New years resolutions, it is said are made only to be broken. We have never believed this, and can say that we have sincerely tried to keep our resolution to our readers each year.


ers each year. Once again we resolve to try to improve the Courier in order that the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area can have the very best local news coverage that they have the right to expect.

Ryan, is a long time local resident and bar operator, and most recently operated "Lonnie's Bar" at mile 13 1/2.



To ease the strain of Fiji's overcrowded jails a minimum security prison has been started on a farm near Naboro where 100 young prisoners will work in the fields eight hours daily.

Naboro's chief virtue will be that it will enable young of-fenders to be separated from hardened criminals.

The emphasis at the Naboro Farm is on rehabilitation. It will accommodate selected first and second offenders between the ages of 17 and 23. They will be given practical training in agriculture to enable them to ind a living at the completion of their sentences.

Men and women eat separately in some families in India. Men eat first and when they have finished the women are served.
