ANCHORAGE: Until July 1st, enforcement of the Boroughwide dog ordinance will be limited in the rural areas to answering complaints and patrolling the school grounds.

Funds are budgeted for full enforcement for the fiscal year beginning July 1st. Partial enforcement during May and June will be attempted by one enforcement officer hired with monies from the General Borough Contingency fund.

Complaints by residents of rural areas should be made to the Public Works department located at the Borough headquarters, phone 277-9561.

The city of Anchorage and the Spenard Utility District were budgeted for the dog control service and are providing full enforcement of the ordinance adopted April 7th.

The ordinance requires that all dogs be licensed and be immunized for rabies by July 1st, 1966. An attempt will be made to induce local veterinarians to issue licenses as a convenience to dog owners.

Licenses will be issued for a two-year period. The fee for each male or spayed female over six months is \$3.50 and for unspayed females \$9.00.

Desk copies of the dog ordinance are posted in the Chugiak and Eagle River postoffices. A limited supply of copies are also available at the Borough office, 104 E. Northern Lights Blvd.

BABE RUTH TRY-OUTS SATURDAY

PETERS CREEK: There will be try-outs for the newly organized "Babe Ruth" baseball team on Saturday, May 7th, at 9:00am.

The try-outs will take place at the old Pony League field on Oberg's road at mile 21.

You can still get out of the trouble you got into by seeding tomatoes and cucumbers too early.

First, let's take the tomatoes because they are the easiest to do something about. Fortunately, tomatoes will form roots anywhere along the stem and gives us a chance to simply take the tall, leggy plants and bury them deeper in the soil.

One trick is to take a gallon can or a number ten can and cut out the bottom then cut down the sides and tie it together again with strings. Place this on a board and put in a little soil.

Now put your tall tomato plants deep in the can, allowing a few good healthy leaves to stick out. Tomato plants will grow in cans of this size for another month.

When you are ready to put your plants out take the whole board, can, plant, and all into the garden, dig a large hole and slip the whole unit into the hole, pull the soil back around the can, then cut the string that is holding the can together, roll it back and the roots of the tomato will not be disturbed at all.

Water thoroughly with starter solution and you should have no trouble getting some real early tomatoes.

If you do not have a chance to reset the tomatoes again don't worry too much. When it's time to transplant them simply make a little trench long enough for the stem and lay the tomato plant on its side. Gently bend up two or three inches of the tip, and then bury all the roots and stem

as if it had been planted in an upright position. The tomato plants will usually take off and grow without any great setback.

Cucumbers are a lot more difficult to handle since they don't transplant readily. The roots are so fine and delicate that even disturbing the soil a little around the root system usually breaks so many of the hair roots that the plant is severely set back, if not killed altogether.

In the first place cucumbers should have been planted in individual pots. Often people use small peat pots thinking that they could set these directly outside or in their greenhouse without heat. But they have found that the plant was already much too large for the little peat pot.

The solution to this is to re-plant, peat pot and all, into a bigger container that will allow another two or three weeks of growth without retarding the plant.

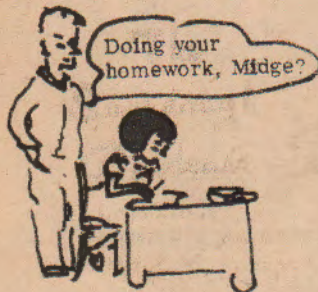
Sometimes peat pots do not break down as rapidly as they should and to avoid having the roots become pot bound it is well to take the point of a knife and split down the sides of the peat pot in several places.

There will be constitutional studies and discussions on Local government.

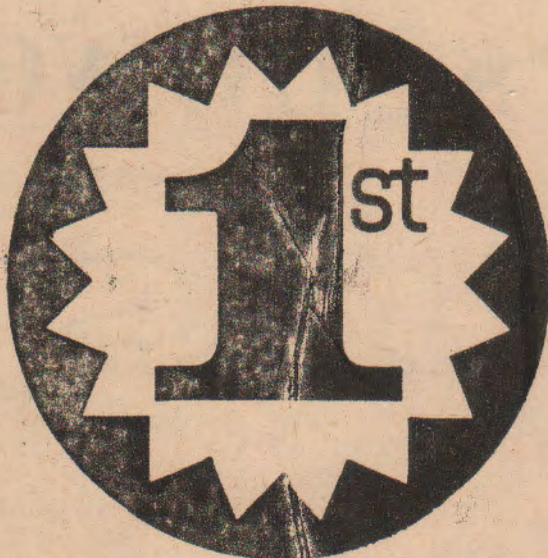
Consideration of the budget is also scheduled.

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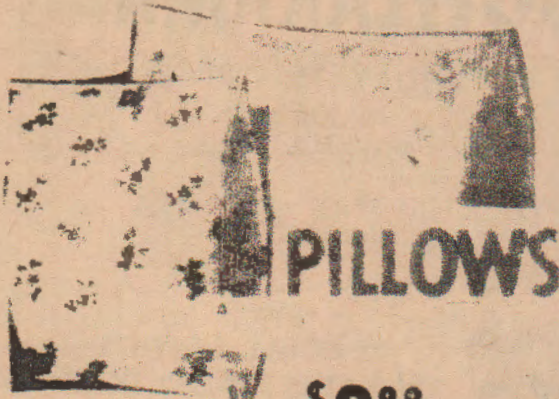

Don't try to pull the sides of the pot away. This will only break the few roots that he started to grow through the soil itself. Root pressure will pull the sides of the pot out & allow new roots to develop naturally.

