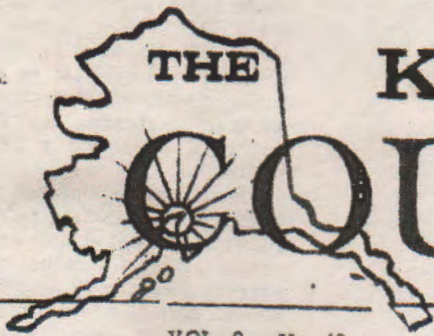

LOCAL MAN ACCOMPANIES ASTRONAUTS ON ALASKAN HUNT

WILLIS IN BY A LANDSLIDE

CHUGIAK: Ed Willis, candidate to the Borough Assembly from Section one, was swept into office yesterday by a landslide vote.

Willis defeated the next highest man, incumbent Glenn Briggs, with a vote of 336 to Briggs' 131. Third highest candidate was Bill Watkins with a total of 134 votes and trailing was James Ekstedt with 85.

Total votes cast in all six local voting precincts was 693. Although was much lower than the 996 votes cast in the August primary election, it topped the 587 total vote of the October 1965 Borough election by 109 votes.

Both of the propositions asking the establishment of Fire Service areas in the precincts served by the Chugiak and Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company were apparently rejected by the voters, proposition "K" for the Eagle River Company narrowly by a vote of 140 "Yes" to 155 "No". This was asking for a one mill tax assessment. Proposition J, which asked a 2 mill tax for the Chugiak volunteer Fire Company was soundly turned down with a vote of 247 "no" to 99 "yes."

ESCAPEES AT LARGE IN EAGLE RIVER

EAGLE RIVER: Two escaped prisoners are presumed to still be at large somewhere in the Eagle River Area, following a high speed chase by State Police.

One, an escapee from the Youth and Adult Authority Camp at Wasilla, and the other from State Jail custody at Alaska Psychiatric Institute, were observed on Eagle River Road in a car which they had stolen.

The trooper gave chase at high speed, down Eagle River Road, to the Glenn Highway, and up Monte Road. At Monte Road and Celestial Street, the pair jumped from the car, after having put it in reverse. The car drove backward running into the patrol car which was in pursuit.

The two escapees took advantage of the incident to disappear into some bushes. The State Trooper was not injured but lost sight of the pair.

At last report they had not yet been captured, and may still be in the neighborhood of their escape.

KODIAK: Ed Bellringer, well known local pilot and outdoorsman, is presently accompanying a group of three U.S. Astronauts on a hunting and fishing trip here in Alaska.

The party arrived at Kodiak on Friday by private airplane and will be hunting for moose, bear, elk and caribou, as well as getting in some fishing.

Members of the party are, Donald K. (Deke) Slayton, Charles (Pete) Conrad and Clifton C. Williams.

Slayton is a retired Air Force Major, now a civilian with NASA. He is director of flight crew operation for the Astronaut program and in charge of selecting and training of astronauts. He has not yet flown in space, but hopes to in the future.

Conrad recently made headlines by taking part in two space missions, Gemini 5 and 11. He is a commander in the Navy attached to the space program.

Williams is a Major in the Marine Corps and has yet to make his first space flight. He was a back-up for Gemini 10 in which John Young and Mike Collins participated. Williams expects to be the first man on the moon.

Also a part of the hunting group is W.C. (Charlie) O'Brien, of Cheyenne Wyoming, who made all advance arrangements for the party, and Mr. W.O. (Win) DuBose of Uvalde Texas, who is Conrad's father-in-law.

Traveling with the astronauts is Dean Conger, who is with the National Geographic Magazine.

Transportation to the hunting area is being provided by Bill Harvey's Flying Service and Orin Seybert's Peninsula Airways.

Bellringer, who is acting as unofficial guide for the party is a resident of Chugiak, living on Mt. Eklutna Drive in Peters Creek. He is employed by the U.S. Air Force in the capacity of a game conservation advisor.

When Bellringer asked Conrad of the chances of getting to the moon, he replied, "That's what I'm here for," "Sure hope so!"

sodium, potassium and calcium levels in the blood. None of these tests can be done in the lab at present. They must be sent out, which requires, first the proper weather conditions, and from one day to a week and a half to get results.

These tests are needed must urgently when a patient is seriously ill with something such as diabetic coma, acute infections, nephritis, overdoses of drugs, or pneumonia. When a patient this ill comes to the hospital, it is a definite handicap to any physician to have to wait days

**FOUR HURT IN
THREE CAR WRECK**

OLD CHUGIAK: Four local residents suffered injury in a three car accident which took place last Saturday morning at the intersection of Birchwood Loop and Glenn Highway at mile 17.

A 1966 Dodge pick-up had stopped to make way for another car turning at the intersection when a 1960 Pontiac driven by Walter Mearl Riggs of Eagle River came up from behind and was unable to stop. Riggs attempted to pass the pick-up on the right side, struck the vehicle in the right rear, knocking it into the southbound lane of traffic and into the path of a 1966 Plymouth station wagon driven by Walter J. Purcell Jr. of mile 23.

