LOCAL STUDENT CHOSEN FOR HONOR

YMCA TO SPONSOR JR. HIGH BASKETBALL LEAGUE

CHUGIAK: The Youth League of the Anchorage YMCA is sponsoring a boys basketball league in the Greater Chugiak Area.

This league is open to boys in grades 6, 7 and 8 who attend either the Chugiak or Eagle River Elementary Schools or Chugiak High School.

The league will be composed of four teams of ten boys each. Registration for these teams will take place on Saturday, November 19th at Chugiak High School.

To register each boy must subscribe to a YMCA membership, which is \$5.00 per year, plus a \$3.00 youth league registration fee.

The league will meet every Saturday morning at the Chugiak High School gym from November 19th to March 4th.

The local teams are being sponsored by Devali Fuel, First National Bank of Anchorage, Eagle River Branch, Northern Commercial Company, and by Mr. Barney Sabo, Chugiak High School Principal. The latter team will be known as the "Colts".

Sponsors assume financial responsibility for the teams, which includes purchases of uniforms, rental of the school gym etc.

Don Sanders, Athletic director for the Chugiak High School, will supervise the league, with volunteers coaching the individual teams.

The teams will compete within the league, with a tournament between other leagues in the Anchorage Area to be held at the end of the season.

LOCAL ARTISTS INVITED TO SHOW IN EXHIBIT

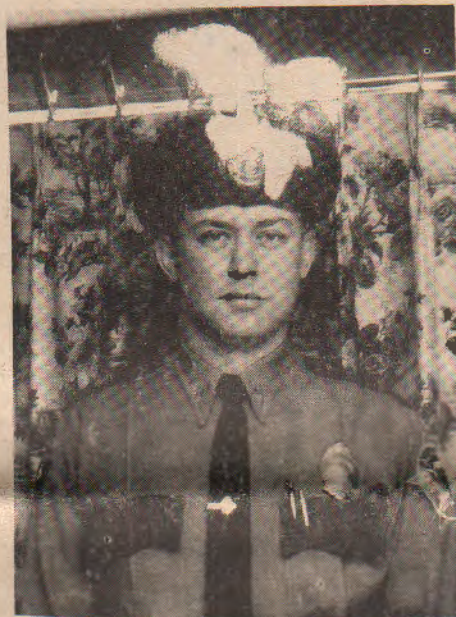
CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Ladies Club is attempting to contact all artist amateur or otherwise who live anywhere in the Greater Chugiak Area.

BIRCHWOOD: A Chugiak High School Junior has been chosen for a boroughwide honor.

Frank Cahill, President of the Junior class will represent the GAAB school district as a member of a six student delegation who will embark on a good will tour of Vancouver and Victoria British Columbia.

These students from all over the State of Alaska will visit Canadian Schools, and attend civic functions while comparing Centennial Plans of the State of Alaska with the Canadian province which will observe its centennial next year.

This is a return visit of a group of Canadian students who toured Alaska last summer. While in Canada they will be guests at homes of Canadian families.

Frank, and the other five representatives were selected on the basis of leadership ability, participation in school activities and on scholarship. Also to be eligible the student had to be an officer of the Junior Class of his or her school.

The principal of each school recommended the student and outlined the students qualifications in a letter of application. Chugiak High competed with East Anchorage, West Anchorage and Dimond High for this honor.

This is the third time within a year that a Chugiak High Student was chosen over the other High Schools in the borough to represent the area at a special occasion. Last year Dorothy Wentland was selected to travel to Washington D.C., and Walter Kallenberg visited the Air Force Academy.

Just about the time this issue of the COURIER arrives in local homes, a long-time Alaskan family will be stepping off an airplane in Phoenix, Arizona. During the past few days, as we offered a little help with their preparations, our heartstrings felt gentle tugs because we treasure this family among our first and best Alaskan friends.

We have loved their children, and fussed at them as the parents have done the same with our offspring. We've probably done the larger share of this, however, because it simply takes more for their eight than for our one! Even though we know they must leave for the health of the breadwinner we, even beyond the point of no return, were selfish enough to have kept hoping that somehow the decision would be reversed.

There have been some light moments, though during this period of packing, shipping, discarding, selling, giving away. It was decided that they would depart with the bare necessities, but for a family of ten,

the barest of necessities isn't really very bare. There have been moments of satisfaction when we realized that we were not going through the terrors of moving as had previously been done numerous times. And it was amusing to see that the stuff that one collects (and can leave behind) is similar to what anyone collects - and can leave behind.

