CHUGIAK -100

DOUBLE TRAGEDY STRIKES LOCAL FAMILY

EAGLE RIVER: Tragedy twice in one week visited an Eagle River family.

The William E. Powers family of Monte Road, who only five days earlier had lost all their possessions in a fire which destroyed the home they were living in, learned that their eighteen month old baby was dead on arrival at Providence Hospital.

The infant, was Kevin Harrison Henry, son of Mrs. Sonja C. Powers and step-son of William E. Powers of Eagle River.

The child was rushed to the hospital by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance. Death was attributed to an ailment resulting from a birth defect from which the child suffered.

The funeral was held on Monday, December 12th, at the Anchorage Funeral Chapel with Rev. Ronald Laue of Zion Lutheran Church officiating. Burial was at the Anchorage City Cemetery. The infant was survived by his mother and by a grandmother, Mrs. Nellie Delgran of Portland Ore.

The fire which earlier last week destroyed the Powers home, broke out at 10:00am on Friday December 2nd. The house they occupied a frame building located on Monte Road.

The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company, assisted by a tank truck from the U.S. Army responded, but were unable to save the home from total destruction. The family escaped, but lost all their possessions.

The cause of the fire was not determined. There was no insurance, and the loss was estimated at \$11,000.

The Powers were temporarily staying at the McDaniel residence on Highland Terrace when the infant was stricken.

EKLUTNA MAN IS FOUND DEAD

EKLUTNA: A fifty nine year old resident of Eklutna was found dead in the yard of a neighbor Monday morning, apparently the victim of a heart attack.

The frozen body of Joseph G. Chilligan was discovered in the back yard of Carl E. Nelson, by Mike Alex, village chief.

Alex told the trooper that Chilligan had reportedly gone over to borrow something from Nelson the night before and had not returned.

Chilligan was found on his back in Nelsons yard. The State police reported that the victim's clothing was not disturbed and there was no evidence of violence. Chilligan had a history of heart trouble, and it was presumed pending further investigation that he had collapsed on his way to visit Nelson.

Funeral arrangements are still pending at the Anchorage Funeral Chapel.

Chilligan is survived by a wife Pauline and five children, David, Irene, Lora, Norman and Herman of Eklutna, a son George and a daughter Mrs. Doris Collins of Ft. Graham, Alaska, and a sister Mrs. Anne Toughluck of Talkeetna. Burial will be at the Eklutna Village Cemetery.

Prices of the trees will be from \$2.00 on up.

