



# CHILD INJURED WHEN HIT BY CAR



SCENES LIKE THIS WILL BE REPEATED IN BOWLING ESTABLISHMENTS ALL OVER THE ANCHORAGE AREA THIS WEEKEND (see page 9 for story.)

**FIRE LAKE:** An eight year old Fire Lake boy is in satisfactory condition in Providence Hospital, following being struck by a car last Saturday afternoon.

The child is Patrick Steven Rollins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Rollins of Fire Lake Service.

According to State Police, the driver of the vehicle, Henry Hellman, of Anchorage, was proceeding south on the Glenn Highway, when he observed the boy run out of the parking lot at the service station apparently planning to cross the road. Hellman told the State Trooper, that the boy appeared to see the approaching car, and started to return to the side of the road, and then became confused and darted out into the lane of traffic again. The driver said that he applied the brakes in an attempt to stop, but skidded on the icy road and struck the child with the left half of the hood and grill of his car.

The boy was taken to Providence Hospital by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company ambulance, where he was found to be suffering from a light concussion, lacerations of the head and a broken leg.

Hellman was not issued a citation.

## HIGHWAY CHANGE RUMOR DISCOUNTED

**ANCHORAGE:** Cosby Steen, of the Alaska Department of Highways today discounted a rumor which is being repeated locally.

The rumor was to the effect that the alignment of the new highway which is to be constructed through the Birchwood area has been changed so that it would pass directly through the Far North Service station on the south and through the Peters Creek Service on the North.

According to Steen, there has been no change in the alignment that was presented to local residents at the Public Hearing held at the Eagle River School several years ago.

The section of road discussed at this hearing would extend from just north of the Eagle River Bridge and parallel the present Glenn Highway through the Birchwood Area as far as Peters Creek.

Steen said that there are several tentative designs for extension of the road from Peters Creek to Eklutna, but that this was not programmed for several years, and that before any design would be chosen a public hearing would be held. Steen explained that anytime a change is planned in the right of way, a public hearing must be called, in accordance with the Federal Highway Act of 1956.

## GUARD RAIL GETS IT AGAIN

**EAGLE RIVER:** The newly installed guard rail at the intersection of Eagle River Road and Glenn Highway was once again the victim of a one car accident late last Friday night.

Dave Louderback, age 17 of Eagle River told the State Police that he had been unable to turn his car on the icy road and struck the rail.

State Police estimate the damage to the rail at \$150. Louderback's 1960 Chevrolet sedan was damaged to the extent of an estimated \$300.

The rail had been repaired only a few days earlier following a similar accident the preceding week. No citations were given.

located on the South bank of the Eagle River, and the petition was signed by five of the homesteaders who reside in this area.

The original petition was submitted on August 16th of 1966, and the reasons given for asking the incorporation were to enable the residents to procure for themselves road maintenance, fire protection and communication services.

Ed Willis, Borough Assemblyman from Section One had arranged for an informal meeting of the residents of the proposed city with Borough Chairman John Asplund to determine if these needs could not be met by the formation of a service district in that area.

At the regular meeting of the GAAB assembly last Monday, Willis offered a resolution to the assembly asking that the Borough Assembly permit the petitioners to reaffirm their basic American right of self-determination, when conducted through lawful channels, and not intervene for or against the Highland Hills petitioners.

This resolution was defeated by a vote of seven to three with Assemblymen James Garrigues of Section five, and Joe Graham of Section three voting with Willis.

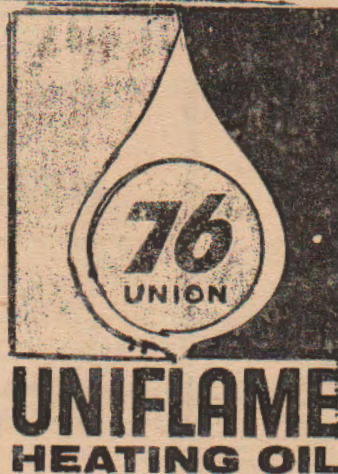