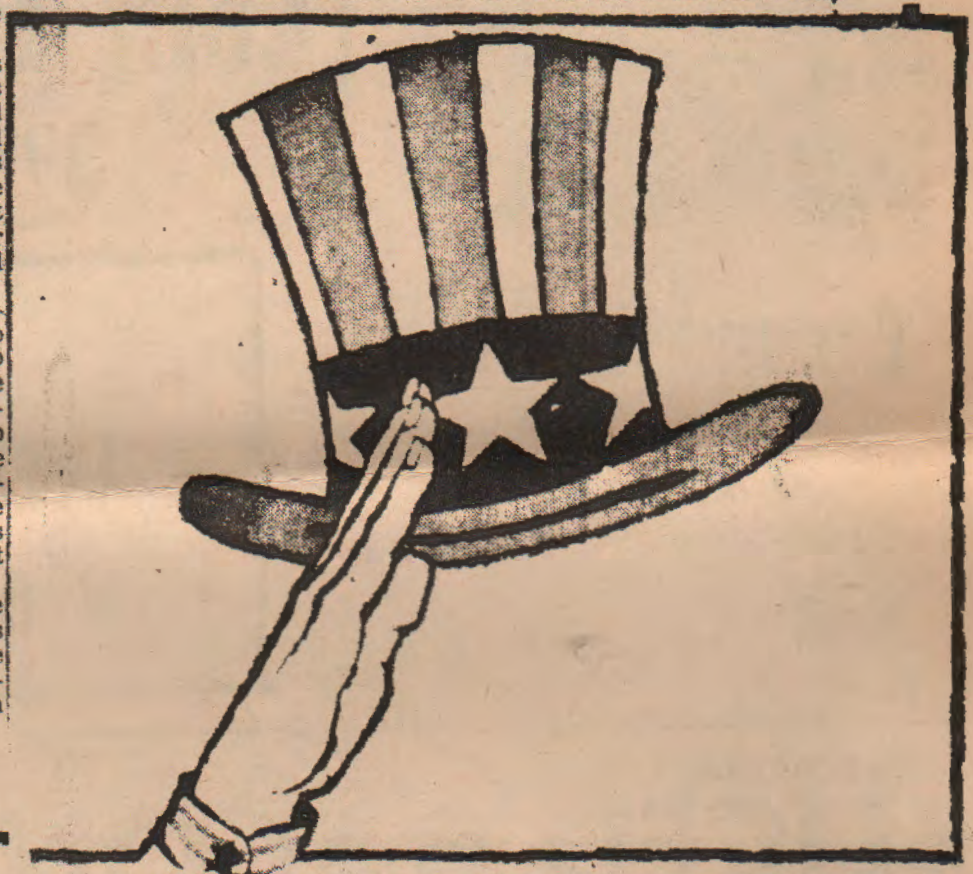
Another common situation to have plants in flats at about two inch spacing and then finding there is no window space available if you transplant them into anything larger. There are three things you can do with plants in flats that will slow their growth and still have them suitable to transplant when the weather is warm enough.

First, cut between the plants both ways so that there is about a two inch square around the base of the plant, this will trim off the ends of many roots yet new roots will form inside the cut area so that the plant will actually transplant better later on than it would if it had not been cut.

Next withhold water gradually from the plants. Don't do it all at once and don't overdo it. The plants must have a little water at all times but, by allowing them only enough to keep them from wilting, the growth will be materially slowed up. This is similar to the hardening off process which is necessary before they are set outside later on.

The third thing is to place them in a cool area, perhaps underneath a bench or on the floor, where there is considerably less light. Do not put them in total darkness.

Each Job Corps enrollee will receive a monthly living allowance, room and board, medical and dental care and work clothing. An allowance of \$30 for each month of satisfactory service will be paid at the end of service. From this allowance, he may allot up to \$25 a month to his family dependents and this will be matched by Job Corps, providing a total of \$50 each month to his dependents.



BIRCHWOOD SITE OF JOB CORPS CENTER

A Job Corps Conservation Center will be established at Birchwood, according to Senator E.L. Bartlett's April 15 newsletter.

Establishment of the center, on state land, is subject to the formal approval of Gov. William Egan, an announcement from the Office of Economic Opportunity stated.

The 200-man center will be operated by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Conservation work projects are planned for the Eklutna Lake area, Eagle River, Lake George and the Birchwood Center site. These will include construction of recreational facilities, overnight shelter cabins, picnic and camping facilities, roads and trails, watershed improvement and forestry work.

Programs at the center itself are to include educational courses, counselling and vocational training, such as basic courses in reading, mathematics, language skills, general shop courses, clerical courses, and the operation and maintenance of equipment.

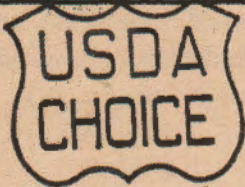
