BIRCHWOOD: Next Saturday, March 12, Chugiak High School will present its second annual Chugiak Stew and Fun Day.

There will be fun and food for the entire family from 12 noon to 7:30 pm. Everything from Ping Pong to Basketball and dancing to Wildlife Movies will keep the attendants entertained for the day's activities.

Starting at 12 noon, there will be indoor races for grade school students in the Chugiak High Gymnasium. Throughout the entire day there will be cartoons for the kiddies and babysitting for infants. The highlight of past years Chugiak Stew and Fun Day, the Faculty versus the Varsity Basketball game, will begin at 4 in the afternoon.

Tickets sold at the door or by Chugiak High Students, will cost \$1.50 for adults and students over 12 years, 75¢ for students under 12, and 25¢ for pre-school. At the end of the day's festivities, there will be a Varsity Wrestling match between Chugiak High School and West Anchorage High School.

Musical interludes including square dancing and a band concert by Mr. Daley's Advanced Band, and dancing for students will be held most of the day.

The famous Chugiak Stew will be served from 12 noon to 7:30 pm, along with coleslaw, jello, cookies, rolls and punch, coffee or milk.

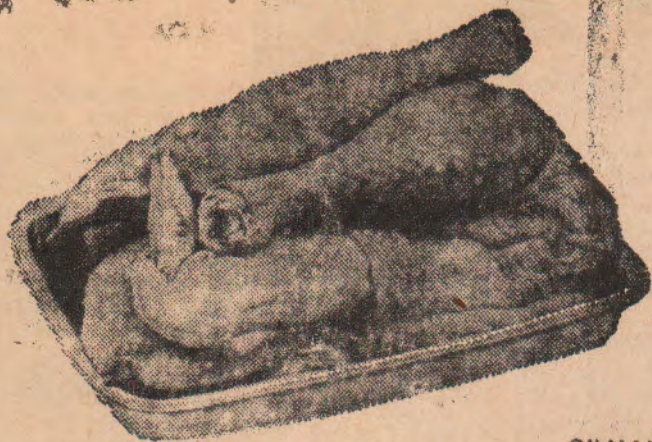

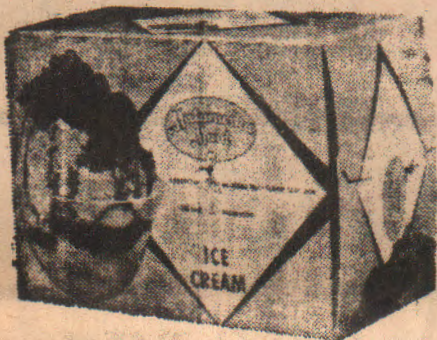
