



BID AWARDED FOR NEW POST OFFICE

CHUGIAK: Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien last week advised Postmaster Paul G. Swanson of the Chugiak Alaska Post Office, that a bid had been accepted on an existing building suitable for postal purposes at Chugiak.

The successful bidder, Harold Groseth, of Chugiak, will provide a building containing 1390 square feet of interior floor space, with a 90 square foot platform, and 3600 square feet of parking and maneuvering area.

The building is located about 250 feet northeast of the present post office on the Glenn Highway. The building is the original Chugiak Methodist Church, and was purchased by Groseth after the construction of the new church at mile 18. It has been leased in recent years to the State Department of Health and Welfare as a Health Center, and most recently has been used by the Chugiak Branch of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints for their services.

The basic lease will be for five years, with three five year renewal options.

Remodeling work on the building has already begun. When completed the building will be double its present size.

CHUGIAK MAN GETS 3 YEARS IN JAIL

ANCHORAGE: A 20 year old man who gave his address as Chugiak, has been sentenced to three years in jail for burglarizing the Palmer Bowling Alley in February.

The man, James Ralph Anderson, had pleaded guilty to a charge of burglary.

At the sentencing Wednesday, Presiding Superior Court Judge Ralph E. Moody denies probation to him.

The judge commented that Anderson had had one chance on probation and that to allow probation again would give other young persons in the state license to commit crimes without fear of punishment.

Assistant District Attorney Jim Christie represented the state in the case. Anderson was represented by court-appointed attorney William Plummer.

LIQUOR STORE UNDER NEW MANAGEMENT

EAGLE RIVER: Herb's Liquor and Grocery Store in Eagle River is under new management and undergoing extensive re-modeling.

The store has been purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Eric Johnson, who will operate the store, along with the former T&C Liquor Store at mile 13 1/2, which they have also purchased. They will call the latter establishment "Eric's Liquor #2".

The Johnsons who moved here recently from Anchorage, were former residents of the Eagle River area, having lived at Meadowcreek Apartments.

They plan to carry an improved line of commodities both in the grocery and the beverage department.

LOCKED CAR STOLEN IN BROAD DAYLIGHT

EAGLE RIVER: A car, from which the owner had removed the ignition key and had also locked, was stolen from in front of the Eagle River Bowl in broad daylight last week.

The vehicle, a 1965 Chevelle Station wagon, had been parked by the owner, Claude Kelton, of Eagle River, in front of the local bowling establishment at approximately 1:00pm on October 12th. Kelton told the State Police that he had not only removed the key from the ignition, but had also locked the doors of the car. Upon emerging from the bowling alley fifty minutes later, he discovered that his car was missing.

The vehicle is described as a maroon station wagon with a luggage rack on top. It has an Alaskan license plate, number unknown. State police have not yet recovered the car, and are asking local residents who may see a vehicle of this description to contact the local police immediately.

ANNEXED BY THE PHONE BOOK

When the new Anchorage telephone directory arrived in the mail last week the hue and cry from Chugiak Area residents resounded from Anchorage, clear back to Palmer.

The general reaction of local subscribers, upon discovering that instead of being listed in their own separate section as in past years, they had been listed alphabetically with subscribers in Anchorage and surrounding areas, was obvious.

It seems to be the unanimous feeling of all we have spoken to that this has caused our area to lose its identity, and in effect, to quote one irate subscriber....

"Anchorage is bound to annex us, even if it's only in the phone book."

Objections have taken all forms, from complaining phone calls to the MTA office in Palmer and to our local MTA board member, Bob Fleming, to a petition which is being circulated, voicing the objection to

the book, and asking MTA to publish a supplement listing all local phones in one section. The latter has been placed in several local business establishments, and from reports, local subscribers are eagerly signing their names to it.

Anchorage subscribers also do not appear to be too happy with the new directory, although their complaints differ from the Chugiak area subscribers. The book appears to contain an unprecedented number of typographical errors, incorrect numbers and in many cases missing pages.

Whether or not the MTA and the Anchorage Telephone system can or will do anything about the book remains to be seen, but there will be no doubt in their minds that it is highly unpopular with the subscribers.

