

## RURAL 30 DELEGATES CHOSEN

### WATER PROBLEM AT CHUGIAK SCHOOL

OLD CHUGIAK: Children attending the Chugiak Grade School were treated to an extra day of weekend when a lack of water made it necessary to call of school at the Chugiak Elementary School last Monday.

According to Emerson Sortore, school principal, the trouble was caused by a loose footvalve in the pump, rather than the annual water shortage which the school experiences.

The loose valve was discovered after over 100 feet of double pipe was pulled from the well casing which runs to a depth of 109 feet.

The valve which was only finger tight, had been causing the pump to lose its prime.

The valve was tightened only after much effort and community cooperation made it possible to pull the pump. A path had to be bulldozed to the pumphouse, in order for the well rig to be able to move into position. The rig had been summoned from the Chugiak High School where it had been drilling a well. It was then discovered that the area which the rig would have to cover to reach the pumphouse was too soft for the truck to drive in under its own power, and that the tractor with which Russell Obberg had been clearing the snow was not powerful enough to pull the truck through. It was only after F.S. Lee was able to move in with his bulldozer and drag the well rig into position that the actual work was able to begin.

The Penn Jersey drilling crew worked until after midnight making the repair, so that school could begin on schedule Tuesday morning.

### DOG CLUBS OFFER CHANGES TO ORD. 60

ANCHORAGE: A group of approximately 150 persons representing dog owners and members of dog clubs, offered a number of suggested changes to the proposed Borough Ordinance 60 (Dog Control).

The meeting, which was scheduled to be held at the GAAB School District Administration Building had to adjourn to the Romig Hill Junior High Auditorium to accommodate the crowd.

Prior to the hearing the Borough Attorney had revised the proposed Ordinance, clarifying some of the items which had not been favored by the dog groups.

One group of Anchorage dog clubs, represented by attorney presented a list of ten changes they recommended. One change concerned not limiting the distance from a neighbors property which would be legal to operate a kennel, but to instead substitute very definite and strict rules which must be complied with to operate a kennel. Also they asked that any kennel owner be notified in advance of any pending inspection of his kennels, and that if said inspection found the conditions unsatisfactory, the owner be given a period of time to comply with the regulations rather than have his kennel license immediately revoked. They also asked that dog licenses run concurrently with rabies vaccinations. They requested that the ten dollar kennel fee cover all

BIRCHWOOD: The first meeting of the group which has been named Rural 30, was held last night at Chugiak High School.

Approximately 150 residents of the Greater Chugiak Area showed up, and heard temporary chairman of Rural 30, Ed Willis of Eagle River give an explanation of the group and what it hopes to accomplish.

Willis told them that Rural 30 will be composed of delegates from all 30 of the Borough Voting Precincts outside the City of Anchorage. This group will attempt to persuade the State Legislature to delay the passage of any legislation permitting the the formation of the so called Metro unit until it can be determined whether or not the rights of the residents of rural areas will be protected.

Present at this meeting to answer questions, was Borough Assemblyman Joseph Graham of Spenard. Graham was the only member of the Borough Assembly to vote against requesting the legislature to grant the permissive legislation.

The meeting progressed rapidly, with the selection of three delegates from each of the local voting precincts. The delegates are as follows; Peters Creek Precinct, Bill Lowe, Walter Purcell and George Smith, Eagle River Precinct, Ed Willis, Harvey Pullen and Dale Pierson, and Chugiak Precinct, Lee Jordan, Charles Richner and Roger Tyler.

These delegates will meet within the week and elect a chairman, vice chairman and what ever officers they deem necessary.

The group also voted to pass a resolution, which read as follows:

"Now therefore be it resolved that the voters of Peters Creek, Chugiak and Eagle River precincts do hereby petition the Alaska State Legislature pertaining to a change in the present status of this Borough and City as being premature, ill considered and not reflecting the wishes of the electorate."

There will be a public meeting of Rural 30 held on Friday, February 11th at 8:00pm at the Rabbit Creek School.

All voters have been urged to write to State House Speaker Mike Gravel concerning their views on the merger.

dogs within the kennel, eliminating the necessity for individual licenses for each dog. Also that dog licenses need not be worn while the animal is engaged in competition, training or hunting. They further requested that no dogs be offered for adoption from the animal shelter that show evidence of a communicable disease. Also asked was that veterinarians be permitted to waive the need for rabies vaccinations for dogs they feel may be harmed by it.

The Borough Assembly plans to take these and other suggestions under consideration, and redraft Ordinance 60 with these suggestions in mind. This draft will be available to residents of the Borough by Monday, February 14th. The Assembly will meet again on February 21st, at which time they will consider passage of the Ordinance.

### ENROLLMENT FOR MEDICARE THURS.

OLD CHUGIAK: The residents of the Greater Chuglak Area will be able to sign up for Medicare locally, this Thursday, February 10th.

Mr. Don Arens, of the Social Security Office, will be at the Chuglak Post Office on this day to accept applications.

Those eligible for Medicare are persons who are over 65 years of age and still employed, widows who are over age 60, children ages 18 through 22 years who have received benefits in the past and who are still attending school, and of course, anyone over age 65 who is drawing Social Security benefits.

Deadline for applying for Medicare is March 31st. Mr. Arens will make only this one appearance in the Greater Chuglak Area. Anyone who is unable to see him at the Chuglak Post office on this day, may apply by writing to Social Security, Box 2139, Anchorage.

Mr. Arens will be at the Post Office all day, beginning at 9:00am.

Richardson Reservation, on the east by the Chugach Mts., and on the west by Ft. Richardson Reservation."

This petition will be presented to the GAAB with its proposed contract for fire service. The Borough is then expected to place the question on the ballot at the next election for the approval of the homeowners in the Eagle River Area. The Fire Company has arranged to have Mr. Bud Saylor, assistant to the Borough Chairman present at a public meeting which will be held on February 22nd at 7:30pm in the Eagle River Elementary School. Mr. Saylor will attempt to answer any questions concerning a Fire Service Area. Accompanying Mr. Saylor at this meeting will be Mr. Jerry Overstreet, of the Borough Planning Commission, who will talk to the residents about planning and zoning.

**MUSTANG LOSE TWO  
TO PALMER**

The Mustangs lost the first night to the Palmer Moose by a 52-66 margin, although it was the first half that messed them up.

Palmer jumped to a quick lead and built it up to a 22-4 by the end of the first quarter. The Mustangs failed to do much better in the second quarter, as they scored only 8 points to the Moose's 13, to leave the floor with a discouraging 12-35 score. But the Mustangs did not give up and outscored the Moose by four points in the following quarter, but still behind by 19 points.
