

BOROUGH PLANNING MEETINGS CALLED

CHUGIAK: Three follow-up Borough Planning meetings will be held in the Greater Chugiak Area this week.

These meetings will be conducted by Jerry Overstreet, of the Borough Planning Commission and are follow ups to meeting held earlier in the fall.

A meeting on Wednesday, January 12th, will be held at 8:00pm at the residence of Clarence Halverson of mile 23. This is for all residents of the Peters Creek Area.

On Thursday, January 13th, residents of the Birchwood Area are to meet at the home of Charles Richner at Box 615, Birchwood Loop Road at 8:00pm.

The third meeting will take place on Friday, January 14th, at 7:45pm and is for the residents of the Fire Lake Area. This will be held at the George Olson residence on Fish Hatchery Road.

At earlier meetings, Mr. Overstreet heard suggestions on planning from local residents. At the follow-up meetings he will present ideas formulated by the Borough Planning Commission.

All residents of the areas concerned are urged to attend.

NONE HURT IN TWO CAR SMASH

EAGLE RIVER: There were no injuries in a two car collision which took place at the intersection of the Glenn Highway and Eagle River Road last Wednesday.

Sharon Ann Peterson, of Meadowcreek Apartments, driving a 1965 MG sedan was turning out of the Eagle River Road onto the Glenn Highway, when her car collided with a 1963 Mercedes Benz, driven by Dale Briggs of Eagle River. Briggs was turning off the Glenn Highway onto the Eagle River Road at the time. Both vehicles were damaged on the left front fenders to the extent of an estimated \$200. No citations were given.

UNKNOWN DRIVERS CAUSE WRECK

EKLUTNA: An Anchorage driver completely wrecked his car at mile 28 last Saturday, trying to avoid running into two other cars parked on the highway.

The driver, Lewis J. Hallman told the State Police that the other cars were parked opposite each other on opposite lanes of the highway, apparently the drivers conversing, and completely blocking the road. Hallman ran his car into the ditch to avoid hitting them. He rolled over completely, the car then coming to a rest on its side against a telephone pole.

The two other cars then promptly drove off without attempting to assist Hallman.

Hallman and two of his passengers were uninjured. A third passenger, John Schommer of Ft. Richardson suffered a cut chin. The 1962 Chrysler sedan was a total loss.

MILE 24 CRASH

PETERS CREEK: Two Spenard drivers met at mile 24 last Sunday in a collision which inflicted an estimated \$200 to each vehicle.

Gordon H. Collies was proceeding South in a 1965 Buick station wagon when he observed a car stopped in the lane of traffic with a flat tire. He as attempting to slow his car when it began to fishtail and he lost control of the vehicle. He skidded into a 1964 Chevrolet, driven to Judy Ann Gorton which was proceeding north at the time. The damage was to the left front fender of the Gorton car and the right front fender of Collies vehicle. There were no injuries and no citations.

The Chugiak Mustangs, with a victory in mind met the Western Alaska Champs on their home court. But not discouraged, the Mustangs quickly opened a lead, but missed two shots in a row, and let the Thunderbirds of East by them, and never again were ahead. The first quarter ended 18-7.

The Mustangs kept pace with the T-birds in the second quarter, but still did nothing to catch up with them. The third quarter was disastrous for the Mustangs as East outscored them 16-5, which was 11 additional points to their lead.

In the final quarter, the Mustangs still fighting, managed to score 16 points. The fact that Chugiak only hit 24% from the floor to East's 42.5% indicates that the Mustangs still have a lot of practicing to do before they can beat any team from a large school.

The Chugiak Mustangs did a very good job of holding down the West Anchorage Eagles. The first quarter score was 20-14, the Mustangs only six points behind. The Eagles increased their lead by eight points, but the Mustangs were still there, fighting, and in contention for the lead. The halftime tally was 28-37 for the Eagles.

The third quarter was the best for the Mustangs, as West only outscored them by three points, even though Coach Sanders substituted freely. But with the last quarter, it was clear that victory was out of touch for the Mustangs as the Eagles outscored them 10-18 for a 50-76 victory, the Mustangs second loss on the conference season, and West's second win for the conference.

Last year the Malemutes set a record against the Mustangs (which was later broken), but this year there will be no records for a team against the Mustangs, as the Kenal Cardinals upset the Malemutes last weekend.




