### RURAL 30 DELEGATES MEET

CHUGIAK: Glenn Briggs Borough Assemblyman from Section one, to-tlay offered his explaination of the stand which he says the Borough Assembly must take on the much tliscussed City-Borough merger.

"In keeping with the intent of the framers of the Borough Act to pliminate duplication of Government, the Board of Directors of the Spenard Utility District was dissolved and the administrative functions of that Board were assumed by the Borough Assembly. As a Service Are of the Borough, the residents of that area are now being provided the same services at no additional cost to the resident s outside that area."

"The framers of the Borough Act apparently did not anticipate that a first class city might desire to become a Service Area of a borough. At least no provision was made in the Act for such a transfer of power."

"The administration of the City of Anchorage expressed a desire to dissolve as a city and become a Service Area of the Borough. The City council asked the Borough Ass-emly to join it in requesting legis-

lation which would permit such a change of status."

"The Assembly by a vote of 7-1 agreed to support the request of the Council if and pro viding any legislation proposed would not reduce the protection now guaranteed by our second class berough status

"As an intergral part of the Borough, the City was clearly within its rights in requesting support of the Assembly for permissive legislation to accomplish its desire. The Borough Assembly representing the whole of the Borough would have been derelict in its responsibility had it denied the request of the City.

had it denied the request of the City.

'It is now the task of our State legislators to frame legislation which will be acceptable to the City and win approval of the voters of the rural areas."
"Once the proposed legislation is

made available for public review many questions will arise in the many questions will arise in the minds of the people both within the City and ouside the City on the timing, scope, and feasibility of the city becoming a Service Area of the Borough. All questions must be sadsfacorily answered before and final proposed legislation is placed before the voters at the polls for acceptance or rejection.

Members of the Borough and City administrations have volunteered to appear upon request before any citizen group organized for the pur-pose of open and free discussion of

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

This meeting, according to Com-mittee Chairman Aubrey Long, pro-vides the general public the opportunity to express both berbally and in writing, recommendations to the Board of Fish and Gme for changes in the coming season's Game and Guiding Regulations. This is the opportunity, says Committee Chairman Long, for people who are dissatisfied with present Game and Guiding Regulations to make recom-mendations for changes, All written proposale will be forwarded to the Board of Fish and Game.

Proposals must be written for presentation to the Committee, Open discussion will be permitted on the various proposals which are pres-ented in writing. Committee Chairman Long advises that unless proposals are accompanied by written reasons, or justification the Board of Fish and Game will not consider them when it meets to set regulaions for the coming season. Pro-posals for changes in Sport Fishing or Commercial Fishing will not be

or Commercial Fishing will not be accepted at this meeting unless it is regarded as an emergency.

In view of the recent surge activity in the Commercial fur market, it is anticipated that fur trapping may be of more than casual interest at coming meetings.

### NO PLANS TO IMPROVE BIRCHWOOD ROAD SEEN

There appears little likelihood that the hazard to travelers of the hill on the Birchwood Loop Road between the Glenn Highway and the high school can be reduced before the sonctruction season of 1968, according to Borough Assemblyman Glenn Briggs.

Briggs said "It has been urged that the hill be cut down and widen-

during the construction season of 1966 as an advance program to

the major rebuilding and alignment of the Loop Road in 1968. However test drilling of the hill by the geo-logy division of the Highway Department shows it to be permanent bed-

Briggs explained that the cost of any work done on the road prior to the letting of Federal Aid Secondary contract in 1967 would have to be done from 100% State maintenance from which District Highwa ance funds which District Highwa engineer Costy Steen says are not

available for such a costly project.

Present engineering plans of the
new Glenn Highway paralleling the present Glenn Highway to the west retains the east end of the upper Birchwood Loop road as a connector between the two highway. Plans call for cutting down of the bedrock road bed by seventeen feet and widening to 33 feet, including the four-foot grav-eled shoulders on each side. According to the pop-construction

section of the Highway Division the schedule for the new Birchwood Loop road provides for obtaining ease-ments for the right of way this spring engineering of the proposed new road during the 1966 and 1967 and letting of the contract in the fall of 1967. Advancing of the construction schedule by one year is being advocated.

The Division of Highways is being urged to reduce the steep grade and widen the curve at the base of one hill on the Eagle River Road, which has proven to be most hazardous to drivers particularly during winter. This improvement could be made during the 1966 construction season at a small cost to the State, Briggs concluded