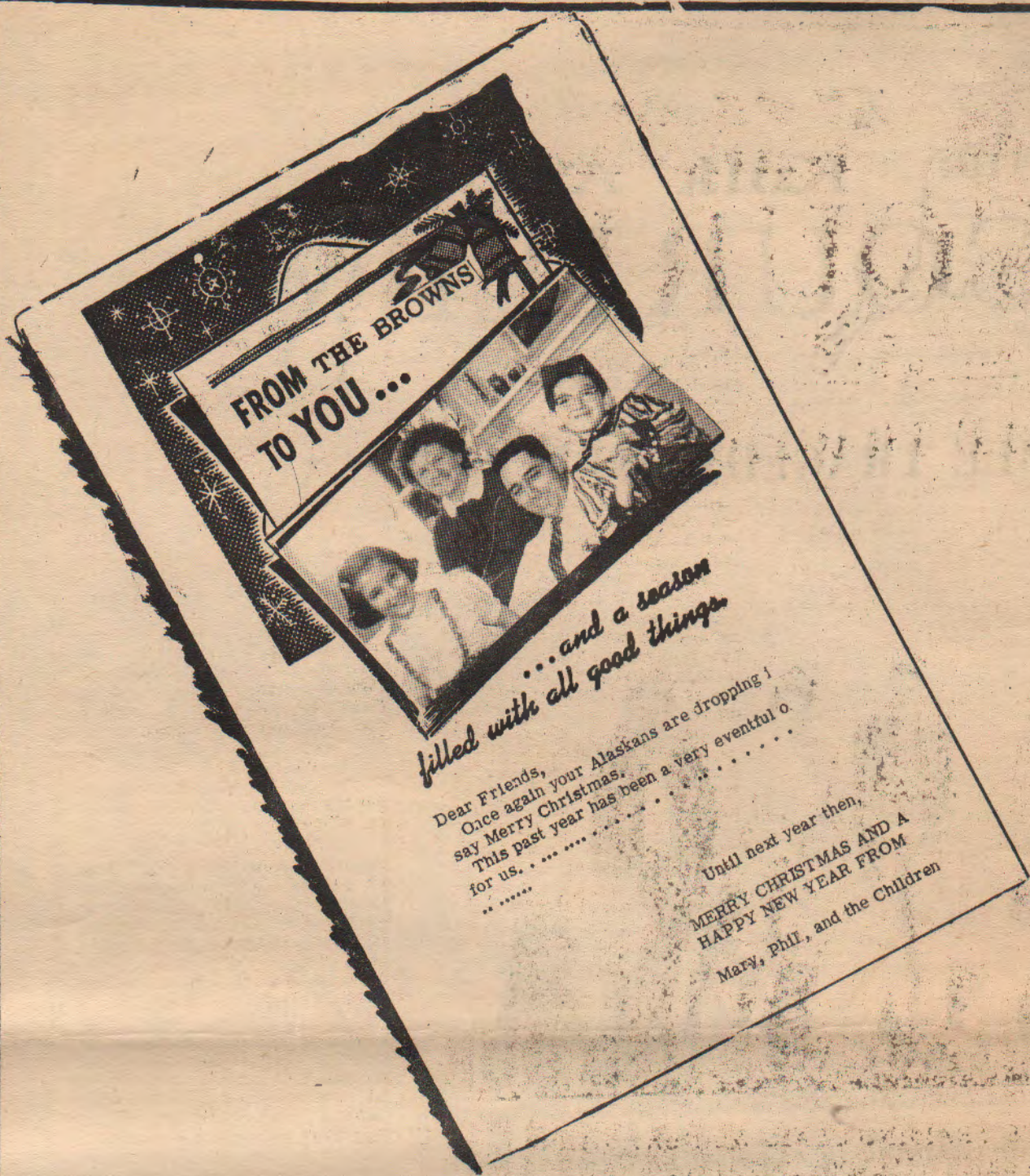
Proceeds will go toward purchases of table and chairs for the community hall.

Dear Martha,

I know you can't advise me on what is legal, but perhaps you can help me decide which is right.

I have two children by my first husband. He died when they were too young to remember him.

I have remarried, and my second husband has been a wonderful father to the boys. We have three children of our own, and he treats them all alike.

The boys have been going under my husband's last name even though their own father's last name appears on their birth certificates.

They start school next year, and I know we will have to make a decision so that the name on their school records will be legal.

My husband wants very much to adopt the boys, so that they can use his name legally. I would like this too. The problem is their grandmother, their real father's mother. She is violently opposed to this. She thinks that I have no right to change the boys names, that they should keep the names they were born with in memory of their father. I say they have no memory of their father, since they were too young when he died.

I don't want to do anything wrong, but I don't think his mother has any right to interfere, do you?

Asking

Dear Asking,

You're right, I wouldn't presume to give you legal advice. However I also hesitate to tell you what is right in this situation, since there are so many things involved that I don't know about.

I think this decision is one which affects your two boys more than it does either you, your husband or their grandmother. Since two children who are just starting school couldn't possibly make an intelligent decision at this time, I would advise you not to make any permanent arrangements at this time.

Talk to the school authorities and learn it if is possible for the boys to enroll under their step-fathers last name if that is what they have been using. It may be possible to have the records show that the names on their birth certificates differ.