The driver of the pick-up, William John Lovell Sr. of Jayhawk Drive in Birchwood, was un injured, as was one of his four children who were in the truck with him. Injured and taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital were his daughters Mary Martha and Judy Ann and his son Walter Stephen. Riggs was also injured and taken to the hospital. All four victims were treated for cuts, bruises and abrasions. Purcell was not injured.

Damage to the vehicles was estimated at \$500 to the Plymouth, \$1,000 to the pick-up and \$15,000 total to the Pontiac.

Riggs was cited for driving too fast for conditions.

LIONS TO RAISE ACCA FUNDS

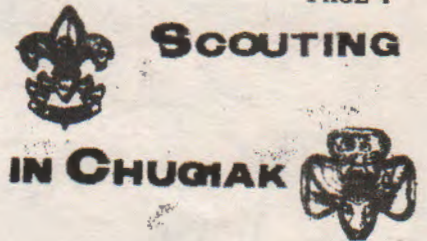

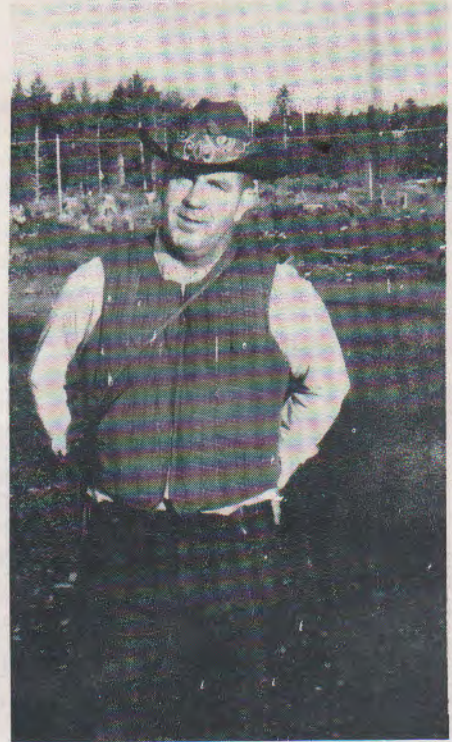

LONG DISTANCE RATES REDUCED

PALMER: A long distance toll rate reduction will go into effect Sunday, October 16th, 1966.

The greatest reduction will be in "Station to Station" calls to the southern 48 states after 8:00pm, Monday through Saturday, and all day Sunday. Lower rates will also apply for most other stateside calls after this date.

For example: a three minute after 8:00pm "Station to Station" call from this area to Washington, Oregon or Idaho, that previously cost \$4.50 will be reduced to \$2.75. The additional-minute (each minute over the first three) will be reduced from \$1.50 to \$.90.

There will also be a new evening rate from 6:00pm to 8:00pm for "Station to Station" calls only, Monday through Friday and all day Saturday.

For example: A three minute evening "Station to Station" call from this area to Washington, Oregon or Idaho, that previously cost \$4.50, will be reduced to \$3.75. The additional minute rate will be reduced from \$1.50 to \$1.25.

To take advantage of this lowest rate calls must be made "Station to Station" rather than "Person to Person."

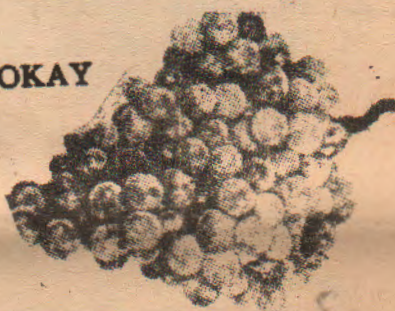

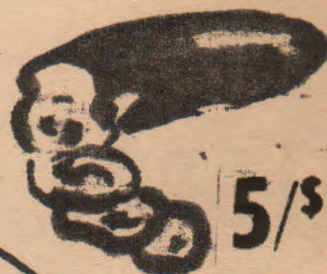

PETERS CREEK: Max Latimer, Chief of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company reported that when he went to start the big tank truck in order to move it to the new substation in Birchwood, he discovered that someone had drained all the gasoline from the tank.

Latimer felt that this was the work of either the same individual who had stolen gas from the Eagle River Fire truck, or someone inspired by the report of the gas theft that appeared in a recent issue of the Knik Arm Courier.

Latimer said that the truck had been parked in front of Peters Creek Service station prior to the discovery of the theft.

Latimer pointed out that in the case of the Chugiak truck, the vehicle is Civil Defense equipment, and tampering with it constitutes a more serious offense than the stealing of gas from a Company vehicle such as the Eagle River truck.

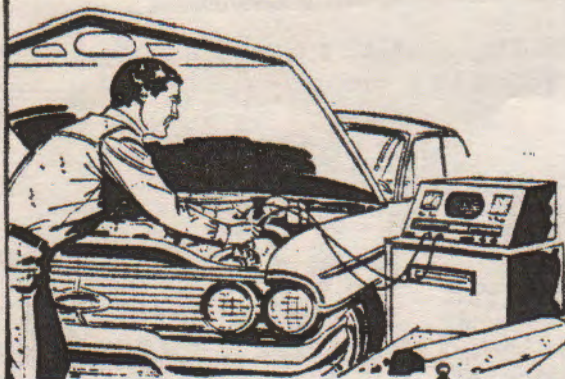
