

BIRCHWOOD: Frank Austin was elected President of the Chugiak High School PTA at the March meeting held last Monday night.

Other officers chosen were Vice President, Dick Kerbow; Secretary Roberts, and Council Delegate, outgoing President Vernon Moore.

A report on the results of fund raising activities at the Stew and Fun day were given with a gross of \$218 taken in. This was broken down to \$131.70 from the dessert booth, \$80.10 from the sale of balloons, and \$6.55 from donations. Expenses came to \$96.45, which left a net profit of \$17.90.

The proceeds were sufficient to meet the goal of \$250 for the PTA Scholarship, and also to leave the PTA an operating fund.

POSTAL FEES TO INCREASE

CHUGIAK: Increases in money orders, insurance, registry, certified mail and C.O.D. rates will become effective March 26th, 1966 according to local Postmasters Paul Swanson and Lucille Fly.

The cost of operating these five special services now exceeds revenues by \$60 million annually. The fee increases will narrow the cost-revenue gap by \$36 million annually. The fee increases will narrow the cost revenue gap by \$36 million, based on business handled in Fiscal Year 1965.

Fees for money orders, registry and COD were changed in 1961; insurance and certified mail in 1957.

MEDICARE BLANKS AT POST OFFICE

EAGLE RIVER: Postmaster Lucille Fly, of the Eagle River Post Office, announced today that applications blanks for supplemental Medicare benefits are available at the counter of the Eagle River Post Office.

The application blanks are being made available as the Social Security Administration seeks to contact 3.1 million senior citizens before a March 31 deadline imposed by the Medicare law.

President Johnson has proclaimed March as "National Medicare Enrollment Month." He urged all federal agencies and all citizens to cooperate in enrolling senior citizens in the program.

Initially, some two and one-half million application blanks were distributed to nearly 34,000 main post offices throughout the 50 states. Additional forms are available as needed.

Through direct mailings and other means, the Social Security Administration has had contact with 16 of the 19.1 million citizens who will be 65 or over on July 1. Of the 16 million who replied, less than one million said they did not want to sign up for the supplemental program.

The supplemental program costs \$3 a month, and provides doctor bill and other benefits. Everyone 65 and over is eligible for the basic hospital benefits under Medicare.

A copy of the application blank is displayed in the lobby bulletin board of the Eagle River Post Office.

Senior citizens who reached 65 before 1966 face a two year delay if they do not sign up by March 31. The application forms are preaddressed to the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Maryland.

This Week
in Washington

WASHINGTON—The Appropriations Committee held the center of the stage in the House of Representatives this past week as it conducted hearings on the appropriations requests of the various Federal departments and agencies. I made several appearances before the subcommittee on Interior Department Appropriations to ask for full funding of the Commercial Fisheries Research and Development Act of 1964, under which Alaska is eligible to receive \$400,000 annually. Under the present budget the state would receive only \$208,000. I also asked the subcommittee to approve funds for authorized studies of anadromous fish. Funds for this program were authorized by Congress last year, but were not included in the Interior Department's budget.

In an earlier column, I reported I had protested to the House Committee on Appropriations the proposed cuts in the School Lunch and Special Milk Programs. This week the Chairman of the House Appropriations Subcommittee for Agriculture, Representative Jamie Whitten, advised me that he strongly supports both programs and will make every effort to see that adequate funds are provided.

Of interest to Alaskans is H.R. 4665, which recently cleared the House, and which would eliminate limits on income tax deductions for mineral exploration expenditures. The Senate is expected to act upon the measure later this session.

The most fascinating item to cross my desk this week was a report that the First Lady's beautification program—which includes the elimination of auto graveyards—is expected to make scrap metal more valuable. The government, in collaboration with

industry, is undertaking a research programme to make auto scrap economically usable, and the thinking is that the end result will be a profitable business for the nation's scrap dealers.

ANCHORAGE—For Alaska taxpayers, 1965 tax returns should be mailed to 540 Fifth Avenue, Anchorage, Alaska.

Thousands of taxpayers call Internal Revenue Service every week, asking for the correct mailing address, District Director of Internal Revenue, Lewis J. Conrad said today. Other thousands mail their returns to the wrong office.

When this happens, Mr. Conrad said, returns must be sorted and forwarded to the correct offices. This delays the processing of the returns and refund checks.

February 25th, are put into effect under the existing administrative authority of the Postmaster General.

The increases include: MONEY ORDER FEES: Domestic and International money order fees will be increased by 5 cents. INSURANCE FEES: The minimum fee bracket will be increased from \$10 to \$15 and the minimum fee will be 20 cents instead of 10 cents. The revised insurance fees will be as follows: \$0.01 - \$15, - 20 cents; \$15 - \$50, - 30 cents, \$50.01 - \$100, - 40 cents; \$100.01 - \$150, - 50 cents; \$150.01 - \$200 - 60 cents.

REGISTRY FEES: The present 60 cents and 75 cents fees will be combined into a single fee at 75¢ for values up to \$100. Registry fees for articles valued in excess of \$100 will remain unchanged. COD FEES: The present 40 cents and 50 cents fee brackets will be combined into one fee bracket at 60 cents for amounts up to \$10. There will be no change in the fees covering items valued above \$10.

CERTIFIED MAIL: The fee will be increased 10 cents from the present 20 cents per item to 30 cents.

Losses incurred in the operation of special services are paid from funds drawn from the Federal Treasury. The fee increases will shift a substantial portion of the special service cost borne by the public to the users of these services.


