

have done yesterday? This habit can prove to be very expensive in the case of paying the annual subscription fee asked by our local volunteer fire companies. No one plans to have a fire, and when the reminder comes in the mail that subscriptions are due, it is so easy to put it off until it is completely forgotten. However, here is something else that is perhaps also forgotten. Residents who are paid up are entitled to the emergency services of the Fire Companies, whether ambulance services, or fire calls at no additional expense.

Individuals who have not paid their subscription are charged for this service. In the case of a fire call the charge is \$250!

This can be a staggering blow to someone who may have just suffered an expensive fire loss. We have time after time at the request of our local volunteer Firemen, reminded the public of this fact, however we feel that perhaps in the wake of the most recent disaster, many may realize that it can happen to them too, and send in their annual subscrition fee before it is too late.

FHA LOANS AMENDED FOR VETERANS

Elmer E. Gagnon, director of the Federal Housing Administration for Alaska, has anyounced that FHA regulations have been amended and limitations have been removed there by making many veterans eligible for special mortgage terms.

Eligibility is extended to all veterans who have served 90 days or more on active duty in the armed forces, were discharged or released there from under conditions other than dishonorable or are certified by the Secretary of Defense to have performed extra hazardous service. Formerly, those veterans wnohad obtained a VA direct, guaranteed or insured home 1 o an were ineligible for the special FHA benefits. This limitation is removed. The changes will allow many veterans that we r.e previously restricted to purchase homes with the removed down payment

Do what you feel you must, with-out regard to any third party. I











LOCAL HATCHERY HAS SUCCESSFUL YEAR

"All in all it was at more year for the Fire Loke Linksh-ery", Frank Stefanich, South-central Regional Sport Fish Supervisor for the Alaska Department of fish and game, re-cently commented as he recapped the sport fish division's lake stocking program in the Cook Inlet area.

According to Stefanich, 20 lakes in the Matanuska Valley-Anchorage area received finger-Anchorage area received finger-ling plantings of rainbow trout, silver s a l m o n and grayling. Down in the Kenai Peninsula area four lakes were stocked with rainbow trout fingerlings and silver salmon fingerlings. Seventeen lakes in the vicinity of Glennallen were also stocked with rainbow trout and grayling fingerlings. All of the lakes stocked are either adjacent to the road system or a brief walk the road system or a brief walk from the highway. Steranica explained that

fingerling trout, salmon and grayling are reared at the divi-sion's Fire Lake hatchery, locat-ed at Mile 17, Glenn Highway, for statewide distribution and use in the sport fish division's management program to pro-vide a greater opportunity for anglers to put fish in the creel.

During the 1966 season, Staf-anich said that the Fire L a ke hatchery successfully produced 679,000 rainbow trout fingerlings; 513,700 silver salmon fingerlings; 169,400 king salmon fingerlings and 538,500 arctic grayling fry.

Fry or fingerling sized fish nly are used in the Division's only only are used in the Division's stocking program and have proven successful in producing many desirable sport fisheries on lakes along the blaskan road system where fishing in-tensity is the highest.

Lakes stocked in the immed-iate Anchorage-Palmer vicinity were: Jewell Lake, Mirror Lake North Fork-Campbell Creek Lake, Finger Lake, Echo Lake, Meir Lake, Kepler-Bradley Lake, Gooding Lake, Falk Lake, Irene Lake, Long Lake (Matan-uska Valley), Bonnie Lakes, Weirer and Long Lake (Mile 86 Weiner and Long Lake (Mile 86 Glenn Highway).

MERIT SCHOLARSHIP TESTS AVAILABLE

BIRCHWOOD: Chugiak High School students who expect to complete their secondary school requirements and to enter college in 1968 can register now to participate in the 1967-68 National Merit Scholar, ship Program, Principal B.G. Sabo announced today. The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide competition is to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT), which will be given in the school at 9:00am, Tuesday February 28th, 1967,

ruary 28th, 1967, Participating students pay a \$1 fee, which is remitted by the school to Science Research Associates SRA), the testing agency.

In addition to competing for the Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1968, students can take the test to obtain information useful in planning their future education and careers. Which is NMSQT scores, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him evaluate his scores, compare his performance with that of other school students across the country, and give him information on choosing a college and financing his education. The handbook and other interpretive materials are furnished as a part of reporting the test results.

The highest-scoring students in each state will be named Semifinalists and will be eligible for Merit Scholarship consideration. In accition to the National Merit Scholarship financed by NMSC, more than 350 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional associations, unions, trusts, other organizations, and individuals offer scholarships through the Merit Program.

About 13,440 students have won Merit Scholarships in the eleven Merit Programs to date. Some 2330 Scholarships were awarded in 1966 with the stipends ranging from \$100 to \$1,500 per year for four college years. The amount of a winner's award is determined by assessing the financial assistance he will need to attend the college of his choice.
