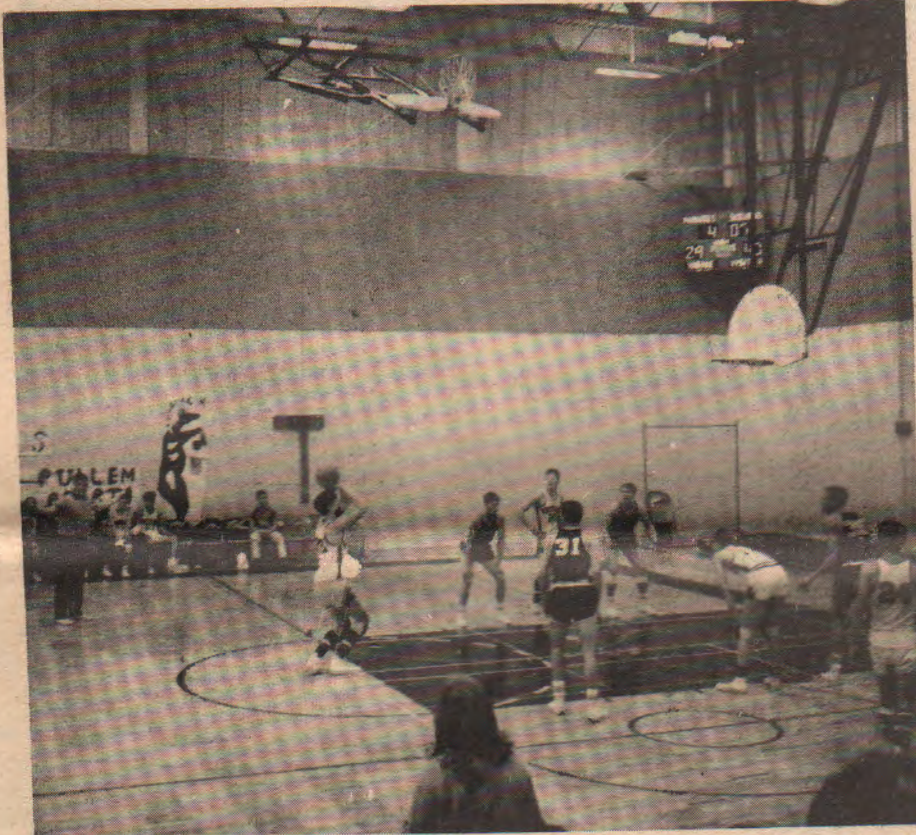

LUMBER COMPANY TO OPEN BRANCH HERE



EAGLE RIVER: The United Lumber Company, which presently operates a building supply house in Anchorage will soon open a store in Eagle River it was announced today.

United Lumber has leased property at mile 14 1/2 from Gene Benito for their business. According to Benito, they will complete the building which he had started on that site, and hope to be open for business no later than the first of March.

Benito said that they plan to operate a complete building supply establishment and to offer local residents the same prices that are to be found at their Anchorage store.

SPORTSMEN'S CLUB TO HOLD ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING

EAGLE RIVER: A group of local residents met last Sunday at a private home last Sunday to form a sportsmen's club.

The group appointed temporary officers and made arrangements for an organizational meeting at which interested members of the general public will be invited to join the group.

The name of the organization will be the "Sportsmen's Game Preservation Association", and the first regular meeting has been scheduled for December 14th (Wednesday) at 7:00pm. The meeting will take place at the "Eagle River Inn", which is located just south of the Eagle River Bridge at the "Y" of the new and the old road. The Inn is not yet open for business, but has been made available for the meeting.

Gene Benito, the temporary chairman of the organization, explained that the purpose of the club is to attempt to restore big game in the local area, which has been described as extending from the Palmer flats Fort Richardson and all the drainage and tributaries therein.

Benito also said that the petition which is presently being circulated in relation to the big game problem was drawn up as a project of the club, but he hastened to add that it represents only the opinion of one man, and that it will be gone over point by point at the meeting and each issue voted upon by the membership.

Everyone attending the meeting will be invited to join the group, and an election for permanent officers will be held at the time.

