MINING COURSE OFFERED AT CHUGIAK HIGH

BIRCHWOOD: A five week course in Prospecting and Mineral Explorations is being offered at Chugiak High School through the University of Alaska.

This course will be held starting February 7th, and will be taught by Leo Mark Anthony, of the University of Alaska Mining Extension.

Registration will be held at 7:00pm at the High School, and any interested persons may sign up. There is no tuition charge for this course. The classes will be held from Monday through Friday, starting at 7:00pm each night. This is a non-credit course, but a certificate of training will be given to anyone completing 75% of the classes.

The course stresses mineralogy, exploration methods, economics of geology, valuable mineral products small scale mining methods and claim staking. A minimum of fifteen students is necessary to hold this course.

HEARING TO DISCUSS DOG CONTROL LAW

ANCHORAGE: A public hearing, for the purpose of discussing Borough Ordinance No. 60, known as the Dog Control Ordinance, has been set for Monday, February 7th.

At this time, the public will be given the opportunity to discuss the ordinance, and to voice any objections to any part of it.

Several portions of this ordinance are being questioned by dog owners in the Greater Chugiak Area as being not appropriate to a rural area such as this.

One portion of the ordinance under question is Section 3.010, Article III, which states "All dogs must be controlled as follows: either on a leash, or at "heel" beside a competent person and obedient to that person's command, or on or within a vehicle being driven or parked on the street, or within the property limits of any person who has given the owner or keeper permission to allow the dog to run loose on the property."

Also questioned has been Section 1.020, Article I, which states, "No person shall engage in the business or pleasure of raising dogs unless the owners acreage in which the dogs are to be kept is 2 1/2 acres or larger".

OBEDIENCE TRAINING CLASSES OPEN TO ALL

OLD CHUGIAK: The Dog Obedience Training Classes, which are being sponsored by the newly organized Obedience Training Club of Chugiak, are open to any interested dog owners.

The classes will begin on February 6th, and will be conducted in the Chugiak Community Hall (across from the Chugiak Chapel at mile 2L).

Entry fee is \$15 for ten weekly training sessions of one hour each. A beginners class will start at 6:00pm until 7:00pm, and a intermediate class from 7pm to 8pm.

To participate in either of these classes it is not necessary to be a club member, nor must the dog be pure bred.

Registration on the 6th will take place one half hour before the first class is scheduled to start. Those planning to train a dog must have a six foot training leash and chain collar. Anyone wishing additional information may call the Birchwood Kennels at 688-5121.

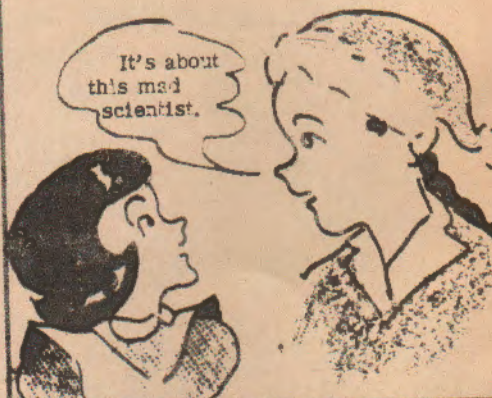

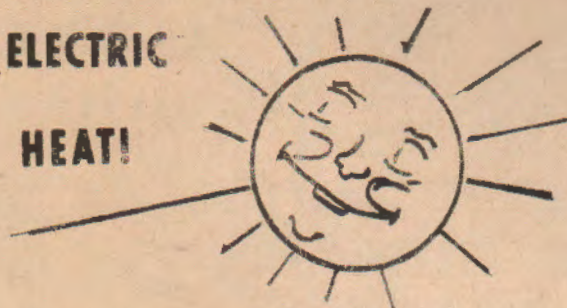
**LADIES CLUB ELECTS

These will be in the mail within the next week.

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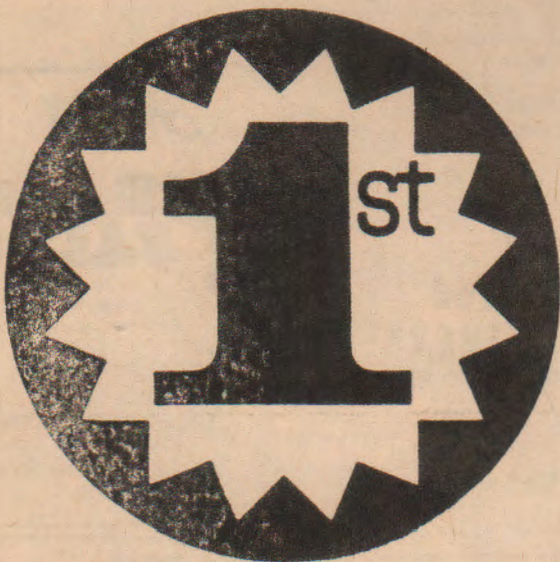
FILM FOR KIDDIES TO HELP MARCH OF DIMES

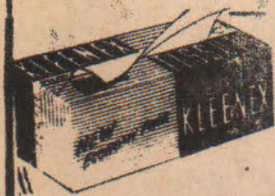

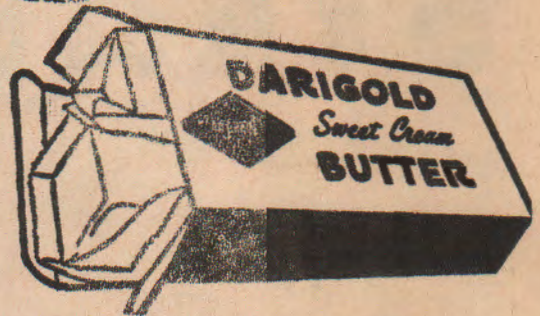

Everyone is urged to stop in on their way home for a delicious meal of homemade goodies.

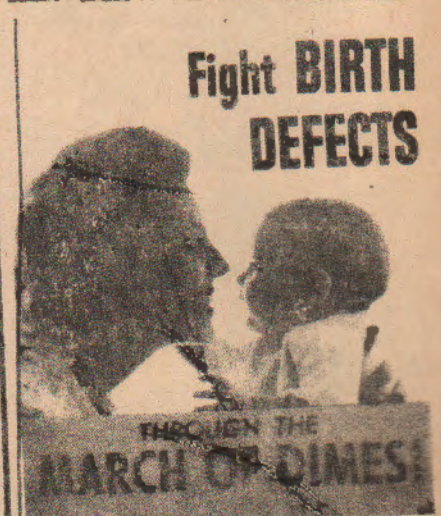
LOCAL 7th & 8th GRADES CLASH
