**OLD CHUGIAK:** A fire which broke out at 4:00am last Sunday morning, completely destroyed the small frame home of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Coley at mile 21.

Mrs. Coley was awakened by the smell of smoke and she and her husband were barely able to throw on some clothes before they were forced to flee the burning building.

They ran to the home of a neighbor, R. L. Landreth, from where they called the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company.

The equipment responded immediately, but the fire had advanced too far at the time to save the building.

The Coley's lost all their possessions in the fire and are badly in need of clothing and household items.

Donations are being collected by the "Flame Dames" the Fire company auxiliary. Mrs. Coley wears a size 20 dress and a size 7B shoe. Mr. Coley wears a size 15 1/2 shirt and waist size 38 trousers. They had no children. Also they are in need of any household items, such as bedding, furniture, dished food whatever can be donated.

Donations may be left at the Landreth residents after 4pm or call 688-5157 or 688-5487 for pick-up.

The fire, which broke out in the basement of the house was believed to have been caused by an overheated oil furnace. Mrs. Coley was able to rescue her pet bird from the building.

The Coley's were not subscribers to the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company and carried no insurance.

## FHA LOANS AMENDED FOR VETERANS

Elmer E. Gagnon, director of the Federal Housing Administration for Alaska, has announced that FHA regulations have been amended and limitations have been removed thereby making many veterans eligible for special mortgage terms.

Eligibility is extended to all veterans who have served 90 days or more on active duty in the armed forces, were discharged or released there from under conditions other than dishonorable or are certified by the Secretary of Defense to have performed extra hazardous service.

### DEADLINE FOR ESSAY CONTEST NEAR

CHUGIAK: The President of the Chugiak Lions Club today advised possible entrants in the Lions \$50,000 Peace Essay Contest they only have 10 days remaining in which to submit their essays.

"Closing date for the entries will be December 10, 1966, and judging for the Chugiak Lions Club's winner will begin soon thereafter," he said.

A total of \$50,000 in awards will be made, including a first prize of \$25,000 in educational and/or career assistance grant, eight semi-finalist awards of \$1,000 and travel expenses to Chicago, Illinois for these semi-finalists in July 1967. At that time, the first prize winner will be chosen from the eight. Also more than 20,000 local, district and multiple district awards will be made.

A panel of three judges, Mr. Paul Swanson, Mrs. Barbara Shaffer, and Mr. William Mehr, will select a winner from the entries to advance to the Lions District 49 level of judging.

Mr. Scott Thompson, Essay contest chairman said that no entries had been received by his club today.

Judging will be held on a Club, District and Multiple District level before approaching World Divisions appraisal.

The Contest, the largest Peace Essay Contest in the world today, is open to young people who are 14 years of age and under 22 as of January 15, 1967.

"Further details of the contest may be had by contacting any member of the Chugiak Lions Club, or me at 688-6197," Mr. Thompson said.

He said his club members were not pleased with the number of entries received so far, but were hoping for a "last minute rush."

"It would be a great moment for our community of one of our contestants qualified for the grand prize in the contest," he said.

**TEACHERS AIDS GET SWIMMING TREAT**

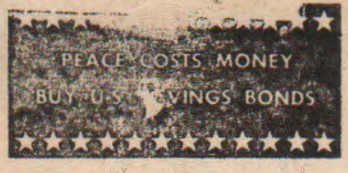
CHUGIAK: Children who have been serving as teachers aids, monitors, library assistants etc. at the local grade schools were treated to a surprise this week.

**LOCAL HATCHERY HAS SUCCESSFUL YEAR**

"All in all it was a successful year for the Fire Lake Hatchery", Frank Stefanich, South-central Regional Sport Fish Supervisor for the Alaska Department of fish and game, recently commented as he recapped the sport fish division's lake stocking program in the Cook Inlet area.

According to Stefanich, 20 lakes in the Matanuska Valley-Anchorage area received fingerling plantings of rainbow trout, silver salmon and grayling. Down in the Kenai Peninsula area four lakes were stocked with rainbow trout fingerlings and silver salmon fingerlings. Seventeen lakes in the vicinity of Glennallen were also stocked with rainbow trout and grayling fingerlings. All of the lakes stocked are either adjacent to the road system or a brief walk from the highway.

Stefanich explained that fingerling trout, salmon and grayling are reared at the division's Fire Lake hatchery, located at Mile 17, Glenn Highway, for statewide distribution and use in the sport fish division's management program to provide a greater opportunity for anglers to put fish in the creel.

During the 1966 season, Stefanich said that the Fire Lake hatchery successfully produced 679,000 rainbow trout fingerlings; 513,700 silver salmon fingerlings; 169,400 king salmon fingerlings and 538,500 arctic grayling fry.

Fry or fingerling sized fish only are used in the Division's stocking program and have proven successful in producing many desirable sport fisheries on lakes along the Alaskan road system where fishing intensity is the highest.

Lakes stocked in the immediate Anchorage-Palmer vicinity were: Jewell Lake, Mirror Lake, North Fork-Campbell Creek Lake, Finger Lake, Echo Lake, Meir Lake, Kepler-Bradley Lake, Gooding Lake, Falk Lake, Irene Lake, Long Lake (Matanuska Valley), Bonnie Lakes, Weiner and Long Lake (Mile 86 Glenn Highway).

### MERIT SCHOLARSHIP TESTS AVAILABLE

**BIRCHWOOD:** Chugiak High School students who expect to complete their secondary school requirements and to enter college in 1968 can register now to participate in the 1967-68 National Merit Scholarship Program, Principal B.G. Sabo announced today.

The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide competition is to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQT), which will be given in the school at 9:00am, Tuesday February 28th, 1967.

Participating students pay a \$1 fee, which is remitted by the school to Science Research Associates (SRA), the testing agency.

In addition to competing for the Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1968, students can take the test to obtain information useful in planning their future education and careers. With his NMQT scores, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him evaluate his scores, compare his performance with that of other school students across the country, and give him information on choosing a college and financing his education. The handbook and other interpretive materials are furnished as a part of reporting the test results.

The highest-scoring students in each state will be named Semifinalists and will be eligible for Merit Scholarship consideration. In addition to the National Merit Scholarship financed by NMSC, more than 350 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional associations, unions, trusts, other organizations, and individuals offer scholarships through the Merit Program.

About 13,440 students have won Merit Scholarships in the eleven Merit Programs to date. Some 2330 Scholarships were awarded in 1966 with the stipends ranging from \$100 to \$1,500 per year for four college years. The amount of a winner's award is determined by assessing the financial assistance he will need to attend the college of his choice.