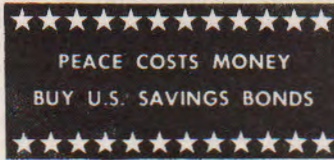

ACADEMY NOMINATIONS BEING TAKEN

WASHINGTON, D.C.: Representative Ralph J. Rivers (D-Alaska) said today that young men interested in seeking nominations to any of the four service academies should write to him for application forms. Rivers' address is 450 Cannon House Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20515.

Congressional appointments are made to the United States Air Force Academy, and the United States Naval Academy. Candidates for admission to the service academies must meet general eligibility requirements, qualify scholastically and medically, must be single, at least 17, and not have passed their 22nd birthday by July, 1967. Those selected will enter the academies in June of 1967.

The academies offer a four year course leading to a Bachelor of Science degree and a regular commission as a second lieutenant in the Army and Air Force. Graduates of the Naval Academy and the Merchant Marine Academy will be commissioned as ensigns.

The closing date for submission of application is December 30, 1966.

Dear Sister,

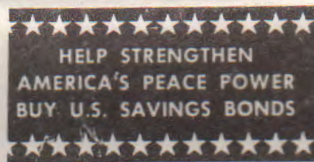

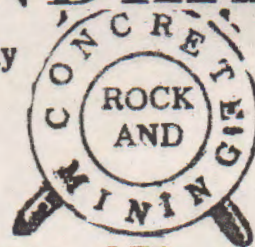

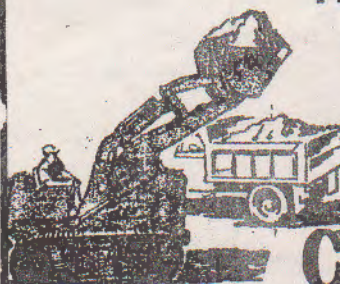

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, D.C.: The Bureau of Reclamation, perhaps the world's biggest producer and wholesaler of power, has added a new customer to its list; a retail customer -- and it is a story well worth repeating. The beneficiary of this unique arrangement is Eugene M. Sellers, who built a home last year at his remote homestead 32 miles northeast of Anchorage, and then found there was no access to electricity.

With six Korean orphans he adopted some time ago, bachelor Sellers faced hardship or abandonment of his home. He appealed to the Matanuska Electric Association, which in turn contacted the Bureau of Reclamation. After considerable negotiation, the Bureau gave Matanuska permission to add still another delivery point -- the Seller's home -- to its vast power system. Hats off to everyone who had a hand in working out this unprecedented arrangement.

.... The House Ways and Means Committee has just reported H.R. 12318, which is identical to my bill, H.R. 12494, and which would encourage the teaching of pre-school children under the so-called "Montessori" system by removing the U.S. tariff from the special equipment used in this teaching method, thus reducing its cost about 15%. The equipment in question is not manufactured in the United States because of the limited market. There are several Montessori schools located in Alaska.

.... House and Senate conferees have agreed upon an appropriation of \$750,000 to start construction of the Snettisham project south of

Juneau. I was most pleased that the House conferees agreed to this amount as they do not usually accept items unless previously approved by the Bureau of the Budget. This past week, the House and Senate conferees also reached agreement on the legislation valling for establishment of a fish protein concentrate plant program. The conference agreement calls for the construction of one plant (costing \$1 million), and the leasing of another for five years at \$150,000 per annum. The legislation also authorized \$835,000 for research at both plants and \$570,00 for operation and maintenance.

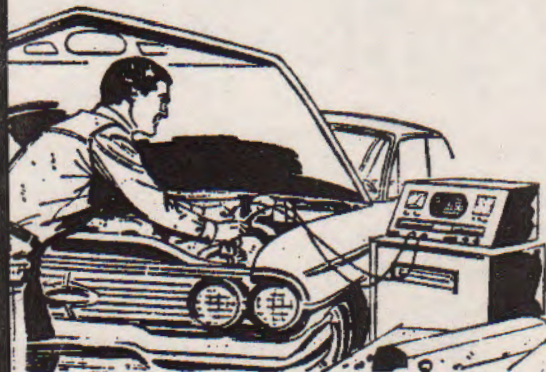
