**CHUGIAK:** Both area Lions Clubs will be cooperating in a highway cleanup operation on Sunday, May 22nd, according to O.W. Wolford, co-ordinator for the local groups and the Centennial clean-up project "Ship-Shape".

Wolford said that both clubs will have crews along the highway, the Eagle River Lions beginning at the Eagle River bridge working north, and the Chugiak Lions beginning at Mirror Lake and working south, the groups planning to meet somewhere mid-point. Jim Pemberton is chairman for the Eagle River Lions, while Wolford heads the Chugiak club.

The plan is to have a Lions Club member begin at each mile post, accompanied by a boy scout from one of the local troops.

All trash and debris will be gathered and placed where it can be picked up by one of the two dump trucks that have been donated for this service. One of the trucks is locally owned by Danny Jensen of Fire Lake, while the other is being provided by Tri-City Construction Company of Spennard.

The Lions have said that anyone living along the highway or on side roads who may wish to clean up may bring their trash to any of the pick-up points along the road, properly boxed or in containers, and it will be hauled away. This excludes old auto bodies or any items to large or heavy to be manually loaded in the trucks.

John Grasse, who operated the dump south of the Eagle River Bridge has offered to allow the Lions clubs to dump the refuse free of charge on that day.

Members of the Omicron Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi are assisting by stenciling litter barrels which are to be permanently placed at points along the highway. The department of highways has arranged to keep these cans emptied throughout the year.

Wolford said that to publicize the project the local clubs will bring the large parrot "Captain Cook", which is the mascot of project "Ship-Shape" to the local area and display it at both the Eagle River and Peters Creek Shopping Centers. This model is equipped with a tape player and talks to the public.

The Lions are asking any individuals or other local organizations who would like to participate to join them. He added that the

### FIRE CHIEF WARNS

**CHUGIAK:** Max Latimer, Fire Chief for the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company has issued the following warning to residents planning on burning grass, brush or windrows.

"The fire season is here again for another. The following paragraphs from the Alaska State Statutes are going to be enforced: SEC. 41.15.050: Fire season. The period from April 1 to October 31, inclusive, of each year is designated the fire season. The commissioner may designate other periods as fire season.

The commissioner may proclaim an additional period for all or any portion of the state when weather or other conditions require action for the protection of forested lands. The commissioner may also during the fire season, prohibit, or allow only by permit, the setting of fire, smoking, entry or other uses on the land, when, in his judgment the activities would unduly increase the fire danger.

SEC. 41.15.110: Allowing fire to escape or failure to make every effort to extinguish as misdemeanor. A person having, or setting on fire timber, brush, grass or other inflammable material located or growing on lands that are owned possessed or controlled by him, shall do so at the time, in the manner and with prudent care so as to prevent it from spreading and doing damage to other property, and if he fails to do so he is negligent and guilty of a misdemeanor. A person who, knowing of a fire set by him on land, neglects to make every effort possible to extinguish it or who leaves a fire unattended is negligent and guilty of a misdemeanor. In a criminal action brought under this section, the escape of the fire is presumptive evidence of negligence by the person responsible for starting the fire and unless rebutted is sufficient to sustain a conviction.

SEC. 41.15.140: Penalty for misdemeanor. A person who is convicted of a misdemeanor under S s. 10-170 of this chapter is pun-

ishable by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$500, or by imprisonment in jail for not less than 10 days nor more than six months, or by both.

SEC. 41.15.150: Malicious or wanton setting of fires a felony. A person who maliciously or wantonly sets on fire timber, brush, grass or other inflammable material located or growing on lands that are not owned, possessed or controlled by him is guilty of a felony and upon conviction is punishable by imprisonment for not less than one year nor more than 10 years or by both.

