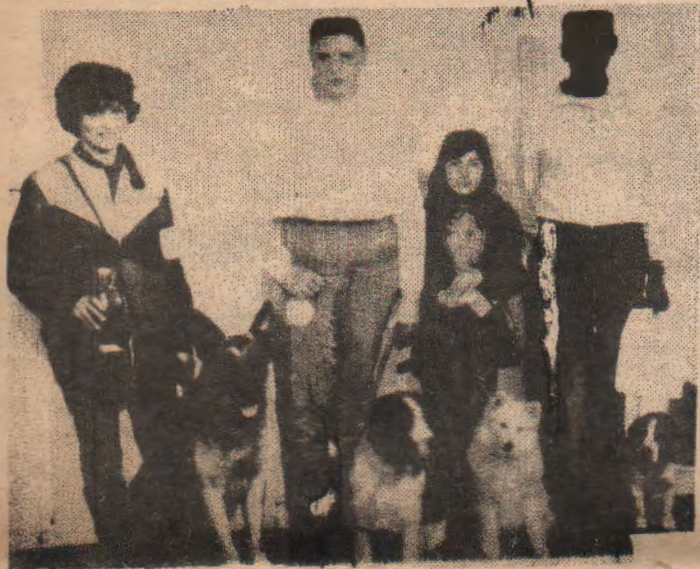


LOCAL YOUTH NAMED FOR STATE HONOR

CHUGIAK: A Chugiak High School Junior has been selected to represent the State of Alaska at the "Voice of Youth" seminar, to be held in Aspen Colorado on May 20th and 22nd.

Walter Kallenberg, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kallenberg of Ptarmic Valley Road in Old Chugiak is the local student. Walter was selected by the Chugiak High School faculty in competition with other junior class boy students. Walter was tied in qualification for the honor, with Gary Hoag, and the final selection was made on the basis of a presentation that each boy was asked to give. The subject of the presentation could be either "World Affairs", "National Affairs", or "Free Enterprise" all three subjects which will be covered at the seminar.

Coordinator for the State of Alaska on this seminar is Lowell Thomas Jr. who chose the student to represent Alaska from among the candidates of the various high schools.

In addition to the May seminar, Walter will attend a second seminar to be held next November.

Expenses for transporting the students to the seminar are paid by the Kiwanis Foundation of Denver Col.

This is the second time that a Chugiak High School student has been selected on statewide competition to represent Alaska this year.

In February, Dorothy Wentland, of Chugiak High School was one of two Alaskan High School Students to be chosen to attend the "Student Seminar on Education" in Washington D.C. This was the Kirkland Workshop for High School youth, and was held at the Statler Hilton Hotel at the nation's capital.

This was sponsored by the the Institute for Development of Educational Activities (IDEA), and all expenses paid by the Kittering Foundation.

Dorothy was selected in much the same manner that Walter Kallenberg was chosen. Recommended following interviews by local faculty and higher school authorities.

Upon her return to Chugiak, Dorothy reported to the local faculty on the subjects covered at the workshop.

HERE AND THERE

When Kotzebue, the big black cat, didn't come in for dinner Friday night, we were somewhat concerned because he is always around at that time. Our anxiety grew when it was realized that he hadn't been around all day. What does one do? Searching for a black cat after dark presents some difficulties.

The bad news was learned the next morning. Some of the local children had found Kotzebue dead along the fence line, only a hundred feet or so from the house. We immediately went out to investigate and our findings were sore of assumption - that he had been hit by an automobile, had managed to get that far from the road, collapsed and died from exposure.

All the local dogs had long since learned that this old hunter was more than a match for them, one or severally, and there were no external wounds to indicate that the dogs had finally got to him.

Kotzebue was our favorite cat. He was acquired along with our present home as he had refused to move with the former owners. Of undetermined age and origin, he was not particularly friendly, but could be most affectionate when he wanted his ears scratched. During the summer, he would bring in birds, shrews and an occasional rabbit, showing his hill to us until we acknowledged it. Then it would be removed to be eaten, or sometime, given to another cat.

We brought the still limp body into the house, wrapped it in an old pajama top and placed Kotzebue in a box. A hole was dug down by the old green house beds, and the old friend was laid to rest.

At one time or the other, most of us have lost a pet animal and our feelings of sadness can be understood. As is sometimes done, we rationalized that maybe it was for the best; the cat was growing old, he appeared to have died peacefully and the body did not deteriorate, lost along the roadside. But we were still sorry to see him go.

The next morning, as we were slowly awaking to realize that it was a beautiful Easter Sunday, we were abruptly shocked to full alertness when our young son tossed a big, black cat onto our bed, Kotzebue! Dirty, hungry, but definitely alive! This sort of thing somewhat mixes one's emotions, to say the least. Was the coat of the deceased cat just a wee bit shinier than Kotzebue's? Was he quite as large? How could we make such a mistake?

Whoever owned a large, black cat with long hair and a small spot of white on its throat can be assured that their cat received a decent burial. And for us, we are happy that a mistake was made. Or did we make a mistake? Frankly, we are not yet mentally prepared to inspect the grave site.

MAN INJURED WHEN CAR LEAVES ROAD

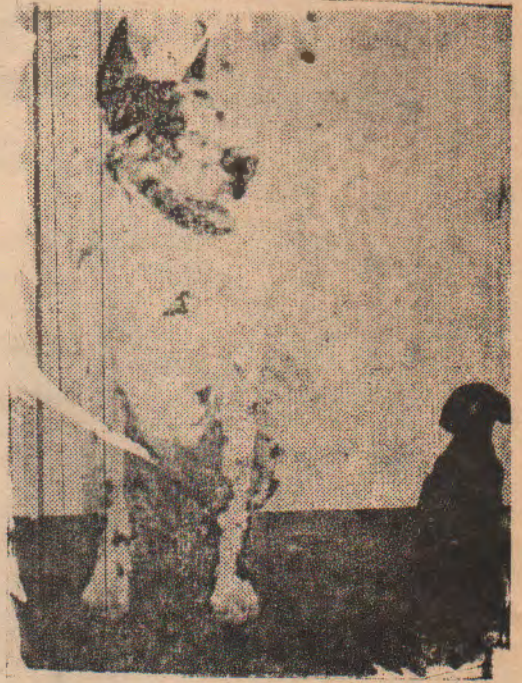

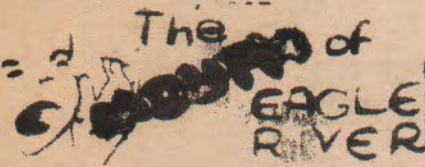

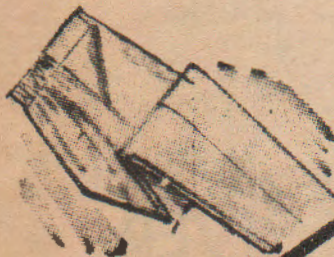