MENS BASKETBALL LEAGUE TO FORM

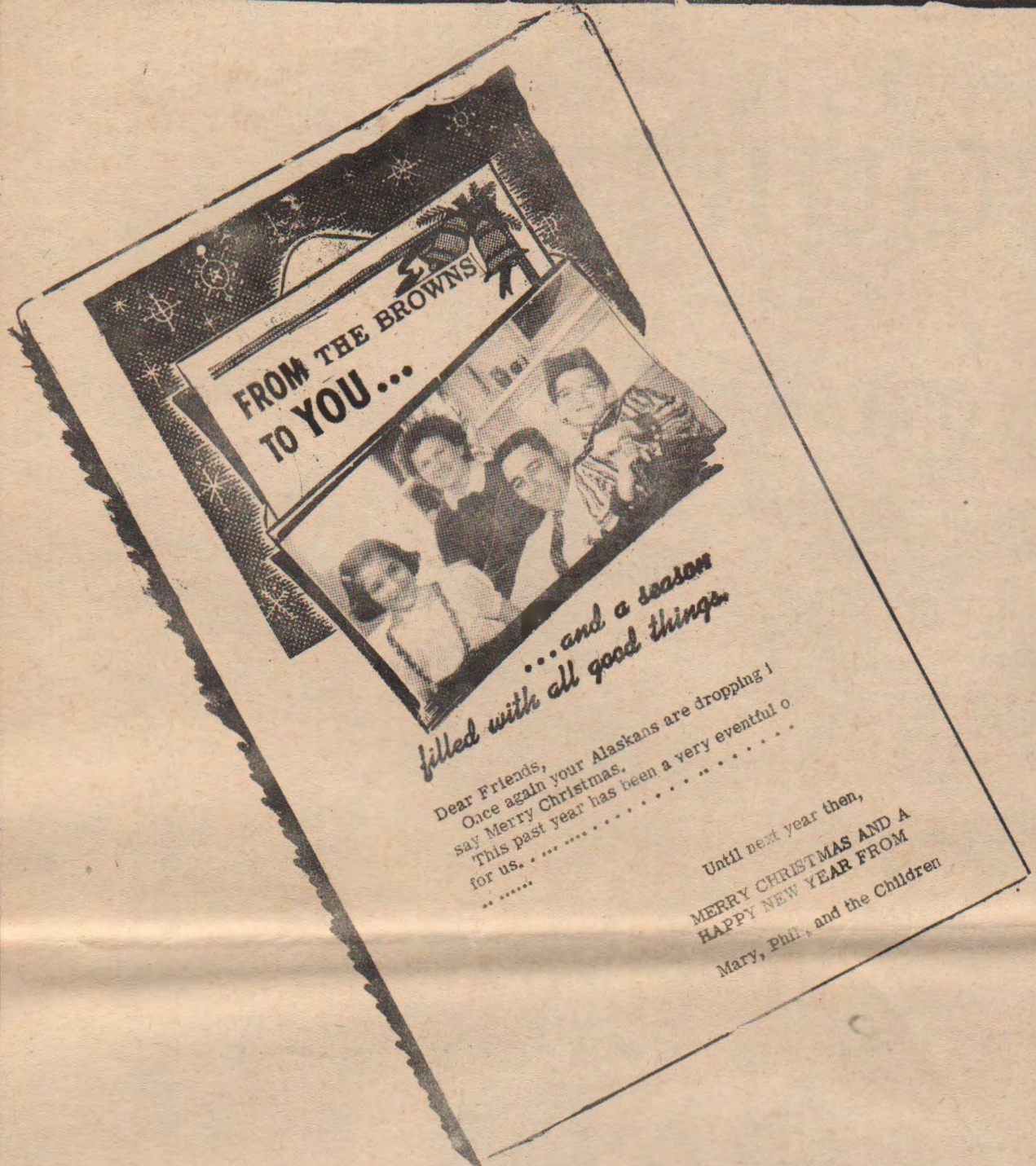
BIRCHWOOD: A men's basketball league is presently being organized, with games and practice to be held in the gymnasium at the Chugiak High School.

JUNIOR MISS CONTEST

The Junior Miss Contest for senior high school girls, ages 16 through 18 in the Anchorage Borough District will be held on Thursday night, December 8th at 8:00 in the East High Auditorium. Tickets are selling at \$4.00 for adults, and \$2.00 for students. They will be available at the Hat Box, at the door, or from Leslie Mauldin.

This is the first Junior Miss Contest to be held in Anchorage in three years. It is being sponsored by the Captain Cook's Junior Chamber of Congress. The members of the Varsity Show, a television program by teenagers, will handle the local pageant.

There are fourteen girls competing in the Junior Miss Contest this year, representing East, West and Chugiak High Schools. (Representing Chugiak will be Leslie Mauldin.)

The winner will receive a college scholarship, and will go to Nome for the state finals. The state winner will go to Mobile Alabama for the national finals.

The winner will be judged on her scholastic achievements, her interview with the judges at a luncheon, talent, her ballgown, and her physical fitness.

Mrs. Ramsey, the Chugiak High School Counselor is on the panel of judges for this contest.

Also, he doesn't seem to understand that a home can't be run like a barracks. I know that children in an orphanage are expected to be a lot more self reliant than you kids or mine, but I can't see trying to run our home like an institution.

How can I make him see that this is not unusual and that kids love each other even if they are always fighting and that just because they don't pick up after themselves doesn't mean they will grow up lazy and sloppy.

A certain amount of friction among simlings is natural, and your husband must be made to see this. If you can't find the right words to convince him of this, perhaps a teacher might be able to point this out.

However, while I don't think a home should be run like an army camp, there is a lot to be said for the self-reliance a child learns in an institution.

Learning to pick-up after themselves will do your children no harm, and I think you should let your husband instill this fine habit in them. Only someone who never had a home of his own as a child is able to convince them how fortunate they are.

This party is open to any children living anywhere in the Greater Chugiak Area.

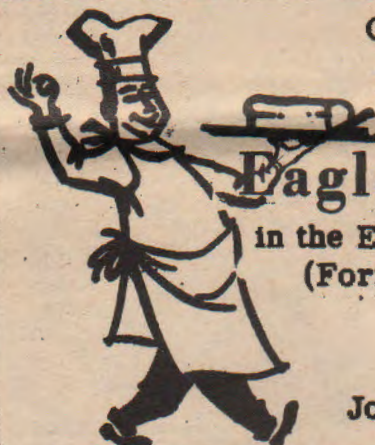

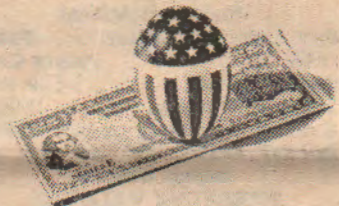
TIPS FOR MILADY

As long as your oil remains fairly fresh and clean smelling, use out of this jar whenever a recipe calls for oil, whether for pan frying or cooking. This will give you lots of mileage on your oil, and since you will probably have to add fresh oil each time you deep fry, it should last indefinitely.
