BODIES OF GLACIER VICTIMS RECOVERED

EKLUTNA LAKE: An army rescue team, accompanied by a local State Trooper, arrived at the base camp near the Eklutha Glacier at 5:30am

on Monday morning. At 9:30am, a helicopter from the 172nd Infantry took the men to the spot where two Alaska Methodist University students had died and removed the bodies. The students, who were members of an AMU geology team had both died of exposure when the party

attempted to weather out a sudden

storm that overtook them. The victims were, Ann Kroenung, 21 and Frank W. Godfrey Jr. 23. The other members of the party did not suffer any injury and had been airlifted out by army helicopter on Sunday. The bodies were ter on Sunday. The bodies were found to be located 200 yards be-low an "A Frame" cabin which had been the goal of the party when the storm forced them to find what shelter they could. Miss Kroenung was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul C. Kroenung of Cranberry Road in Anchorage. Godfrey was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank W. Godfrey, of 4721 Newcastle Way in Anchorage.