I recall the time when we lived in the same neighborhood as this family that the wives shuddered each time anyone moved - not always because the moving ones were especially liked, but because the husbands always came home with loads of junk. When we left the neighborhood, a veritable delegation of wives presented the plaintive request that I burn instead of distribute.


Well, our friends are gone, and we wish them well. The junk was distributed and some items in my share seem extremely familiar. Maybe I should have burned them after all.

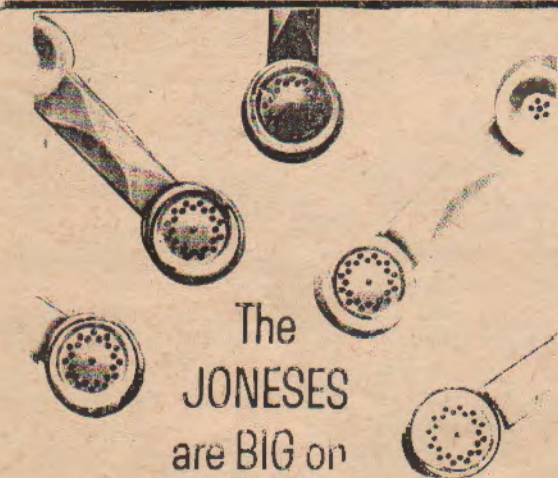

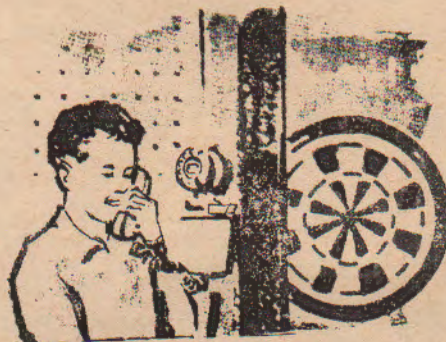

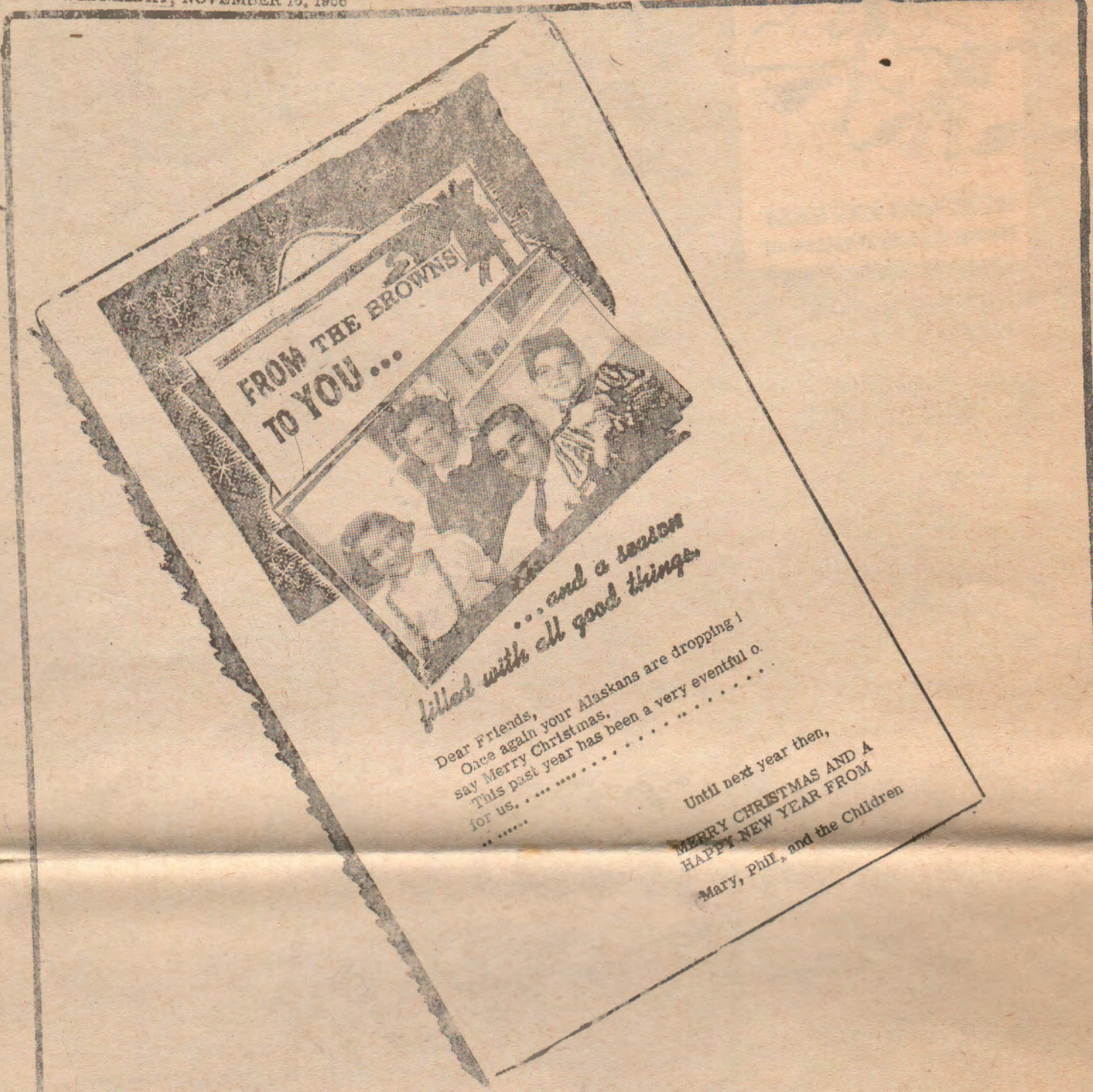

CADETTE TROOP MAY BE ORGANIZED

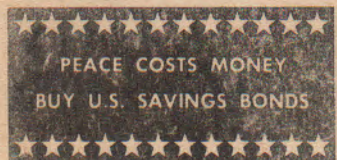

JUNIOR-ADULT BOWLING TOURNAMENT

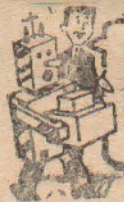

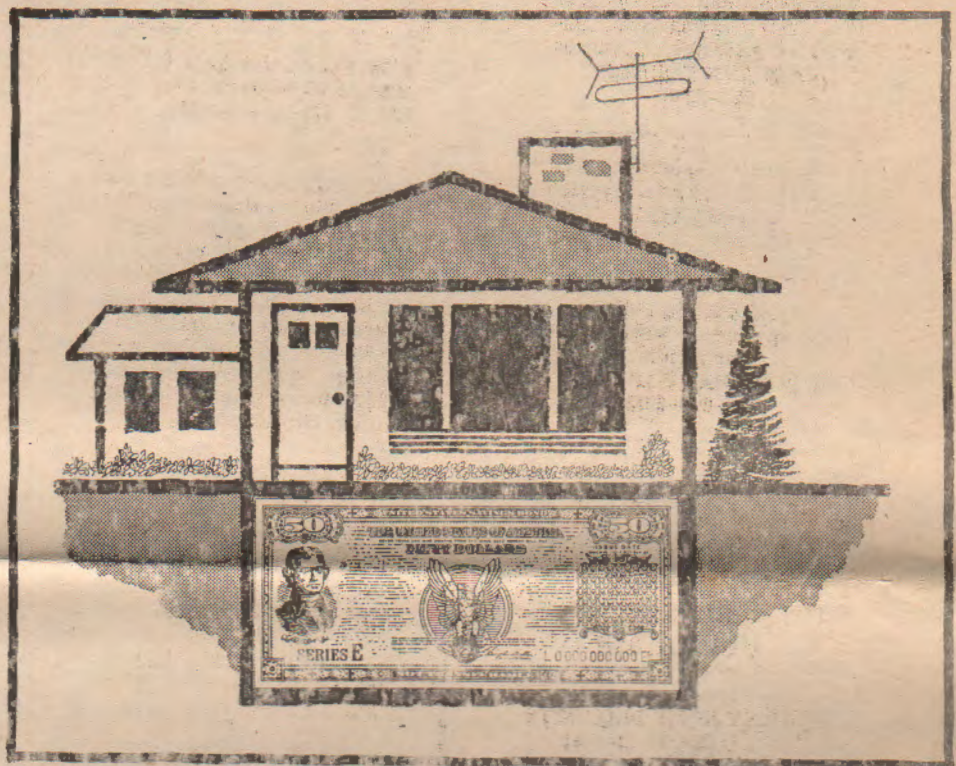
Co-chairmen for the Art Show committee are Margaret Mielke and Helen Savageau.
