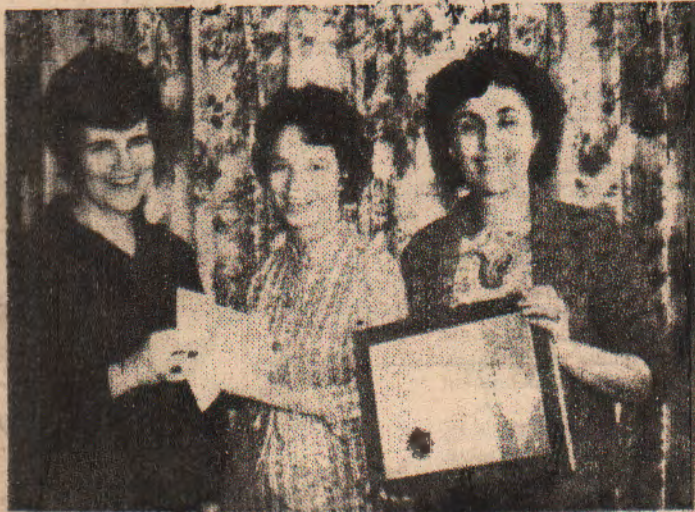


## MISSING BOYS FOUND SAFE

TOK: Three local boys who had been reported missing to the State Police on Monday, were found to be safe at Tok last night.

The names of the youths were not revealed, but they were said to be all from local families and aged 12 and thirteen years.

The parents had told the State Police that the boys had disappeared at approximately 6:00pm on Monday.

The State Police at Tok located the boys at approximately 7:00pm on Tuesday. At that time they were in the company of a fourth youth, a seventeen year old boy from Anchorage.

The parents of the Chugiak boys were notified of their whereabouts, and they immediately left for Tok to join them.

The three had apparently been running away, although the Anchorage boy had his parents permission to make the trip according to the State Police.

The Police said that someone had apparently given the boys a ride as far as the Canadian border.

### BODIES OF GLACIER VICTIMS RECOVERED

EKLUTNA LAKE: An army rescue team, accompanied by a local State Trooper, arrived at the base camp near the Eklutna Glacier at 5:30am on Monday morning.

At 9:30am, a helicopter from the 172nd Infantry took the men to the spot where two Alaska Methodist University students had died and removed the bodies.

The students, who were members of an AMU geology team had both died of exposure when the party attempted to weather out a sudden storm that overtook them.

The victims were, Ann Kroenung, 21 and Frank W. Godfrey Jr. 23. The other members of the party did not suffer any injury and had been airlifted out by army helicopter on Sunday. The bodies were found to be located 200 yards below an "A Frame" cabin which had been the goal of the party when the storm forced them to find what shelter they could.

Miss Kroenung was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul C. Kroenung of Cranberry Road in Anchorage.

Godfrey was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank W. Godfrey, of 4721 Newcastle Way in Anchorage.

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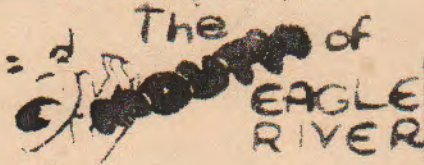

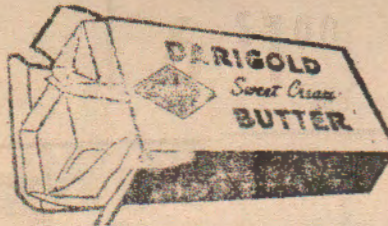

Terry Keith and Bob McNutt of Chugiak tied for second place in the pole vault along with Newman of Elison and Hoedel and Martin, both of Homer.

Two third place winners were Mike Roderick in the Discus throw, and Butch Phillips in the 180 low hurdles.

This was the first year that Chugiak had competed in the State Championship meet.

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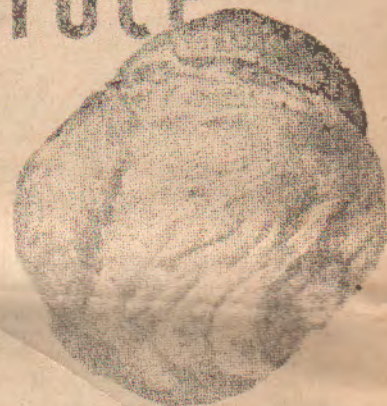

Wheeled Scrapers -- minimum 20 yard capacity -- minimum of three (3) to be furnished.

Tractor with 'dozer and push block combination equal to D8 46A.

Tractor with 'dozer equal to D8 14A.

Tractor with 'dozer equal to D6 B.

These rentals will include operators' wages, together with fuel, lubrication, repairs, maintenance, taxes, insurance and other charges necessary to keep the equipment in good operating condition.

These rates shall be paid for the period the equipment is actually working on the job-site. Moving costs or any part of time lost or delays caused by breakdown or defective equipment will not be paid for by the STATE.

The proposal shall include the owner's name and address, the hourly rate, the make and model of the equipment offered and the location where it may be inspected.

The job consists of earth-moving with large wheeled scrapers working in conjunction with Highway Department men and equipment on the Matanuska-Wasilla road in the vicinity of the Agricultural Experimental Farm. Approximately 100 hours will be required for three scrapers to complete the project.

Equipment must be available to start work on Monday May 16, 1966. Awards will be made on the basis of age, condition and availability of the equipment as well as the hourly rate.