When they are older, and are more able to understand the situation, then perhaps they can make their own choice. Be sure they know all the facts of their parentage without making a big issue of the story. Let them understand that their natural father was taken from the three of you, and that the step-father who raised them has given them the love and care which their own father could not. Above all,

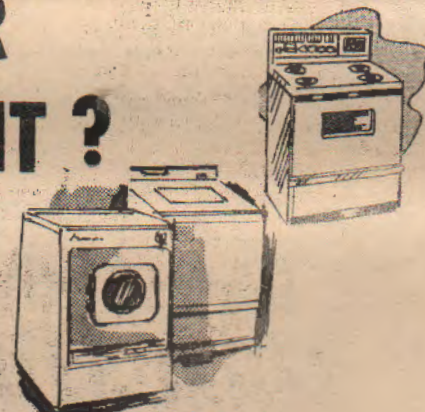

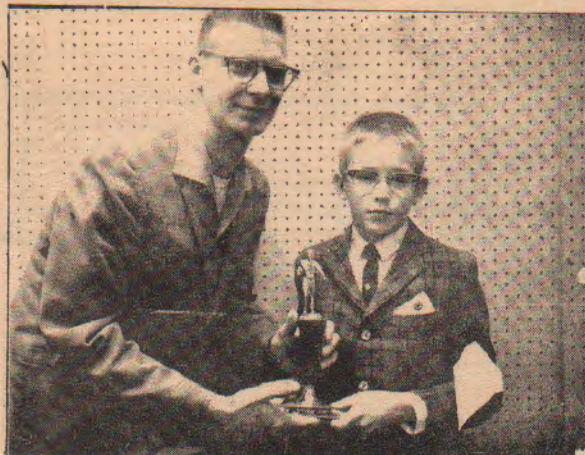

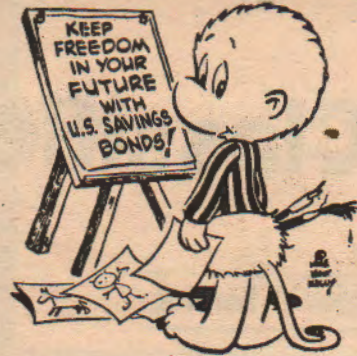

HERE AND THERE By: R. Fleming

The crime rate of Anchorage in most of the major categories approaches twice the National average. Of special interest is that spokesmen for Anchorage Police have indicated that perhaps as much as eighty five percent of crimes committed are directly or indirectly attributable to drinking. There is a appreciable amount of evidence to support this premise.

Of recent news is the movement to initiate a 2:00am closing of bars in place of the present 5:00am closing time. Presumably this would give policemen three hours to devote to other duties than tending the drinking public. And with three hours less in which to imbibe, less drunks and drinkers who might not reach a condition in which they are easy prey for the criminal type.

Without expressing undue brotherly love for the neighboring metropolises, all of us would welcome the reduction of crime so close to our frontdoors. There appears to be given credit for this realization as this present proposal concerns only the city of Anchorage, those who feel compelled to bend the elbow three hours longer may simply shift their activity to bars outside the

There has been some reluctance, therefore, to take official action, which, in reality, might not change the problem - only alter its location.

A two o'clock closing does appear to have some overall merit. In the outlying areas there is less population and not very many people are drunkenly lurching around on the streets, if only because there are no sidewalks. Walking in the highways has proven to be an effective method to insure having taken the last drink.

In our Greater Chugiak Area, the bars are operated by people who are citizens of our area. If early closing the Anchorage bars resulted increased problems in our area, it is felt that the bar operators themselves would voluntarily and immediately take steps to alleviate the situation. If not, the people of speak strongly, collectively and effectively.

Even though Anchorage is giving thought to various means of meeting the crime problem, we cannot afford to have little or no feeling about the situation. It is a serious matter and must be given serious thought.