SEC. 41.15.160: Double damages allowed in civil actions. In addition to the criminal punishment provided for by S s 10-170 of this chapter, the United States, the state, a municipality, or any person may recover in civil action double the amount of damages sustained as a consequence of a violation of ss 10-170 of this chapter or any other law relating to the subject matter of ss 10-170 of this chapter, the escape of a fire is presumptive evidence of negligence by the person responsible for starting the fire and unless rebutted is sufficient to sustain the recovery.

"Anyone in the service area of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, wishing to burn grass or burn is asked to call the Chugiak Vol. Fire Co. to request an inspection and permission to burn and a tank truck to be placed within the burning area, if burning is granted."

"Due to the growth of the community these regulations are going to be enforced for the safety of our area.

"There will be a \$25.00 service charge to non-subscribers for fire protection in this area.

"Those holding subscriptions in the area, the service will be included in the subscription", Latimer concluded.

Mrs. Joe Travesie, 33 who is employed as a janitor at the Eagle River school was just passing the mile 15 milepost, when she heard a loud explosion in her car. She thought at first it was a blowout, but upon stopping her car, she discovered two of her rear windows were shattered.

Mrs. Travesie proceeded to the home of a friend nearby, from where she called her husband and the State Police.

According to Mr. Travesie, the damage looked as though it had been done by the bullet of a high powered rifle. He said the projectile had apparently entered a right rear window and passed through the car and through the opposite window. The car was passing a wooded section along the highway at the time.

Mrs. Travesie normally carries several passengers in the back seat of her car. She did not have any passengers on Friday.

The State Police upon being questioned on the incident, said that they had a similar report at approximately 11:00pm that same evening.

Wayne F. Long, of Birchwood, was passing the same spot at which Mrs. Travesie had been attacked, when he saw what he described as a fifteen year old boy, who threw a rock at his car, which struck the windshield cracking but not shattering it. He said the youth then ran off.

The State Police are investigating both incidents.

### YOUTHS AND POLICE CLASH IN HIGHWAY BRAWL

FT. RICHARDSON: Two local state troopers succeeded in subduing a carload of five Ft. Richardson youths last Saturday night following a wild highway brawl in which the youths fought with the troopers.

The incident took place at 10:30pm, when the troopers stopped their patrol car to investigate at car in the ditch at mile 12 1/2.

One of the troopers got out and upon discovering the car contained five minors with beer in their possession, ordered them out of the car.

The youths became belligerent and attempted to resist the officer. When the second trooper saw that they were getting rough he left the patrol car and attempted to assist the first officer. The two troopers, struggled with the five youths for approximately ten minutes, during which time the youths attempted to prevent them from returning to the patrol car and radioing for help.

Although several cars stopped and offered to assist the troopers they declined help, and finally succeeded

in restraining four of the boys while a fifth escaped into the woods.

Two patrol cars from Anchorage were then summoned and the four placed under arrest.

The names of the youths were, Donald Lee Raddick, age 19 a Ft. Richardson soldier, John C. Mortimer Jr, age 20, also in the military at Ft. Rich, Thomas G. Mortimer age 18, a military dependent, and the fourth a juvenile dependent whose name is being withheld.

The four were arrested and the two Mortimer brothers and the juvenile were charged with assault and battery, disorderly conduct and minors in possession of alcoholic beverages. The Raddick youth was charged with disorderly conduct and minor in possession.

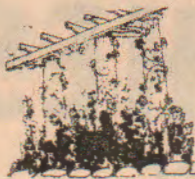
Drama Club, \$100, directional microphones for the stage, Balance to be raised by Drama Club next year.

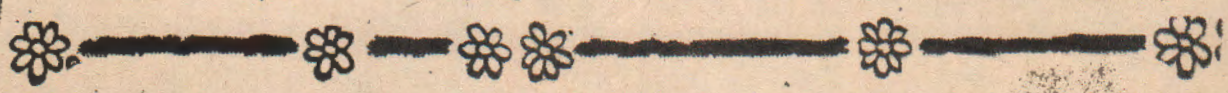
