

SCHOOL PLANS TOLD AT BEL BREAKFAST

HEART ATTACK CLAIMS BIRCHWOOD MAN

BIRCHWOOD: A heart attack claimed the life of a Birchwood man early last Saturday morning.

Dead is George Robert Whitman, 56 of mile 1 1/2 North Birchwood Road.

Whitman, who is unmarried lived with two friends, Jim M. Strootmar and Raymond O. Leary. When Whitman was stricken one of the men called the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company Ambulance.

According to the State Police, they were summoned by Eagle River Fire Chief Tom Take, when he found that Whitman had apparently died several minutes prior to the arrival of the ambulance.

Whitman had no relatives in Alaska. Nearest kin is, a niece Mrs. Shurett of Syacuga Alabamba and a mother of that same city.

Whitman who worked as a sheet-metal worker, was a member of the Pioneers of Alaska, and well known in the Anchorage Area.

Funeral arrangements are being held by Spenard Heights Mortuary.

GIRL HURT IN FALL FROM TRUCK

EAGLE RIVER: An Eagle River girl suffered minor injuries in the fall from the back of a truck in which she was riding last Friday afternoon.

Injured was Loretta Roebuck, age 18 of mile 1 Eagle River Road.

Loretta was riding in the back of a slow moving 1958 Chevrolet 1/2 pick up truck, registered to Waneta Smith, of Mile 20 1/2 in Old Chugiak, and driven by her daughter Susan Marie Smith age 18.

The accident took place on the south side of the Eagle River Bridge on the hill. The Roebuck girl was taken to Providence Hospital by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company ambulance, where she was treated for bruises. No citation was issued.

YOUTH UNHURT IN ONE CAR SMASH

EAGLE RIVER: A Peters Creek youth was unhurt, when his 1957 Chevrolet sedan went out of control and crashed into the railing on the Eagle River hill last week.

The driver, Raymond R. Beam 18, lost control when his car skidded on the ice as he came down the hill on the south side of the Eagle River bridge. He spun around and hit the railing knocking out several posts, and doing extensive damage to his car. No citation was given.

BIRCHWOOD: Plans for the new Birchwood Elementary School, as well as for the six room addition to Chugiak High School, were told to guests at the annual BEL (Business, Education and Labor) Breakfast, which was held Tuesday morning at Chugiak High School.

These plans were revealed in a talk given by Mr. Joe Montgomery, Assistant Superintendent of Auxiliary Services for the Greater Anchorage Area Borough School District.

According to Mr. Montgomery, three possible sites are being considered for the new school, these all lie somewhere between Chugiak High School and Peters Creek, on the Birchwood Road. This school is scheduled for completion and opening for classes for the fall term of 1966. The new six room addition of the High School is also scheduled to be completed and ready for use for the fall term.

This addition will include four teaching unit.

Mr. Montgomery also discussed the school lunch program and explained the reason for the recent increase in the price of lunches. He said that the increase was required to overcome the deficit caused by the lack of USDA commodities during the past year.

Also, a guest speaker at the breakfast, was Mr. Gerald Markee, Director of Student Records for the GAAB School District. Mr. Markee also talked on the new school facilities.

Local school principals, Emerson Sortore, of the Chugiak Elementary School, Sam Hayes of Eagle River Elementary School and Barney Sabo of the Chugiak High School invited guests present on tours of their respective institutions.

Mr. James Ekstedt, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Matanuska Electric Association, told the group of a proposed foreign exchange student program which may be introduced to Chugiak High School next year.

The session was concluded by the rendition of two numbers by the the direction of Mr. Darrel Daley.

THIS WEEK IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, D. C. - Once again I have decided to solicit your views - via a questionnaire - on twelve of the most important issues facing members of the 89th Congress. In the mail this week are 75,000 postcard questionnaires which I have asked Alaska's postmasters to distribute to the State's postal patrons. If, for one reason or the other you do not receive a copy - and would like one - please write me at 450 Cannon House Office building, Washington, D. C., 20515, and I will forward you a copy by return mail.

The House Committee on Banking and Currency has favorably reported legislation authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to strike up to 20,000 medals in commemoration of the purchase of Alaska from Russia. At my request, this legislation was

taken up directly by the full Committee on Banking and Currency - without proceeding through Subcommittee channels - in an effort to speed its consideration. House floor action on the Senate passed measure is scheduled for April 4.

The Board on Geographic Names of the Interior Department informs me it has approved for Federal use the name of "Heintzleman Ridge" - extending from the Juneau Municipal Airport to the Juneau Ice Field - in honor of our late Territorial Governor, B. Frank Heintzleman.

President Johnson became the consumers' "spokesman" this past week when he sent a special message to Congress on consumers' interests. In this message, the President urged the passage of legislation (which I will support) calling for "truth" in packaging and lending. With regard to the latter, I have a supply of a booklet "The Consumers Credit Guide", a copy of which can be obtained by contacting my office.

