining dozens of detailed maps of the entire borough to distribute to the Parent Teacher Associations. - The maps will provide survey-takers with a guide to the entire attendance zone of each individual school.

Also in the works is development of a survey form which will include the minimum amount of material about the pre-schoolers and all children under 20 who are not attending school.

Mrs. Linford, a mother with five children, estimates that 500 or more survey-takers will be required to do the job as outlined.

"This is really one of our most important projects to date," she noted. "It's on a par with the PTA Council's Island of Safety program and our Share Your Books drive, which was similar to the nationwide Books for Appalachia drive except that the books went to Alaskan native villages."

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

OPEN LETTER TO THE RESIDENTS OF THE GREATER CHUGIAK AREA:

As this is fire prevention week, the anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire, the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company would like to take this time to better inform the residents on the operation of the Company.

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company was originally formed in 1953 and covers the area from Ft. Richardson to the Knik River bridge, and from the Inlet to the Chugach mountains.

The Company has had its ups and downs in the past, but the present goal of the Company is to up-grade to multi-station service as the recently established Mink Creek Station in Birchwood, the first of several planned.

By having these stations in the various areas of the community, we can save valuable time when responding to emergency calls, and may possibly be able to get a lower fire insurance rating for the area.

Our fire phone system, which is presently in operation, consists of the following: 688-5555, a private line to our dispatcher, Mrs. Ralph Anderson. The dispatcher obtains the location and nature of the emergency, she then calls the firemen on the fire phone, which rings 10 phones simultaneously. The fire phone will override any busy party lines that the firemen may be on. The phone at the fireman's house will ring steadily until answered. This system costs the Company

\$460.00 per year. As it is necessary to keep the fire trucks in a heated building in the winter months, our average yearly heating bill is approximately \$400.00.

The Company purchased from the State of Alaska, a 1200 gallon tanker truck in which we installed a pump capable of supplying two 1 1/2 inch lines at 60psi. The truck was purchased through the Civil Defense Plan. The truck was given to the State by the Federal Government. The State then sold the truck to the Company for 10% of the original acquisition cost, or \$600.00.

The Company obtains the revenue necessary to meet these expenses, and many other expenses not listed, by selling yearly subscriptions. A \$10.00 subscription will provide free fire or ambulance service to the subscriber or any member of that household. This also includes standing by with a truck when the subscriber wishes to burn brush.

The fee charged to a non-subscriber is as follows: Fire Call, \$250.00, Ambulance, \$25.00 per person, stand-by, \$10.00.

Many residents feel, as long as they have insurance to cover these fees charged by the Company, they need not subscribe. However, without the subscribers, the company could not meet the expenses involved in having the equipment ready to answer an emergency. The Company wishes everyone was covered by a subscription, so that it anyone should suffer loss by fire or accident we will not find it necessary to compound their troubles by sending them a bill for our services.

If each resident did subscribe, we would be able to serve each one better.

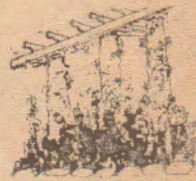
We realize that with the expanding growth of the community, that there must be new men now living in this area who are interested in being of some service to the area as good citizens.



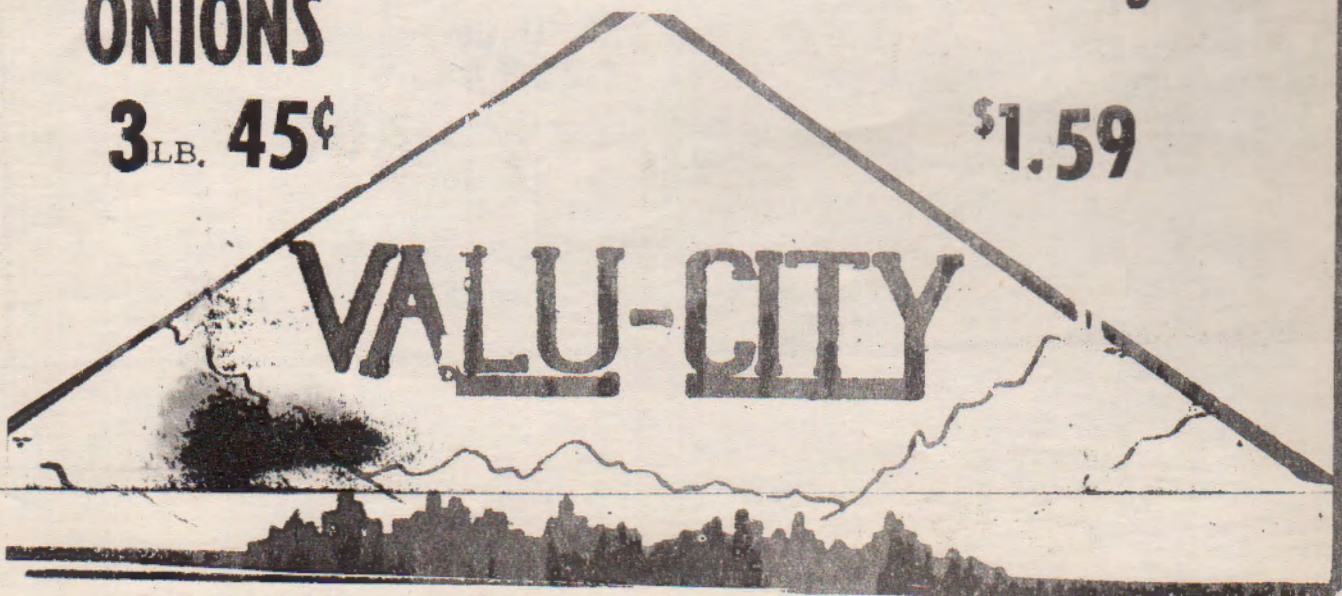

POST OFFICE TO LIST ZIP CODES

CHUGIAK: Chngiak Postmaster Paul Swanson has asked that attention be called to the cards which have been placed at the post office to assist patrons in getting the habit of including the Zip Code when addressing mail.

The card has spaces where the user can write the addresses of out of town or out of state locations which he most frequently uses. The postmaster will then fill in the Zip code for that address, so that the patron can use it whenever he writes to that individual.

Anyone wishing to obtain a list of the Zip code of their most frequently used addresses, may obtain one of these cards by asking their local postmaster.
