JUNEAU: The Alaska State Legislature will not act on House Bill 409 (Metro merger) this year, according to a resolution introduced by the Local Government Committee.

The resolution was made following a hearing with the committee and delegates of Rural 30, a group composed of the rural voting precincts in the Greater Anchorage Area Borough.

The resolution stated: "Whereas this important and controversial legislation requires considerable analysis and public hearings not possible during the balance of the present legislative session; the Legislative Council is directed to make an analysis and report on House Bill 409 based upon testimony received at public hearings in the areas likely to be affected and report its findings and recommendations to the Fifth Legislature in January 1967."

MAN KILLED WHEN CAR HITS GRADER

EAGLE RIVER: Drinking and excessive speed were the cause of the death of a Palmer man when his 1969 Buick crashed into the rear of a road grader early last Friday morning.

Rex Oial Hardage of Palmer was returning from Anchorage at 5:50am when he overtook a road grader at mile 13 1/2 on the Eagle River Hill. He struck the rear of the grader, totally demolishing his car and inflicting an estimated \$2,000 damage to the road equipment. The grader was the property of the U.S. Army, and was enroute to the Artillery Road in Eagle River where the Army maintains an installation. The driver of the grader, Dwight Allen Johnson of the 582 Engineers, Ft. Richardson and his passenger, Lawrence W. Blake also of Ft. Richardson were uninjured.

Hardage was taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance, where he died of multiple head injuries.

Ripe tomatoes and cucumbers in early summer in Alaska are about as rare as pink tennis shoes on elephants which we're hearing about lately.

You can have them, though, with not much more than a glassed-in porch or big window, along with some soil and a few five-gallon pails.

In a nut shell, here's how it works. Fill the five-gallon pails with good garden soil after putting in about three inches of small rocks at the bottom. Plant your tomato seeds in some and cucumbers in the others.

When the seedlings are up and well established, thin out to six or eight good plants well scattered over the surface of the container. Let these grow for three weeks or so and you'll see two or three that are bigger and stronger than the rest. Clip off, don't pull, all but three of the best cucumber plants. Leave only one tomato plant in each container. The advantage is, no setbacks from transplanting.

Now listen to the real space saver. Put a strong hook at the top of the window and hang up the pails that have cucumbers in them. Put the tomato pails directly below them on the floor.

The first time I saw a real old Sourdough with a window full of cucumbers hanging from the top pails and tomatoes trained up on strings, until both tomatoes and cucumbers looked like a salad, it was hard to believe.

Those top pails are pretty heavy to hang, he told me, but the early tomatoes and cukes are worth it.

LOCAL SCIENCE FAIR WINNERS ANNOUNCED

BIRCHWOOD: Winners of the 2nd Annual Chugiak High School Science Fair were announced today.

The judging was on two levels, Junior and Senior high, and in two main divisions, Biological and Physical Sciences. The two groups were subdivided into secondary categories, the Biological into Biology, Zoology and Health and Medicine. The Physical Science into Physics, Math, Chemistry and Earth and Space Sciences. Entries were accepted by individual students or by groups.

The entries were judged against a standard, rather than against each other entry, so that a student might be the only one entering in a division, but still not be awarded first place if his or her entry did not measure up to the standard.

Winners were in the Junior High Division; a group entry by two eighth Philomena Auble in Medicine and Health an entry on the Human Heart. They were awarded 1st place in the sub-group and 1st place overall.

Another group entry, by two brothers, Rory (8th grade) and Garth (9th) Olson. Their entry was in the field of Physics and was a Solar Distiller. They were awarded a second place.

In the Zoology division, Randy Phillips a ninth grader was awarded an Honorable mention in that sub-class with an entry concerning the hatching of baby chicks. An 8th

Grader, Steve Czerski was awarded a 3rd place in the sub-class of physics and a 3rd place overall with an entry on Ultra Sconics. An Honorable Mention in the sub-class of and also in the over-all classification was given to Randy Schetzla, a 7th grader for an entry in the Earth and Space sciences.

An eighth grader, Linda Dechant class of Chemistry and 2nd place in overall with her entry titled "The Perfect Food."

In the Senior High division, there were two winners, Harold Schetzla, a senior was awarded a Honorable Mention in the sub class of physics and Honorable Mention overall with an entry on the Recovery and refining of gold. Kaye Ekstedt a Junior was awarded a first place in the sub-class of Medicine and Health and a first place overall with an entry that deals in Drug dangers.

Students qualifying in the over-all classes will be invited to compete in the Regional Science Fair to be held at AMU on March 26th and 27th.

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

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MEDAL DESIGN WINNER ANNOUNCED

JUNEAU: Governor William A. Egan announced today that the winning design for the State Medal for Heroism created last year by the Legislature was submitted by Kathy Shapley, it of Craig.

The Legislature called upon the Governor to arrange for design of the medal through a statewide design competition participated in by the school children of Alaska. The Department of Education conducted the competition. Memoranda containing details of the competition were sent to the administrators of all schools in Alaska. A total of 429 designs were submitted for consideration.

The Design Selection Committee was composed of Brigadier General William S. Elmote, the State's adjutant general; Mr. Joseph Briones, American Legion service officer for Alaska; Mr. Thomas A. Morgan, Juneau businessman; and Captain George R. Boyde Jr., Chief of Staff for the U.S. Coast Guard in Juneau.

Governor Egan wrote Miss Shapley, "It gives me great pleasure to inform you that your design for a State Medal for Heroism is the final choice of the Design Selection Committee. It is truly an outstanding design. Your use of outstretched hands to depict one human being coming to the aid of another is very moving. I know the medal that will be designed from your drawings will be one in which all Alaskans will take pride."

The committee recommended that the medal be executed in gold and suspended from a blue ribbon serving as a field for the Big Dipper and North Star. The committee further recommended that the names of the persons to be cited for heroism be inscribed on the back of the medals together with mention of the heroic deeds performed and the dates.



His set-up was on a glassed in porch with no heat except from the front door. The tomatoes were eight inches high by the first week in March and the cucumbers were already starting to hang over the rim of the top pail.

Of course, you have to keep a sharp eye out for lack of food and water. Big, fast growing plants use a huge amount of fertilizer and water, and with only a pail full of soil to get it from, you can see they would be in poor shape fast if not tended to.

If you haven't already done so, you should pick up a publication or two from the Cooperative Extension Service. They are "Greenhouses in Alaska", Extension publication number 30, and "Fertilizers for the Home Gardener", publication number 10.

If you need more information on growing tomatoes and cucumbers, your local Extension agent or the Sourdough Gardener will be glad to help.

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
