We've probably done the larger share of this, however, because it simply takes more for their eight than for our one! Even th; ough we know they must leave for the health of the breadwinner we, even beyond the point of no return, were selfish enough to have kept hoping that somehow the decision would be reversed.

There have been some light momeuts, though during this period of packing, shipping, discarding, selling, giving away. It was dediced that they would depart with the bare necessities, but for a family of ten,
