BIRCHWOOD: A heart attack claimed the life of a Birchwood man early last Saturday morning.

Whitman had no relatives in Alaska. Nearest kin is, a niece Mrs. Shurett of Syacuga Alabamb and a mother of that same city.

Whitman who worked as a sheetmetal worker, was a member of the Pioneers of Alaska, and well knowa in the Anchorage Area.



Rev. Marcus Price, also a serviceman, was called as Pastor in January of 1958. Under his leadership the mission was constituted into a church in February of 1958, with 52 charger members. The new name of the Church was Eagle River First Baptist, and the present property was purchased. The first deacon to be ordained by the church was Sgt. T.F. Moore, of the Anchorage Police Department. Rev. Price rotated in July of 1958, after seeing the church experience a substantial growth.

growth, Rev. James C. Morgan served as interim pastor for a short while, until Rev. E.C. Chron was called as pastor in September of 1958. Rev. Chron served the church until December 1, 1960, and had the privilege of seeing the church prosper space. The church also started two new missions, which are now known



as First Baptist Church of Birchwood and Muldoon Road Baptist Church.

Rev. James Henderson, a serviceman was called as pastor in December of 1960 and served the church faithfully until his rotation in August of 1962.

In August of the same year, Rev. Jack Camp was called as pastor and served the church faithfully for two years. Under his leadership, the church ordained two more deacons, George Moore and Norman Vandiver and completed much of the unfinished basement of the church.

Rev. E.C. Chron was again called as pastor in May of 1964 and let the church into another building program which is being completed at this time. Of the original 52 charter memb-

ers, only two are still with the church, Bill Konesky of Eagle River, and Dennis Klein of U.S. Navy. Other charter members living in Alaska are T.F. and Mary Lou Moore, of Anchorage, John and Edna Griffin of Anchorage, and Ollie and Kathy Walker of Old Chugiak.

Each of the candidates were then allowed five minutes in which to talk to the membership and present their candidacy. Dan C. Bell, of Eagle River requested that he be permitted to read a report which he prepared and printed copies of which had been distributed to the which had been distributed to the membership. Since, the reading of the report would take in excess of the five minutes allowed, he said that the four nominees from the floor had offered to let him use their time to complete the reading. The parlimentarian ruled that this was out of order, since the time was spec-ifically allotted for candidated to present their own campaign. Bell then proceed to read his re-

port. When his allotted time was gone, Ralph Anderson, one of the floor nominees, took over the readfloor nominees, took over the read-ing of the report. Objections from some of the membership, that since each person had been presented a copy of the report, reading of it by the candidates was unnecessary and would make the meeting drag out too long, brought the reading of the report to a halt.

Bell, and the four floor nominees

withdrew their candidacy just prior

to the casting of the first ballot. In the first ballot, the vote was as follows; Welch, 32, Vasilie, 58; DeHate 25; Stepens, 73, Silfven, 32; Mayr, 95; Tucker 135; Bolen 99; and Miller 114. Total registry at the meeting was 346.

At a motion from the floor, the five low candidates were dropped, and the 2nd Ballot was as follows; Mayr, 116, Tucker, 187; Bol-en, 150 and Miller, 170. Elected were Tucker (incumbent) for 2 years, and Miller (by petition) for 2 years.

Proposition 1, which asked that voting proceedure be changed to require only a simple plurality for Board of Director elections instead of a majority was passed by only two votes. Results of that vote were, For the proposition, 150, againsi, 148.

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
