

FIRE CHIEF WARNS

CHUGIAK: Max Latimer, Fire Chief for the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company has issued the following warning to residents planuing on burning grass, brush or windrows.

"The fire season is here again r another. The following parafor another. The following para-graphs from the Alaska State Statutes are going to be enforced: SEC. 41.15.050: Fire season. The period from April 1 to October 31, inclusive, of each year is designated the fire season. The commissioner may designate other periods as fire season,

The commissioner may proclaim an additional period for all or any portion of the state when weather or other conditions require action for the protection of forested lands. The commissioner may also during the commissioner may also during the fire season, projibit, or allow only by permit, the setting of fire, smoking, entry or other uses on the land, when, in his judgment the activities would unduly increase the fire decay fire danger.

SEC. 41.15.110: Allowing fire to escape or failure to make every effort to extinguish as misdemeaneffort to extinguish as misdemean-or. A person having, or setting on fire timer, brush, grass or other inflammable material located or growing on lands that are owned possessed or controlled by him, shall do so at the time, in the manner and with prudent care so as to prevent it from spreading and doing damage to other property, and if he fails to do so he is negand if he fails to do so he is negligent and guilty of a misdemeanor. A person who, knowing of a fire set by him on land, neglects to make every effort possible to ex-tinguish it or who leaves a fire unattended is negligent andguilty of a misdemeanor. In a criminal action brought under this section, the escape of the fire is presumpt-ive evidence of negligence by the person responsible for starting the fire and unless rebutted is sufficient to sustain a conviction,

SEC: 41,15,140: Penalty for misdemeanor. A person who is con-victed of a misdemeanor under S s. 10-170 of this chapter is pun-

isuable by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$500, or by imprisonment in jail for not less, than 10 days nor more than six months, or by both.

SEC. 41.15.150: Malicious or wanton setting of fires a felony. A person who maliciously or wantonly sets on fire timber, brush, grass or other inflammable material located or growing on lands that are not owned, possessed or controlled by him is guilty of a felony and upon conviction is punishable by im-prisonment for not less than one year nor more than 10 years or by both

by both.

SEC. 41.15.160: Double damages allowed in civil actions. In addition to the criminal punishment provided for by the s 10-170 of this chapter, the United States, the state, a muns icipality, or any person may re-cover in civil action double the amount of damages sustained as a consequence of a vollation of ss 10-170 of this chapter or any other law relating to the subject matter of ss 10-170 of this chapter, the excape of a fire is presumptive evidence of negligence by the person res-ponsible for starting the fire and unless rebutted is sufficient to sustain the recovery.



buring is granted." "Due to the growth of the commun-ity these regulations are going to be enforced for the safety of our area, "There will be a \$25,00 service charge to non-subscribers for fire protection in this area.







YOUTHS AND POLICE CLASH IN HIGHWAY

BRAWL FT, RICHARDSON: Two local state troopers succeeded in subduing a a carload of five Ft, Richardson youths last Saturday night following a wild highway brawl in which the youths fought with the troopers. 




