## RURAL GROUP SEEKS TO SLOW METRO



ED WILLIS, LOCAL RESIDENT  
HEADING UP "RURAL 30", A  
GROUP REPRESENTING THE  
30 RURAL BOROUGH PRECINCTS

**CHUGIAK:** A non-partisan group which will consist of representatives from the thirty voting precincts in the Borough outside the City of Anchorage, is being organized by a local resident.

Ed Willis, of Eagle River, who has dubbed this group "Rural 30", feels the need of such an organization to protect the interests of the rural sections of the Borough.

Willis, who is acting as temporary chairman for this organization, has called a public meeting for the residents of Borough Section One (the Greater Chugiak Area) to be held on Tuesday, February 8th, at Chugiak High School. The meeting will begin promptly at 8:00pm, and Willis urges all residents of the area to attend.

Willis has been in contact with leaders from other rural areas in the borough, and has asked them to set up public meetings within their respective areas. At these meetings he hopes they will select delegates to attend an organizational meeting of "Rural 30", which will be scheduled in the near future. At this time, permanent officers will be elected, a steering committee appointed, and a plan of action chosen.

### BOROUGH ASSEMBLY ASK METRO LEGISLATION

**ANCHORAGE:** In special session Monday night the Borough Assembly voted 7 to 1 to instruct the Legislature through the Borough attorney to prepare proposed legislation to prepare proposed legislation which would permit the City of Anchorage to dissolve and merge with the Borough as a service area. Assemblyman Joe Graham cast the negative vote.

The proposed legislation will be approved or disapproved by the voters of the Borough at the poles. Any legislation proposed will not reduce the protection of a Second Class Borough now given the voters residing outside the City.

Budgets are now being prepared for the Boroughwide services for fiscal year 1966-67. The fiscal year begins July 1, 1966.

The Chuglak Mustangs missed their big upset this year just on fouls. It was East's fouls and Chuglak's foul shooting that kept them in the game. The Mustangs hit 73% of their free throws and the T-Birds hit only 41%. They started off with a lead and stayed close to the Thunderbirds with a 10-9 first quarter advantage. But they let the East team outscore them, not too badly, for a 28-25 halftime score.

The Mustangs then built up a commanding lead in the next quarter and kept it, ending the third quarter, 44-39.

The last quarter was a tough one for the Mustangs, fouling heavily and finally letting the T-Birds catch them for an exciting 55-53 fourth quarter score. The next overtime was cautiously played, with East scoring on a final field goal by Tom Coburn, and the Mustangs scored on a pair of free throws by Jim Kohring. The second overtime was the fatal one for the Mustangs. Lester Stephens, Butch Phillips, Louis Doores, Bill Mielke and Rick Doggett all fouled out, which left Jim Kohring as the only starter in as East scored 9 points for a 64-55 hard won victory.

Lester Stephens scored 23 points and Bill Mielke was the only other Mustang in double figures. Chuglak had 31 fouls to East's 23.

The Chuglak Mustangs lost their second game of the season to the West Anchorage Eagles by an even farther spread than last time.

The Mustangs only scored 12 field goals to West's 34, but made it up on foul shots. 36 fouls were called on West, while only 19 were called on the Mustangs.

Lester Stephens, again scoring above 20 points, topped the Mustangs with 26 points. Stephens was also high for the game. Bill Mielke, in this game shot 21 free throws, and had a total of 12 points for the night.

The Mustangs wrestling team lost their first two meets this weekend, against the two toughest teams in the state. In their first match, against the score was 42-5, the five points being on a pin from Chuglak's 112, but East won the 120, 127, 133, 138 and 154 weights by pins and the 145, 165, 180 and heavy weight matches by decision.

The next night, the Chuglak wrestling team faced the state champions, West Anchorage. The score was 10-32, West's favor. Those ten points were on two forfeits in the 103 and 120 pound divisions. The 112, 138, 145, 154 and 165 weights were by decisions, and the 127, 133 and heavyweight classes were won by pins.

Next weekend the wrestling team faces Seward and Kenal, both matchers here. The wrestlers from Chuglak should take both of these as they did last year.

The course is sponsored by the Obedience Training Club Of Chugiak. Membership in the club is not required to participate in the training classes.

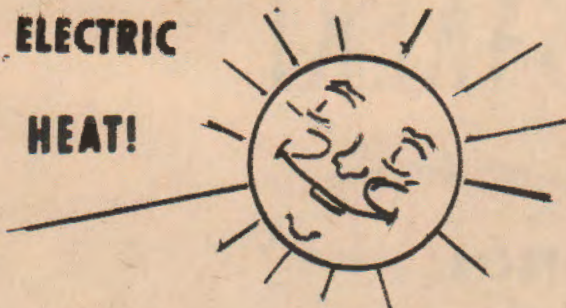