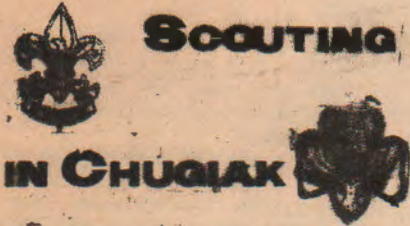

Rev. Marcus Price, also a serviceman, was called as Pastor in January of 1958. Under his leadership the mission was constituted into a church in February of 1958, with 52 charter members. The new name of the Church was Eagle River First Baptist, and the present property was purchased. The first deacon to be ordained by the church was Sgt. T.F. Moore, of the Anchorage Police Department. Rev. Price rotated in July of 1958, after seeing the church experience a substantial growth.

Rev. James C. Morgan served as interim pastor for a short while, until Rev. E.C. Chron was called as pastor in September of 1958. Rev. Chron served the church until December 1, 1960, and had the privilege of seeing the church prosper and space. The church also started two new missions, which are now known

The Players are now offering to pay the royalties for the play in order that the seventh grade class at the Eagle River School may produce it.

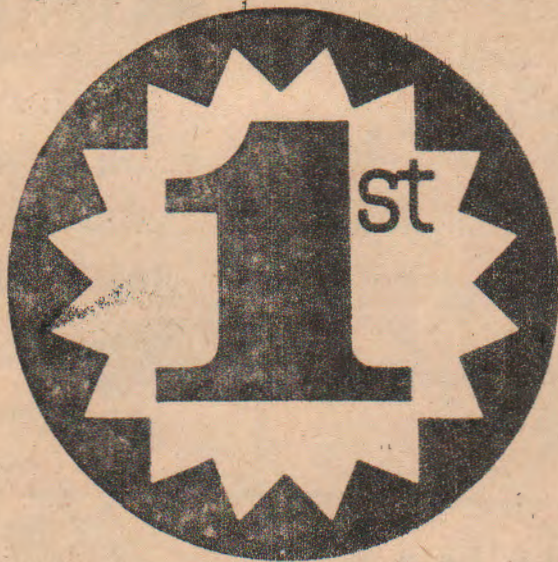
The play has been cast, and is now in rehearsal, but due to the fact that only eight of the original twenty five play books have been located, there is considerable difficulty being experienced.

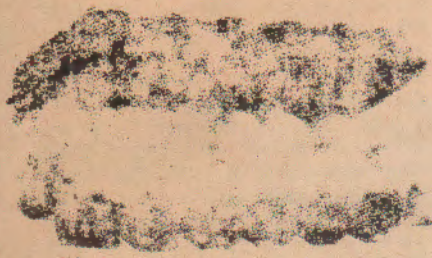

withdrawing at the last minute, and the other defeated on the first ballot.

Possibly anticipating a re-run of last year's "rhubarb" the Board had enlisted the services of two Sgts. at Arms and a Parliamentarian.

Annual reports were given by the Chairman and other officials.

It was reported that through the efforts of Mrs. Alice Snodgrass, MEA was able to collect on a claim for supplies purchased from major suppliers who were convicted of collusion in the past year. The refund was in the amount of \$11,000.

The main event of the evening, the election of officer began with the nomination of four candidates from the floor. These were Rus-Anderson (of Old Chugiak) and Don Schroeder (of Eagle River.)

Each of the candidates were then allowed five minutes in which to talk to the membership and present their candidacy. Dan C. Bell, of Eagle River requested that he be permitted to read a report which he had prepared and printed copies of which had been distributed to the membership. Since, the reading of the report would take in excess of the five minutes allowed, he said that the four nominees from the floor had offered to let him use their time to complete the reading. The parliamentarian ruled that this was out of order, since the time was specifically allotted for candidates to present their own campaign.

Bell then proceed to read his report. When his allotted time was gone, Ralph Anderson, one of the floor nominees, took over the reading of the report. Objections from some of the membership, that since each person had been presented a copy of the report, reading of it by the candidates was unnecessary and would make the meeting drag out too long, brought the reading of the report to a halt.

Bell, and the four floor nominees

withdrew their candidacy just prior to the casting of the first ballot.

In the first ballot, the vote was as follows; Welch, 32, Vasilie, 58; DeHate 25; Stephens, 73, Silfven, 32; Mayr, 95; Tucker 135; Bolen 99; and Miller 114. Total registry at the meeting was 346.

At a motion from the floor, the five low candidates were dropped, and the 2nd Ballot was as follows; Mayr, 116, Tucker, 187; Bolen, 150 and Miller, 170. Elected were Tucker (Incumbent) for 2 years, and Miller (by petition) for 2 years.

Proposition 1, which asked that voting procedure be changed to require only a simple plurality for Board of Director elections instead of a majority was passed by only two votes. Results of that vote were, For the proposition, 150, against, 148.
