


The Chugiak High School Mustangs are traveling to Kodiak to play the Kodiak High School Bears on January 21-22. The high school has chartered a

OLD CHUGIAK: A local man was held up by a masked gunman last Monday evening within a block of the Anchorage Police Station.

The victim, Fred Bustrum of mile 17 1/2, said that he was preparing to enter his car for his return trip to Chngiak, when a man asked him for a ride. Bustrum said that he noticed the man was wearing a ski hat with face mask which completely obscured his features. When Bustrum declined to give the man a lift, he then pulled a gun on Bustrum and then proceeded to rob him of several parcels that were in the car. Bustrum said the packages contained hardware for making lamps and bleces of ivory which he used for making jewelry, and gift items. He said the total value of the items was approximately \$200.


